# JESUS CHRIST – MAN'S HOPF #4

## The Old Testament Could Not Save

Two periods of Bible history preceded the Christian age which is recorded in the New Testament part of the Bible. The first of these periods was called the Patriarchal Age and included all the time from creation (Genesis 1) to Moses receiving the law on Mount Sinai (Exodus 19 and 20). The second period was the Mosaical Age which was for the Jewish people and began at Mount Sinai and ended when Jesus died upon the cross (Colossians 2:14). During these periods of Bible history, men committed sins and under God's instruction they offered animal sacrifices for their sins (Genesis 4:4, Hebrews 11:4, and Leviticus 7:37). While these sacrifices were ordained by God, they were insufficient to take away man's sins (Hebrews 10:1-4). Man under the Old Testament had to look forward to the coming of the Messiah for the removal of his sins.

The Bible itself is clear that the Old Testament was not the fulfillment of the will of God, but consisted of laws that were given until the time for the coming of Christ was fulfilled. In talking about the Law of Moses, the New Testament describes the incomplete nature of the law by using a number of symbolic figures. The law contained **shadows** of that which was coming, but it did not contain the very image of it (Hebrews 10:1). This means that the Old Testament law was a dim

vision (shadow), but the real which had substance was not present until Christ (Hebrews 10:9, 10). The law contained **figures** or comparisons of that which would later come as reality in Christ (Hebrews 9:8 - 10). The law contained **patterns**, but the real product of God's plan would appear years later (Hebrews 9:22-24). Patterns were the outlines and descriptions that would later be shown in the completion in Christ. The law was pictured as a **schoolmaster** or tutor whose purpose was to lead man to Jesus Christ (Galatians 3:24). The term "schoolmaster" in the Greek language indicates a servant whose responsibility was to escort his master's children to and from school each day. The law was simply a **testimony** of something better to come (Hebrews 3:5). "Testimony" means that it was a witness from God concerning the Christ that would come and provide many things which were better for man.

The New Testament covenant brought by Jesus Christ certainly ushered in that which was much better for man. The New Testament covenant through Christ contained a <a href="better-hope">better hope</a> than the Old Testament could ever have contained (Hebrews 7:19). It was better because Jesus was the assurance of the New Covenant as being a <a href="better-covenant">better covenant</a> (Hebrews 7:22). This New Covenant was better because it contained <a href="better-promises">better promises</a> (Hebrews 8:6). The New Covenant could bring better things because it was founded upon the forgiveness of a <a href="better-sacrifice">better sacrifice</a> (Hebrews 9:23). The New Covenant provides a <a href="better-life">better life</a> since it gives that which is eternal in Heaven (Hebrews 10:34). The New Covenant delivered to man the <a href="better-country">better country</a> that Abraham sought (Hebrews 11:16). It provided an eternal heavenly home with God (John 14:1-6). This home was provided as part of the <a href="better-resurrection">better resurrection</a> (Hebrews 11:35). It certainly is as the Hebrew writer concluded that the Old Testament individuals are made complete by the <a href="better-provisions">better-provisions</a> of God that have been given to those who are under the New Testament Covenant.

Since the Old Testament only gave a dim picture of the Messiah and God's saving New Testament Covenant, one should easily see that the gifts of the New Testament Covenant greatly exceed those of the Old Testament Covenant. Jesus came into the world to fulfill the incomplete Old Testament covenant (Matthew 5:17) so that it could then pass away (Matthew 5:18). This was accomplished as He was nailed to the cross as the perfect sacrifice for the sins of man (Colossians 2:14). The Old Covenant that was made at Sinai was then removed and replaced with the New Covenant (Hebrews 8:7-10). The Old Testament teaches many principles and lessons for man today (Romans 15:4), but the New Testament is God's better covenant for the saving of the soul and the delivery of the gospel message.
