Kathleen O'Toole

Kathleen O'Toole is a lawyer and career police officer who has earned an international reputation for her principled leadership and reform efforts. She currently serves as president of O'Toole Associates, LLC, as a partner at 21st Century Policing Solutions, and as a member of two corporate boards. She continues to work on police reform projects in major cities throughout the entire United States.

Earlier in her career, Kathleen rose through the ranks of local and state policing in Massachusetts. She began her career as a beat cop in the Boston Police Department and was assigned to numerous patrol, investigative, undercover, supervisory and management positions. She later served as Superintendent (Chief) of the Metropolitan District Commission Police and Lieutenant Colonel overseeing Special Operations in the Massachusetts State Police. She was appointed Massachusetts Secretary of Public Safety by Governor William Weld.

Kathleen also served as Boston Police Commissioner. She and her team oversaw the security operation for the 2004 Democratic National Convention and launched the Boston Regional Intell-

igence Center, one of the nation's first major city fusion centers. Working in close collaboration with federal, state and private sector partners, they also developed and enhanced prevention and intervention programs to address the root causes of violence and fear in Boston neighborhoods.


In 2014, Kathleen was appointed Chief of Police in Seattle, Washington where she led the Seattle Police Department through a major transformation project. In addition to addressing the requirements of a settlement agreement between the US Department of Justice and the City, she introduced leading-edge business practices and operational strategies that reduced crime and enhanced community trust.

Kathleen also worked in public safety roles overseas. She was a member of the Independent Commission on Policing during the Northern Ireland Peace Process. She served a six-year term as Chief Inspector of the Garda Síochána Inspectorate, a body responsible for the oversight of the national police service in the Republic of Ireland, and later served there as the Chair of the Commission on the Future of Policing. She was also a member of a four-person panel that developed recommendations for reforming the Northern Ireland Prison Service, and served on the Independent Commission on Policing in England and Wales.

Kathleen earned a BA from Boston College, a JD from New England School of Law, and a PhD from the Business School of Trinity College Dublin. She is a life member and served on the board of directors of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. She also served as a board member and treasurer of the Police Executive Research Forum.

Peter J. Koutoujian Sheriff, Middlesex Sheriff's Office

As a prosecutor, legislator, professor, and law enforcement leader, Sheriff Peter J. Koutoujian has worked on the leading issues in public safety and public health throughout his career.

Sheriff Koutoujian holds a bachelor's degree in psychology from Bridgewater State University, a law degree from the New England School of Law and a master's degree in public administration from the Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government. He maintains his academic involvement by continuing to teach criminal justice and leadership courses at several New England area institutions.

While a state representative, Peter Koutoujian oversaw Massachusetts' healthcare priorities as Chairman of the Committee on Health Care. He created and led the state's first Commission on Oxycontin and Other Drug Abuse as well as the Commission to End Racial and Ethnic Health Disparities. These issues were just beginning to emerge in public health at the time and combined with the Sheriff's longstanding advocacy on mental health, school nutrition, nursing, opioid and tobacco use, suicide awareness, violence prevention, pandemic response, and more. His experience and relationships with people in these areas helped drive legislation that made Massachusetts a national leader in healthcare, and inspired the philosophy of service he brought to the Middlesex Sheriff's Office.

As sheriff, Peter Koutoujian's use of specialty units has reimagined the correctional landscape. By targeting treatment towards unique populations such as young adults and military veterans, these programs have directly and substantially reduced recidivism in their participants. These results have been published in academic journals, featured by national news outlets, and labeled as best practices by multiple presidential administrations.

More importantly, Sheriff Koutoujian's commitment to data-driven research has made these programs and their results replicable across the country. In light of his commitment to the profession, Sheriff Koutoujian was elected by his statewide and national peers to serve as both the President of Major County Sheriffs of America and the Massachusetts Sheriffs' Association.

Sheriff Koutoujian has also earned honors as one of the nation's most prominent Armenian-American officials, including the U.S. Ellis Island Medal of Honor as well as the Mkhitar Gosh Medal and Medal of Gratitude from the Armenian government.

While the Sheriff still lives in his hometown of Waltham, he enjoys traveling to his wife's hometown in Madrid, Spain with Elizabeth and their three children: Peter, Cristian, and Isabel.

Steven A. Mazzie Police Chief, Everett Police Department

Steven A. Mazzie is the Chief of Police for the City of Everett, MA. Steve has been serving with the Everett Police Department since 1992 and is a third generation police officer following in the footsteps of his grandfather, father and three siblings. Steve has held all ranks within the department and has been serving as Chief of Police since 2003, when he became the youngest Chief in the history of the Everett Police Department. Today he oversees 160 civilian and sworn employees that serve the City of Everett which is one of the most diverse and densely populated communities in the Commonwealth.

Chief Mazzie has spent most of his career building bridges not only within the community but within the region to help provide better service delivery as well as engage in practices and strategies that work. He has placed an emphasis on quality customer service and accountability. Today, the Everett Police Department enjoys a good relationship with its residents, and conducts constant outreach and engagement with its residents, in particular new immigrants that have made Everett their home. In addition to the ever popular annual Jr Police Academy, Chief Mazzie has rolled out initiatives over the years that have helped increase positive contacts between his officers and the youth of the community in the form of The 25 Days of Christmas, the weekly Cops Corner at Everett High School, the annual Trick or Treat Drive Thru at Headquarters, & partnering with the schools and other community groups that increase positive contacts and break down barriers. In 2015 he partnered with Harvard University's Negotiation & Mediation Clinical Program to conduct a Stakeholder Assessment in an effort to find ways to improve Police – Youth Relationships and recently partnered with MIT's Sloan School of Management to conduct an assessment on the current barriers to young people joining the police ranks.

