Scripture Psalm 96

O sing to the Lord a new song;
sing to the Lord, all the earth.
Sing to the Lord, bless God's name;
tell of God's salvation from day to day.
Declare God's glory among the nations,
God's marvellous works among all the peoples.

For great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; Our God is to be revered above all gods. For all the gods of the peoples are idols, but the Lord made the heavens. Honour and majesty are before God; strength and beauty are in God's sanctuary.

Ascribe to the Lord, O families of the peoples, ascribe to the Lord glory and strength.

Ascribe to the Lord the glory due God's name; bring an offering, and come into God's courts.

Worship the Lord in holy splendour; tremble before God, all the earth.

Say among the nations, 'God is the ruler of all!

The world is firmly established; it shall never be moved.
God will judge the peoples with equity.'

Let the heavens be glad, and let the earth rejoice;
let the sea roar, and all that fills it;
let the field exult, and everything in it.

Then shall all the trees of the forest sing for joy before the Lord; for God is coming, for God is coming to judge the earth.

God will judge the world with righteousness, and the peoples with God's truth.

Reflection

"Sing a new song to God!" declares the psalmist in this powerful and positive hymn of praise and exultation. "Sing to the Lord – bless God's name!"

I think it was certainly easier to think about singing new songs to God before we were isolated in our homes. It was simpler to imagine new ways to praise God when we could actually sing together, joining our voices and our energy in worship. Singing to God can feel problematic when we are alone, when we don't have the breath of others around us to help to lift our own voices, hearts, and our own praise. The "strength and beauty" of the sanctuary of God that this psalmist writes about can remind us of our own church space, and perhaps bring feelings of loneliness or longing for the time before the pandemic.

Yet I believe we can still find new songs, new ways to praise in these times. The fact that you are reading this Worship at Home is an example of a 'new song'; our podcasts are new songs as well. Looking out our windows at God's world – with a small prayer of thanks – can be a new song to God, as can a moment spent in prayer for another. We may not feel like shouting our praise, we may feel self-conscious about singing alone, or in the homes we share with others, but God is still great, and we as God's people are still called to moments of praise.

Praising God in a new way, with a new song, could be writing down one word of praise or thanks each day – and reading them all once a week or once a month. Our praise might be talking to those in our households, or someone on the phone, or over an email, about one of those words, or one of the things for which we thank God.



How might you offer a new way of praising God in these times? Have you started any practices like journaling, reading scripture or other faith-based writings?

One of the themes of this psalm is not only God's greatness, but God's enduring presence with us. It is a reminder that God's people have been declaring these truths for thousands of years. Yes, we are living in unprecedented times when so much seems to be changing around us. Yes, we are not able to worship in the ways we have known and perhaps loved. Yes, we are distant from church community and sometimes from our families, but the earth still rejoices with God's goodness, the seas roar and the trees of the forest sing for joy. Can we do the same? Can we find a flicker of joy? A new note to sing if not a whole song?

May God be with you as you find your own ways to sing and praise – in new and changing ways.

Your creation, too, bears the burdens of our use and abuse. So we pray for our earth, and for those who make decisions that affect fragile ecosystems and our climate. We pray for a world still in the grips of a pandemic, and for the lives it has changed and is changing. We remember and pray for the vulnerable ones, the burdened ones, and ask that you lead us and teach us in ways that will bring healing, wholeness and your peace to the world.

O God, we lift our hearts to you ...
