Reflection "Giving All You Have"

At first glance, this scripture assigned for the first Sunday of November doesn't seem to relate to Remembrance Sunday at all. Jesus' observations of the scribes' behavior and desire to be seen as important, of the crowd's offerings to the temple treasury including large contributions from the rich, and of the widow's gift seem more about stewardship than sacrifice. This is not a story of war, we might think, or of the need to stand up to powers that would overwhelm and destroy. No one gives up their life for others in this passage from Mark's gospel.

I think if we take a closer look at what Jesus is really describing here, and consider the social context of the time, we might see that there is a connection to the elements of conflict and war. Reflecting on the consequences of the widow's action, and noting just where in Mark's gospel this story is placed might reveal to us that great sacrifices are given.

First, the system that Jesus describes where the rich and influential feed on the poor and the marginalized, seeking even more power and control, echoes the circumstances that have led to war and conflict in our world throughout time, including the wars commemorated on Remembrance Day. Sadly, what Jesus describes is also the shape of how the Jewish faith was lived out by some. Second, although we often don't focus on this obvious conclusion to the widow's story – she gives not just coins, but her life. Without protection, without a means to feed or care for herself in a society that does not perhaps even see her, she will not live. Jesus points out that she has indeed given all – given to a faith she followed, ironically supporting the symbol of her faith that was supposed to care for her. Jesus, too, just four days after 'seeing' the scribes, the wealthy and the widow, will give his own life at Golgotha.

As we remember today, as we think about those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for us, perhaps we can also remember what Jesus said about the widow. He does not lift her up as a model for giving or for living; he does not tell the disciples that they must do as she has done. Jesus simply sees her, perhaps as others have not, and acknowledges her great gift and her sacrifice. That is what we are about in our remembrance worship today – to perhaps really 'see' those men and women who have given all they had, and to acknowledge their great gift.

We might also contemplate whether or not we truly see the widows in our midst, those whom the system fails, those who are vulnerable and yet still giving. I recently heard about a neighbourhood in Indianapolis where the average income per household was \$25,00 annually, and yet in that same 10 block area at least \$75,000 annually was given from these households to those who were in need. These were hidden gifts, until one church decided to ask questions, and to build relationships with people in this low-income area. Our own veterans, many wounded in spirit and mind if not is body, are often lost to our view, not well supported by government programs, and yet continue to give to one another and to their communities.

When we do not see the vulnerable ones, if our attention is drawn only to those with power or influence or money, we will not be able to bring change. If we will not see or understand sacrifice, we miss part of Jesus' story and the stories of those who have given all they had. God calls us to notice, God calls us to

acknowledge, God calls us to honour what is given. More than that, I believe that we are called to work diligently so that no sacrifice is ever needed again.

We celebrate communion today, our act of sharing and acknowledging what has been given for and to us. May our faith-family meal open our eyes to truly see, fill us with gratitude and move us to act to bring God's love and peace to all.
