#### What sparked your interest in healthcare administration?

"I have always known I wanted to be an administrator, and I knew how important it was for people in charge to be competent. I believe I was influenced most by my own healthcare experiences. I admired the great care that I had received in my getting my own medical care, and I wanted to be able to pass on that great care to others. By getting involved in healthcare administration, I knew I would be able to be one of the great leaders that could improve the healthcare experience of patients, something that I always wanted to do."

#### What do you hope to accomplish after you graduate?

"Once I graduate, I hope to gain a position in a top organization to apply the skills that I've learned and gain knowledge from people in that organization. I am very interested in process improvement. As I mentioned earlier, I was heavily influenced by the medical care that I, myself, had received in the past. My goal is to become a leader that can influence the delivery and process of care in hospitals and improve the patient experience."

#### Tell us about a great experience or opportunity you have had in this program.

"I think the greatest experience I have had so far while in my graduate career would be the GAHE Annual Meeting and Career Clinic this past November. It was a valuable experience that allowed me to listen to the perspectives of top executives throughout the state of Georgia. It also allowed me to interact with professionals already in the field, which was such a unique experience. Additionally, the career round table provided the opportunity to speak face to face with professionals who were knowledgeable and shared valuable advice for furthering my own career in healthcare."

# What advice do you have for ACHE Student Associates to get the most value out of their membership?

#### Tell us about your internship experience and your involvement.

I am currently interning at Landmark Hospital, a 50-bed Long-Term Acute Care Hospital in Savannah, Georgia. The internship primarily focuses on quality improvement within the hospital among employees and patients. I am currently involved in several projects at Landmark, some of which include implementing the Nursing Hourly Rounding Program, helping my preceptor prepare for the monthly Medical Executive Committee meetings, preparing for the upcoming CIHQ Evaluation, and reviewing and revising policies and procedures for the facility. I am also an active member in the community and on the Leadership Team for the MHSA program. In August 2015, I traveled to Bali, Indonesia for two weeks as a volunteer. While I was there, I taught health education to fourth grade students at local school in a small village. This experience was completely life changing for me. I plan on volunteering again in the near future so I can continue to educate individuals that are under-privileged on the importance of a healthy lifestyle.

#### Where do you see yourself in 5 years?

In five years, I see myself still continuing to learn and grow in the healthcare industry. I know that hard work and dedication will get me where I want to be, but it takes time. I would eventually like to be a Director at a hospital or Practice Administrator of a multi-physician practice. I have also considered eventually going back to school to obtain a clinical degree or becoming a part-time professor for Undergraduate students that are studying Health Science at Armstrong.

# <u>GAHE Double Program Atlanta/Savannah February 25th Event: The Student Perspective</u>

The joint Atlanta/Savannah event was my first GAHE experience as a first year graduate student at Armstrong State. Overall, I was greeted with a warm welcome and the event exceeded my expectations. As a student and an early careerist, it was interesting to learn about current issues that are prevalent for Georgia-based and experienced professionals. For the first half of the event, topics that were discussed included technology innovation, healthcare systems in rural areas (how to keep individuals in the local market), how to continuously engage your workforce, how to continue to develop leaders, strategic planning, Georgia/Medicaid expansion, inpatient to outpatient shift trend, strategic partnership, lean six sigma and much more. The speakers did a great job effectively addressing all of these topics and provided useful information that I have been able to apply in classes. One piece of advice that Mr. Alan Kent, CEO of Meadows Regional Medical Center, shared was that hospital administrators should, "Stick to the mission but look from the outside in. There's different delivery today, but the same overall mission." This was a simple yet direct way to address that although healthcare is continuously evolving, the mission for providing quality healthcare will always be the same. It is just as important to take a look at the system from an outside perspective as an insider to get a clear perspective. I am truly looking forward to the next GAHE event!

## What's going on in healthcare today? (trends):

#### Mergers

High profile mergers are continuing to occur in 2016. Pressures due to the ACA's focus on values and outcomes, organizations are coming together in order to grow and differentiate themselves in the market. Implications suggested while health care organizations approach this trend: consider the unconventional, capitalize on integration, and plan around strengths.

#### • Cybersecurity

Due to technology becoming a huge part of health care, from mobile applications, electronic medical records, and insulin pumps, organizations must make sure that only trusted users can assess devices while connected to secure networks with firewalls for protection. Companies also should conduct routine security assessments to review their vulnerability.

#### Teamwork

The most efficient setup for medical facilities is to ensure that "teaming" is allowed within all departments of the organizations. This means allowing collaborative and interdependent work among different partners and organizational boundaries. Managers should encourage healthcare professionals to communicate a patient's care with other departments and fellow professionals the patient will encounter. This system will result in increased quality of care while allowing for less errors and confusion during the visit.
