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In the fourth of the Seven Sayings, the tragedy reaches its climax.



Rejected by His "church", His family, His disciples, and His closest friend, esus now feels He was abandoned by God.



"A time is coming, and has come, when you will be scattered, each to his own home. You will leave me all alone. Yet I am not alone for my Father is with me. ohn 16:52



"The Cry of Dereliction"

to be "derelict" in duty is to abandon it.



God had NOT forsaken His Son.



Jesus Himself had always moved toward sinners, not away from them.



Throughout Jesus' ministry, Jesus' reliance on God had always made everything work.



esus even had times of hearing directly from heaven that He was God's beloved Son.



But His crucifixion kept things from making sense.



Many only want a Savior who has suffered everything they have. Such is Jesus.



Jesus wasn't pretending to feel abandoned. He truly felt that way.



But when He felt abandoned by God, He still prayed to God.



Jesus did not cry out in self-pity and give up the fight.



Jesus asked God "Why?" in faith believing God would answer.



God answered Him such that lesus was able to see His crucifixion to the end with a quiet mind and a serene mood.



For all who have felt far from God, the 4th saying is for you – God never leaves or forsakes.
