

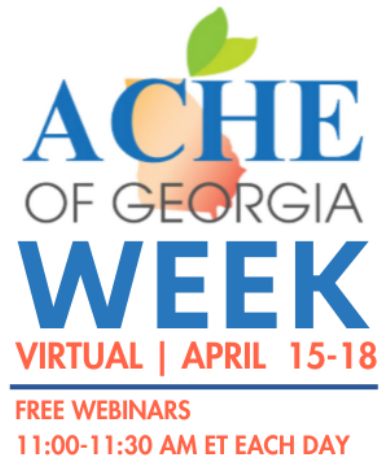

organizational commitment are the tools that allow me as a future leader to uplift communities.

- 4.) Quality is fundamental to putting the patient first within a healthcare setting. Empowering frontline staff to drive quality improvement is crucial.

- 5.) Disruptors such as telemedicine and AI, are reshaping our landscape. Agility and adaptability are our survival skills. The future healthcare leaders must embrace change as the framework of accessible and affordable healthcare.
- 6.) Chicago's collaborative spirit fostered the promotion of being a champion of health equity. Community partnerships, data analytics, and grassroots initiatives converge to bridge gaps. Health equity isn't an abstract dream; it's a blueprint etched in collective effort.
- 7.) Organizational culture drives the mission of the organization. It shapes performance, retention, and patient outcomes. It's important to cultivate a culture that magnetizes talent, fosters innovation, and propels us forward.
- 8.) Technology isn't an end; it's a means. Personalized approaches, patient engagement, and data-driven nudges elevate cancer screening rates.
- 9.) Dr. Shabot and John Kueven unveiled the blueprint for reliability. Safety, quality, and engagement intertwine. Our pursuit of excellence demands unwavering commitment. It is essential as a healthcare leader to "go to the action" when in pursuit of being a HRO.

As I reflect on my time at the Congress, I am profoundly grateful for the scholarship that made it all possible. It

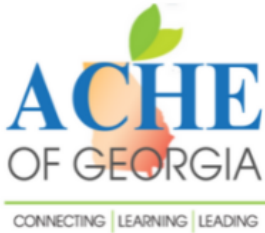
