The Promise of a Lifetime

Luke 23:35-43

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The second "Saying from the Cross" is an answer to a prayer: "Today, you will be with Me in Paradise."



Only Luke records this conversation between Jesus and the thief on the cross.



A Commitment to Accuracy "Many have undertaken to draw up an account of the things that have been fulfilled among us, just as they were handed down to us by those who from the first were eyewitnesses and servants of the word...

Therefore, since I myself have carefully investigated everything from the beginning, it seemed good also to me to write an orderly account for you,



most excellent Theophilus so that you may know the certainty of the things you have taught." Luke 1:1-4



Whatever his crime was, the thief felt he deserved to be executed.



Did the thief accuse himself after seeing the innocence of Jesus?



What the thief thought of lesus: 1. He believed Jesus would live beyond death.



2. He believed lesus was going to a place he himself would not be able to go.



3. He believed Jesus was some sort of king going to His kingdom.



4. He believed in the kindness of Jesus of whom he could ask a personal favor.



Jesus begins His promise to the thief by "Truly," meaning "Listen!"



Jesus' promise, in a few words, was packed with meaning.



1. Jesus assured the man that life will go on past death.



2. Jesus assured the thief he would enjoy fellowship with Jesus after death.



"Hell is other people." from the play, No Exit by Jean-Paul Sartre.



Two beliefs that make being with people a joy: "I am a blessing to them." "They are a blessing to me."



There will be countless millions of people to enjoy throughout eternity.



3. Jesus promised the man that the next world will be "Paradise."



Everything you've ever considered to be "paradise" was made by God. He can do it again, even better.



Jesus wouldn't have mentioned heaven if He didn't want us to think about it occasionally.



"Won't heaven be wonderful?"





4. Jesus assured the man that Paradise was in his IMMEDIATE future.



5. Jesus assures us all that we, too, have a chance at Paradise.



Jesus didn't offer Paradise to the other thief on the other cross.



The power of Jesus that the thief was most taken by was the goodness of Jesus.



Getting into heaven isn't a matter of saying "magic words."



Getting into heaven is all about being open and responsive to the goodness of God.



We are all constantly surrounded by goodness — God's goodness.



"God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in him. In this way, love is made complete among us so that we will have confidence on the day of judgement,



because in this world we are like Him."

I John 4:16-17





We get the invitation to Paradise when we decide to "live in love."



Those who through faith and repentance open themselves to God's goodness have paradise in their future.
