## **Introduction to Creation Time** *from https://seasonofcreation.org/*

The theme for 2022 is: Listen to the Voice of Creation. During the COVID-19 pandemic, many of us have become familiar with the concept of being muted during virtual conversations. Often, people using a platform do not have the capacity to unmute themselves. Even more do not even have access to digital

platforms, and so their voices are never heard. Many voices are muted in public discourse around climate change and the ethics of Earth-keeping. These are the voices of those who suffer the impacts of climate change. These are the voices of those who hold generational wisdom about how to live gratefully within the limits of the land. These are the voices of a diminishing diversity of morethanhuman species. It is the voice of the Earth. The 2022 Season of Creation theme raises awareness of our need to listen to the voice of all creation.

The burning bush is the Symbol for the Season of Creation 2022. We invite you to use the symbol during your events. Today, the prevalence of unnatural fires are a sign of the devastating effects that climate change has on the most vulnerable of our planet. Human greed, desertification and land misuse lead to the disintegration of ecosystems, the destruction of habitats, and the loss of livelihoods and species at an alarming rate. Creation cries out as forests crackle, animals flee, and people are forced to migrate due to the fires of injustice that we have caused. On the contrary, the fire that called to Moses as he tended the flock on Mt. Horeb did not consume or destroy the bush. This was a flame of the Spirit that revealed God's life sustaining presence. This holy fire affirmed that God heard the cries of all who suffered, and promised to be with us as we followed faithfully to deliverance from injustice. During the Season of Creation, this symbol calls us to listen to the voice of creation, and faithfully respond through worship, repentance and action. Moses was told to remove his sandals, for he was standing on holy ground in God's presence. May this symbol move us to remove the "sandals" of our unsustainable lifestyles that disconnect us from creation and our Creator, contemplate our connection to the holy ground where we live, and listen for the voice of creation.

#### Rev. Joanne's Reflection

We've designated this Sunday as a "welcome back" time for our community, an opportunity to mark the return to some of our pre-pandemic practices and our return from a summer break from worship as a community. Our hope was that we today we might celebrate finding renewed energy and purpose together, and inspiration for the work ahead, and that there might be an increase in attendance as folk make their way back to worship in-person or on-line. The scripture assigned for this Sunday from the book of Jeremiah is perhaps not the one we would choose for a welcoming.

Jeremiah was a powerful prophet, and was known for his rich imagery and his own struggle with the message God had for him to share, as well as being persecuted by many because of his prophecies about the coming fall of Jerusalem. The threat of invasion from Babylon was very real as he preached, and we know that Jeremiah lived through that fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of Solomon's temple, and the exile to Babylon. Today's passage comes from a early point in Jeremiah's life as a

prophet of God, and The Inclusive Bible uses somewhat gentler language than the NRSV, but these can still be hard words for us to hear -

"My people are fools –
they don't even know me," says YHWH.
"They are spoiled children –
they do not understand.
They are clever only in crime –
they know nothing of goodness."

Eventually, God reveals through Jeremiah that there will be a new covenant between God and God's people – one that will be written on their hearts, but here we are given an image of a God angry with those who have fallen away from relationship with the Holy One. This passage continues with a bleak picture of creation, seen as God's punishment in Jeremiah's vision, almost a reversal of the creation story we know so well:

I looked on the earth, and lo, it was waste and void; and to the heavens, and they had no light.
I looked, and lo, there was no one at all, and all the birds of the air had fled.

On this first Sunday of the Season of Creation, Jeremiah's words may seem to describe the earth's climate and environmental crisis - resulting not from God's punishment but as the inevitable result of the way we have treated the planet over many generations. We *have* been foolish in many ways, and disconnected from God and from creation, and clever mostly in finding ways to satisfy our wants and desires.

How can we find welcome and inspiration in these words that seem full of condemnation and punishment? Where is the loving and forgiving God that we have come to know in Jesus?

In just a few words from this scripture, I think we can find hope and purpose. Here is what God says, writes Jeremiah, "yet I will not make a full end."

There is always another chance with God, always a "welcome back" when we are wandering in spirit, always an opportunity to find renewed life after what seems like a devastating time – like a pandemic – when the world seemed bleak. There is also always an opportunity to repent – not a word we use often, perhaps not a practice we follow often, but honestly and earnestly naming our mistakes and errors, whether in word, action or thought, and working to address those same mistakes can bring us back into right relationship with God.

Jesus uses the word 'sinner' to describe those who have become distant from God, like the sheep who wandered away from the shepherd, or the coin that has rolled away from the woman. We are 'sinners' when we lose our connection to the Holy Source, the Creator, to God. We can become lost – our horizons can seem darkened, our choices perhaps become self-serving. We cannot feel the welcome of God's inclusive love.

We can also be "found" by God – like the sheep or the coins found by those for whom they had value, just as God values us. Found by and in community, found in a quiet moment when we offer to God our prayers and our contemplations on our actions and ways of thinking, found when we reach out in just and loving action, found when we acknowledge that WE value our relationship with God.

There will be rejoicing, Jesus tells us – the very inhabitants of heaven will celebrate when we return to God's love and re-establish connection. There will the shouts of angels when we commit to correcting our mistakes – when we act on the recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, when we change our actions in order to care for a bruised planet and vulnerable ecosystems, when we decide that there is still more we can do to provide a safer space for our siblings from the 2SLGBTQ+ margins, when we speak only with kindness and respect for others.

So welcome back – to our flawed but beloved community. Welcome back to our virtual space or our inperson space, welcome back to work, and sometimes making mistakes, and seeking connection with the Divine as we seek connection with each other. Who knows what we may find together!
