Application Questions

James 1:22 says, "But be doers of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves." These questions are designed to help you apply today's message in your life. We encourage you to thoughtfully answer these questions and discuss your answers with others. - 1. Which king are you following in your daily choices—Herod who clings to control, or Jesus who calls for surrender? (Matt 2:3, 2:11)
- 2. How does your response to Jesus resemble the magi's joyful worship or Herod's fearful resistance? (Matt 2:10-12, 2:16)
- 3. Are there areas in your life where you, like Herod, pretend spiritual interest but resist true obedience? (Matt 2:8, 2:16)
- 4. What costly treasure—time, resources, or talents—can you offer Jesus this season as an act of worship? (Matt 2:11)
- 5. How have you seen God's guidance or provision during times of uncertainty, as He did for Joseph and the magi? (Matt 2:12-14)
- 6. In what ways do you need to obey God immediately, even when the next step feels unclear or costly? (Matt 2:13-14)
- 7. How do you respond to suffering or injustice, remembering that Jesus entered a world of darkness and pain? (Matt 2:16-18)
- 8. Are you willing to embrace seasons of obscurity or "Nazareth beginnings," trusting God's purpose in hidden places? (Matt 2:22-23)
- 9. Read the take home questions. Which one encourages you or challenges you the most? Why? How will you live differently this week based on what you have learned from Matthew 2?
