LETTER FROM THE AMAZON 2021

To the participants of 26th United Nations Conference on Climate Change (COP26)

At this moment, it could not be more strategic for us, Brazilian Indigenous Peoples and Traditional Populations and Communities, to reaffirm their defense of Amazonian socio-biodiversity while the whole world is meeting at COP26 to discuss the climate crisis. A crisis that affects all who are living on Earth! Global societies and social movements know very well who are the governments and economic actors that are responsible for the environmental crisis. However, in Brazil, there is a political process of socio-environmental pressure that seeks to transfer to us the problem caused by climate change.

From October 18–20, 2021, the National Council of Extractive Populations (CNS) and the Coordination of the Indigenous Organizations of the Brazilian Amazon (COIAB) brought together indigenous people, extractivists and quilombolas in Belém, Pará for the Amazonian Socio-biodiversity Meeting. This was a meeting to counter the World Bioeconomy Forum, which was hosted by the State Government of Pará, Belém during the same period. With the participation of several representativest he traditional populations from the Brazilian Amazon, Cerrado, and Coast, representing 30% of all protected territories, the Amazonian Socio-biodiversity Meeting reaffirmed the commitment to defend an economy capable of coexisting with the forest, guaranteeing rights and distributing income fairly. It also proposed productive environmental and economic alternatives, as well as offered political guidance to socio-environmental movements in order to resist the hegemonic model that dominates the regional, national, and international economic structures with policies with a basis on environmental destruction, which is driven by transnational companies and national and subnational governments.

Our protected territories and respected rights are the demands of Brazilian social and environmental movements. We do not agree with any attempt or strategy based on market logic, with companies that enact environmental legislation that threatens our rights and with financing mechanisms that do not match the reality of our territories. We propose our best: the experience of our historical societies and cultures, built on our traditional and ancestral knowledge, in addition to our deep knowledge of nature.

The socio-bioeconomy that we defend is based on science and technology to improve the production of forestry and fishery products, enabling us to process, store, and market socio-biodiverse products while respecting our ways of life. We are against innovation processes that result in technological packages and high-input production systems, disseminated to replace the native forest with monoculture of genetically uniform varieties, with the objective of serving the food industry and then being falsely propagated as environmentally adequate systems. Innovation, for us,



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cannot result in processes that threaten our territories, our traditional and harmonious ways of living and producing.

Faced with this threatening reality in Brazil, we Indigenous Peoples and Traditional Populations and Communities gathered at the Amazonian Socio-biodiversity Meeting, to reaffirm our propositions to the authorities of world governments and the private sector that are participating in COP26. Our historic struggle, which resulted in the Alliance of Forest Peoples, born at Eco92, remains strong and actively committed to current challenges, many of which we have already faced in the past. Let's continue to be united and active through social struggle, political struggle and environmental solidarity with life and nature!
