Territorial Acknowledgment and Announcements

We acknowledge that the land on which we gather is situated upon traditional territories of the Erie, Neutral, Huron - Wyandot, the Haudenosaunee and later the Mississauga of the Credit First Nations. The territory is mutually covered by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, an agreement between the Iroquois Confederacy and the Ojibway and other allied nations to peaceably share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes.

Today, this remains the home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island and we are grateful to have the opportunity to work in their community, and to share and respect Mother Earth.

James 5:13-20 The Message

Are you hurting? Pray. Do you feel great? Sing. Are you sick? Call the church leaders together to pray and anoint you with oil in the name of the Master. Believing-prayer will heal you, and Jesus will put you on your feet. And if you've sinned, you'll be forgiven—healed inside and out.

Make this your common practice: Confess your sins to each other and pray for each other so that you can live together whole and healed. The prayer of a person living right with God is something powerful to be reckoned with. Reflection "Giving to Get"

When Aron Ralston was 27 years old, while he was canyoneering alone in a remote area of Utah, he became trapped when a boulder dislodged and pinned his right hand. After days of contemplation, it became clear to Ralston that the only way he could live was to amputate the trapped portion of his arm. He survived the ordeal, and his story became a sensation. His own memoir of that time remains on best-seller lists in some countries, and the movie 127 Hours that told his story was nominated for six Oscars. Perhaps you have heard of Ralston, or even seen the movie. It is a harrowing and gruesome tale that certainly captures our attention and interest – the story of a man that had to cut away a part of himself in order to live. I was reminded of Aron's story after reading the assigned gospel from Mark.

In that gospel reading for today, Jesus captures our attention and perhaps our interest as he uses language that is described by some of the scripture commentators I read as "gruesome" and "offensive" as he details the various ways we could cut off or tear out parts of ourselves in order to for us to live in

close relationship with God and in God's realm. We must give to get – sometimes giving up what we may think is necessary or vital in order for us to get life in full relationship to God, while allowing others who may think or worship differently to find their own path to faith and to the One God sent.

These images are violent and disturbing, and I would say often avoided by progressive preachers like me. Where is the Jesus from last week's Mark passage, drawing a child into his teaching circle? Where is the Jesus who uses the gentle imagery of mustard seeds, lilies, shepherds and farm labour to describe God's realm and God's way for us?

I believe that when we encounter Jesus' use of these vivid and disquieting directions in scripture, we are seeing the importance that our welcome and support for all those who are seeking God's way is for him, and should be for us. Jesus has just admonished the disciples for wanting to discount the good works done by another who is not part of their group. "Whoever is not against us is for us," Jesus says – and then reminds the disciples sharply that they have a responsibility to create a clear path for those who seek to know God in Christ. If they get in the way of those who seek, if their own actions or words create barriers for others, they risk separation from God that is like an unquenchable burning. They should, directs Jesus, examine their own lives and practices and eliminate whatever may stand in the way of encouraging and welcoming all who are searching for God – whatever the cost. Ultimately, Jesus tells them, they should be at peace with one another, and enhance their communities as precious and costly salt would enhance their lives and food.

In strong words and images, Jesus reminds the disciples – and us – that as followers of Jesus and children of God we are to be open and accepting, welcoming and supportive to all. To fail in that task, to remain a closed community where some are excluded or prevented from continuing on their path of faith and the abundant life God wants for all, can put us out of right relationship with God.

In this season of Creation, we celebrate that we are also in relationship with all that lives and breathes and grows and supports. Rocks, trees, creatures, water, air – all are part of the earth family, to be served and cared for by humankind, for they are part of "all my relations" as our United Church crest states. Perhaps, as we continue to ponder these scriptures, we could expand Jesus' term "these little ones" to include our siblings in creation. And as we do that, we could perhaps also ponder what needs to be removed or changed from our lives and our community in order to allow all people – and all our relations - to live and flourish?

I think we can become trapped in our own canyons of self-interest or self-importance when it comes to our care for the earth. Surely humanity is more important than animals, we think – so we continue to hunt for sport rather than sustenance and still use animals in experimentation. Surely our desire to travel easily and quickly is more important than clean air or the earth's resources, we seem to believe – so we continue using and burning fossil fuels. Surely our cravings for more things, for possessions, and the newest gadget or version is more important than maintaining habitats, protecting water sources, or combating the reality of climate change.

Could we cut off our dependence on fossil fuels to give life and health to our planet? Could we choose to drive less, take transit, or buy an electric car? Could we give up our vehicles?

Could we rip up our vacation plans so that we use less fuel to travel, or when we do travel choose ecofriendly hotels, locations or activities? Could we chop off complacency and demand to know where our grocery stores source their produce, and not buy unless it is local and in season, giving up strawberries in January?

Could we cut out ignoring that every day we make decisions that affect the health of all people – all creation, from the soaps we choose and use to wash our hands, to the amount of single-use plastic we purchase and throw away.

What attitudes, what habits, what practices, what choices must we give up – as essential as they may seem – in order to secure a flourishing and thriving future for all the relations who follow us, and the many who also follow Jesus?

Like Aron Ralston, we must each decide what we can live without so that we may truly and completely live. Live with respect in creation, live in full and right relationship with God and one another. It will not always be an easy decision – perhaps it will even be painful or messy or uncomfortable. Ultimately, we may find peace with one another; we may find that our lives are enhanced in ways we had not anticipated.

We can give to get – give up what causes us and others to be thrown from the path of God's love - get a healthier planet, a thriving creation, a community of faith that includes all and works for justice for all.

May it be so.
