Rev. Joanne's Reflection Living Connections

I do love grapes — in bunches, in jelly or jam, in juice. Indeed grape jelly reminds me of my own childhood and family, as much as the taste of Welch's grape juice reminds me of the many faith families with whom I have shared communion over the years. When we first moved to Mississauga, a grape vine had been planted along the fence in our back yard, and was a source of food not only for our family, but the birds who called that space home. Grapes were abundant and a staple in Jesus' time, were eaten fresh but also dried as raisins for storage, were used to create a thickened juice used for sweetening that was called 'grape honey', and of course for wine.

The grapevine would have been an extremely common sight for those who followed Jesus. Many would know how to grow and prune their own grapevines, would know the satisfaction of a good harvest, and would understand the relationship between the strong vine and the branches bearing fruit. It was and is a living connection, and I believe it would have been particularly significant for those followers to hear Jesus speak of himself as the vine, and themselves as branches – turning the everyday into the sacred.

This living and loving connection between ourselves and God in Christ, between ourselves and one another, is good to remember and to celebrate on this Christian Family Sunday. Like the vine and the branches those connections we have are alive- not only physically but also emotionally and spiritually. Like the strength and the source of life that we find in Jesus our sacred Vine, our bonds as faith family can also give us strength and life, and help us to produce the fruit of compassion, of justice, of faith and of compassionate care for one another.

We are intimately linked, Jesus tells us, able to flourish because we are connected to the Source. But how do we keep that connection? How do we remain healthy and fruitful? Like any growing thing, we need energy, we need light, we need water – and we even need times of darkness and rest. We could find energy in the virtual time we share together, and light in the words of scripture or in the words of others lifted in prayer. We might find our source of water-particularly the living variety – as we worship together. Rest may come in a time of quiet prayer or contemplation, or in the silence after listening to a moving or inspirational piece of music – it is a time when we allow ourselves to feel God's presence fully.

May you celebrate your connections today – with faith family, with chosen family, with the families that raised us and shaped us. May you feel those connections even at a distance, even separated by time and space. May you know that we are supported, strengthened, and given life and vitality by our one true vine Jesus the Christ. Amen