The Everett Police Department has become a more data driven agency to address their traffic and crime problems. Steve has embraced the role that crime analysts can play in a department and has seen firsthand the results that they can help deliver when combined with focusing on high risk offenders. Since 2015, the Everett Police Department has enjoyed a 12% reduction in overall crime while the city has continued to grow.

Chief Mazzie served as the President of the Massachusetts Major City Chiefs from 2011 to 2014 and has been engaged in numerous statewide initiatives and policy related matters as they relate to the myriad of issues that police executives must face daily. Over the years he has been actively involved in numerous associations and currently serves as a Board of Director for two of them to include the Police Executive Research Forum, Int'l Association of Chiefs of Police, Mass Chiefs Association, FBI National Academy Associates, Italian American Police Officers Association and Special Olympics Law Enforcement Torch Run. He is an instructor for the Commonwealth's Municipal Police Training Committee as well as a Subject Matter Expert for both the Nat'l Highway Transportation and Safety Administration's Data Driven Approaches to Crime and Traffic Safety initiative as well as IACP's Collaborative Reform Initiative Technical Assistance Center (CRI-TAC).

Chief Mazzie holds a BA from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst and an MA from Anna Maria College. He is a graduate of the FBI Nat'l Academy and the FBI Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar both in Quantico, VA. Additionally, he has completed numerous certificate programs related to the law enforcement profession including travel to Israel for counter terrorism training. Chief Mazzie is the proud father of two children, Gabriella 21 and Nicholas 19 both college students.

Nick Bettano Sergeant Winthrop Police Department

Law Enforcment Medal of Valor

On Saturday, June 28, 2021, at approximately 2:30 pm a suspect stole a large box truck and was speeding through Winthrop, MA he swerved into oncoming traffic and hit a GMC truck headon. The suspect escaped the rubble and jumped into the back seat of a SAAB telling the owner to drive. The owner of the car yelled at the suspect in a forceful manner and the suspect although heavily armed jumped out of the car. Brandishing a 45 caliber semi-automatic weapon he ran up behind 60-year-old Air Force Veteran Ramona Cooper and gunned her down shooting her in the back three times. Upon hearing the shots 68-year-old Vietnam-era Veteran and retired State Trooper, David Green noticed Cooper on the pavement and saw the armed suspect. He then helped another man to cover and attempted to disarm the shooter. He was shot seven times both victims were killed.

At approximately 2:45 pm Sergeant Nick Bettano of Winthrop Police Department received a dispatch about the truck accident and while responding was advised of an active shooter incident. Arriving on the scene Sgt. Bettano noticed one of the victims face down on the pavement. A bystander pointed out the direction of the suspect and Bettano began to move in on him and took cover behind a telephone pole. Without regard to his personal safety, he scanned the scene saw civilians and moved them to safety. At this point Bettano confronted the suspect and ordered him to drop the gun. The suspect started moving towards him and raised his weapon ready to fire. Bettano in defense of himself and others fired at the suspect who dropped his weapon and fell to the pavement. Bettano using his trauma kit and applied QuickClot on the most serious wound. As Bettano attempted to patch another wound the suspect jumped up and was trying to escape. Bettano threw him to the ground and with others assisting, strapped him to a stretcher. Despite his efforts to save the killer he died from his wounds. Sgt. Bettano stopped what could have devolved into a mass shooting incident.




Presented Posthumously In Memoriam and Honor of

Guglielmo Marconi Bologna, Italy

Born in Bologna, Italy, in 1874, Guglielmo Marconi was a Nobel Prize-winning physicist and inventor credited with the groundbreaking work necessary for all future radio technology. Through his experiments in wireless telegraphy, Marconi developed the first effective system of radio communication. In 1899, he founded the Marconi Telegraph

Company. In 1901, he successfully sent wireless signals across the Atlantic Ocean, disproving the dominant belief of the Earth's curvature affecting transmission. Marconi shared with Karl Braun the 1909 Nobel Prize in Physics. Marconi also held several positions in the Italian Army and Navy during World War I, starting the war as a lieutenant in 1914, finishing as a naval





Guglielmo Marconi Distinguished Service Award

Frank M. Gaziano, Associate Justice, was appointed to the Supreme Judicial Court by Governor Charlie Baker. Born in Quincy, Massachusetts, he received his B.A. from Lafayette College in 1986, and earned a J.D., magna cum laude, from Suffolk Law School in 1989. He began his legal career at the Boston law firm of Foley Hoag as a litigation associate. In 1991, he entered public service as an assistant district attorney with the Plymouth County District Attorney's Office in Brockton. In Plymouth County, he prosecuted complex felony cases, including homicides, and represented the Commonwealth on appeal before the Appeals Court and the Supreme Judicial Court. In 2001, Justice Gaziano was appointed the First Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Massachusetts, where he was a member of the Organized Crime Strike Force.

Governor Mitt Romney appointed Justice Gaziano as an Associate Justice of the Superior Court in 2004. Justice Gaziano served as the Regional Administrative Justice for Plymouth County and for Criminal Business in Suffolk County. He also chaired the Supreme Judicial Court's Standing Committee on Criminal Rules and was a member of the Supreme Judicial Court's Model Homicide Jury Instruction Committee. He frequently presents educational programs for attorneys and judges on trial advocacy, evidence, criminal law, criminal procedure, and search and seizure.
