Scripture Jeremiah 28:5-9

Then the prophet Jeremiah spoke to the prophet Hananiah in the presence of the priests and all the people who were standing in the house of the Lord; and the prophet Jeremiah said, 'Amen! May the Lord do so; may the Lord fulfil the words that you have prophesied, and bring back to this place from Babylon the vessels of the house of the Lord, and all the exiles. But listen now to this word that I speak in your hearing and in the hearing of all the people. The prophets who preceded you and me from ancient times prophesied war, famine, and pestilence against many countries and great kingdoms. As for the prophet who prophesies peace, when the word of that prophet comes true, then it will be known that the Lord has truly sent the prophet.'

Reflection

This snippet of scripture from the life of the prophet Jeremiah gives us a little insight into a troubling period in the life of the Israelite people. Under attack by the nation of Babylon led by King Nebuchadnezzar, the prophet Hananiah asserts that God has told him that in two years Babylon would be defeated, prisoners freed, and all that is precious restored to them. They must rise up, they must resist, declares Hananiah. Jeremiah has been given a different message from God, one that might not be as popular, and he declares for peace under the yoke of Babylonian rule – while he is symbolically wearing a wooden yoke around his neck to show that God is using that rule to change the hearts and minds of God's people.

It is not unusual for us to encounter opposing viewpoints in our lives, in our churches, and certainly in our government. Recently the Province of Ontario told churches they could reopen with safety measures in this pandemic time. Like Jeremiah and his yoke, many churches are deciding to stay bound by pandemic protocols that tell us the safest place for us is at home, and leaving their buildings closed. Others are reopening, offering services and gathering (we hope safely) for worship. Which choice is the one that follows God's way? Which decisions are the 'right' ones?

How are YOU feeling about Applewood United's decision to remain closed for at least the summer, and perhaps longer?

While Jeremiah's story here definitely warns us about our desires to follow what we 'hope' is true, what we long for, what we want to be rather than what is God's course of action, no two situations are ever exactly the same. The 'church' is not simply our buildings, nor is it our ability to gather physically. We are not under attack from another nation, but by a microorganism that has no consciousness or plan. Our prophets may wear business suits, or sweat pants and hoodies, and their messages can be confusing.

The 'right' decisions in our time – I believe – are the ones that lead us to truly care for one another, and to seek to deepen our relationship with God. Will opening church buildings allow us to feed more hungry? Or house more homeless? Or do more justice? Will gathering together grow our relationship with God? The 'right' decisions come when we ask pointed questions, but also allow the space for God to be included in the answers. The 'right' decisions come when we allow ourselves to discern prayerfully, humbly, and with God's help. The 'right' decisions might not be the popular ones, the easy ones, the less painful ones.

That's what Jeremiah can still teach us today, that there are times when God's voice is not easy to hear, because that is not what we want. That is what Jesus continues to teach us today – God's way can be surprising, can set us in unexpected directions, can bring a peace that can be held in the heart when everything around seems changed or chaotic.

May it be so.
