SCIENCE Great Minds - PhD Science

Science is the study of the natural world as spoken into existence by a creative God. Students study science in order to increase in knowledge of the Creator by means of exploring His design and purpose. This knowledge will prepare them to subdue and steward the physical world for the glory of God and the good of mankind.

PhD Science utilizes an Activity-Before-Concept, Concept-Before-Terminology approach. Students engage in activities to develop a basic understanding before a concept is presented and investigate the concept more until formal names or terminology is introduced. Through authentic anchor phenomenon, each module explores core science concepts to help students make sense of the world around them. Through observation, questioning, modeling, investigation, and evidence-based argumentation, students build knowledge that they can demonstrate by applying their understanding in different contexts through Science or Engineering Challenges in each module.

HISTORY Bob Jones Heritage Studies 2

History is the unfolding story of God's story as He reveals Himself to man. Christians are called to remember and make known God's story to each generation in order to know Him, become ambassadors of reconciliation, and to participate in the biblical meta-narrative.
