Call for Nominations for the 2027 ACHE of Georgia Board Slate of Officers

Are you an active member in good standing with ACHE and ACHE of Georgia? WE NEED YOU! Be a part of leading ACHE of Georgia into the future and choose to serve!

Slate of Officers for Nomination:

1) Vice President: The candidate must be certified in healthcare leadership holding the ACHE designation of FACHE. The Vice President will automatically succeed to the office of the President and Chair of the Nominating Committee (due to automatic succession, nomination for the President position is unnecessary).

2) Secretary: Serving as the Secretary to the Board of Directors, this position is the record keeper of the ACHE of Georgia corporate records and membership. Provides notices, prepares and signs minutes, and assists with interpretation of bylaws. The candidate should be organized with timely follow-through.

3) Treasurer: The successful candidate shall be knowledgeable in basic accounting principles. The Treasurer has oversight of the financial matters of ACHE of Georgia, shall receive and distribute funds, submit monthly financial reports, and work in collaboration with our accounting firm to prepare and preserve proper financial and tax records.

4) Members at Large (eight positions): Members at Large are elected to serve on the Board of Directors. Members at Large serve as advisors to the board, are representatives of the membership and serve in various positions such as Chair of the Programs Committee, Membership Committee, Communications Committee, and other committees.

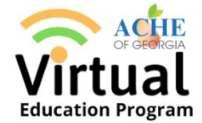

"Something that I continually learn through these types of events is the deep importance of your social network, especially in healthcare. We are all going through the same struggles and it's great to have community throughout those struggles."

"This week showed me how important a bottom-up structure is. Talking to professionals and hearing how fast healthcare changes, made it clear to me that the people working directly with patients need to be involved in improving the systems, because they see what is actually happening day to day. It also made me realize that you cannot afford to stand still in healthcare. Making the Most of Your Healthcare Administration Internship

Summer internships are in full swing and whether you are shadowing a department director at a major health system or supporting operations at a community clinic, one thing is certain: what you put into this experience will determine what you take from it. Here are a few ways to make your internship count!

Show up Curious, Not Just Present

The easiest thing to do in an internship is blend into the background. However, the most valuable thing you can do is to ask questions. Ask your supervisor and other administrators how they approach big decisions, what they're most focused on this year, or what skills they wish they had developed earlier in their career. Ask anyone who will sit with you how they got to where they are. Healthcare administration is a relationship-driven field and curiosity is one of the fastest ways to build meaningful connections.

Treat Every Interaction as a Networking Opportunity

You do not have to be in a formal networking event to build your professional network. It is happening every day in the hallways, conference rooms, and even the breakroom. Introduce yourself intentionally. Follow up with a LinkedIn connection request after a meaningful conversation. Keep a running list of people you met and what you talked about. These connections do not expire when your internship ends.

Connect Your Experience to the Bigger Picture

If you are pursuing a career in healthcare administration, your internship is more than a line on your resume, it is early evidence of the leader you're becoming. ACHE encourages students to document early career experiences as part of the pathway toward the Board of Governors certification and eventually FACHE status. Keep a reflective journal, save project samples where appropriate,

and note the competencies you're developing. Your future self will be grateful.

Ask for Feedback, Then Act on It

Mid-internship check-ins are often optional which means most interns skip them. Don't. Ask your supervisor for honest feedback halfway through. It signals maturity and it gives you something concrete to improve on before the internship ends.

You Belong in This Room

Imposter syndrome is real, especially early in your career. But you earned this opportunity and the field of healthcare administration needs your perspective. Show up, stay curious, and remember that every leader in the field was once exactly where you are.

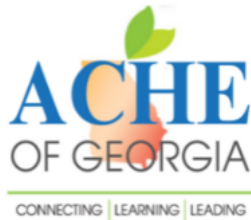
