III. Nebraska. A. German Conference at Montanelle.

By Mr. J. F. Se-

Guest of Pastor Sennler, and some of the German brethren, I attended the meeting of this earnest body, at Montanelle Neb. April 24. Part of the trip had to be made on top of "a wagon-load of pots," but this detracted none from the pleasure of meeting with these earnest workers, who have the Lord's work in our church very near at heart. The entire afternoon session was occupied in discussing the needs of the Nebraska field, and its wonderful growth. I talked German (such as it was) for an hour, and abused these self-sacrificing laborers of the sympathy of the Board, and its aid to any measurable extent.

It was decided to send at once to the "Borschua" Mission Institute, for three young men to take the new fields now "white unto the harvest."

I have never had greater manifestation of appreciation, than these German brethren showed for this visit. They feel that "the Board of Home Missions must think a great deal of them, to send them the 'Secretary.'

B. ENGLISHLISHCONFERENCENEB.SYNOD.C. BEAT-RICE.D. WEST-POINT.

B. English Conference, Beatrice, Neb.

Wednesday and part of Thursday April 29 and 30, were spent at the English Conference of the Nebraska Synod, at Beatrice. The Conference was largely attended, and though the rain and mud were fearful, the interest was very great. The principal theme was "our great Mission field, and how to occupy it."

As the church papers will, no doubt, have full report of proceedings, I need not dwell upon them here.

C. Beatrice. The Mission at this point is doing well. The walls of the beautiful brick Church-Building are up and ready for the rafters. The attendance at ^{the} services is very good, and the Missionary and Mission have a splendid reputation in the entire community.

D. West Point. Met Rev. Bro. Spiggle at Conference, and was pleased with his epay, his spirit and his views of the work! The corner-stone of the new Chapel - 24 x 40 feet - was laid April 26. The building will be ready for dedication by August 1. The cost will be \$1200.00, one thousand of which have already been subscribed. The people at West-Point appear to be much encouraged.

E.OAK- E. Oakland. Bro. Spiggle reports a debt of \$1200.00 at Oakland, and the renting of the parsonage for sufficient to meet the interest on this debt.

OAKLAND. He thinks the people are "ready to how well" in connection with "Grace Church". I told him to make no arrangements for such Union until he had written the Board. Sekamah must be consulted, and if the people at S. will "come up" on salary, I believe the Union of "Grace" with Oakland will be better than the present Union with Sekamah.

This can probably all be arranged during the visit of the Rev. & Genl Secy.

F.AU- F. Auburn & Stella. Bro. Climmel reports no prep at these points, and also at Morris. A "rumor", however, is prevalent in Nebraska, that he wants to be "the pioneer Missionary in Washington territory". He said nothing to me ~~however~~ of any intention of leaving his present field. I know that he has been in correspondence with several persons in Washington territory, and presume he would accept an appointment to that work. He is a good "Pioneer", and "Builder".

G.HAS- G. Hastings. Danish-Norwegian services are now being held in our church-building at this morning

place, and the German interest are very important. The German Conference have sent for a Pastor for this field, and asked me whether the Board would make an appropriation to aid in his support. I advised the Conference that aid would be granted to a reasonable extent, for any worthy pastor acceptable to the Board.

HASTINGS

The Board of Church Extension have been threatening the sale of the property at Hastings, "because it was not regularly occupied by a Lutheran Pastor". This would be suicidal - a fine piece of business folly. But few towns are growing more rapidly than Hastings, and in very few places is property advancing more rapidly as in this town.

HASTINGS

The building was bought at a very low figure, and is worth much more now than when purchased. Bro. Senter has induced the Board of L.C. W. to "hold off" for awhile, and is raising the interest on the \$625.00 investment, from the Danish-Norwegian Congregation.

It is only a question of a little time, as to our English necessities at Hastings, and only a little question as to the property holding its present value. To dispose of it now would be "penny wise and pound foolish". If I mistake not he had, some time ago, asked B.C.E. not to sell.

H. Kearney. The English Conference^{or rev. synod}, at my request appointed Rev. L. Huber (a most careful man) and Rev. J. N. Sennler (who knows the Kearney people) to go to Kearney and, by visiting all the creditors, ascertain the exact amt. needed to place the beautiful property out of jeopardy.

About \$200.00 are now in the hands of Pres. of D. C. P. and I authorized these brethren to send me amt. needed, in addition to this sum, to cancel pending demands. They are to secure first mortgage for Board of Home Missions, with interest at six per cent. My plan is, by another special appeal to the ministers of the General Synod, or personal endorsement of the Appeal sent out to them, to raise the amt. needed, and thus hold the \$1000. from Mrs. Stork for Denver, or other large city, where it can be used entirely.

Kearney, however, must be saved, even though a part of our trust be loaned to do it. After Prof. Richards warning a faint "Appeal" parent, I am confident the money for Kearney can be raised.

Our appeal however, was arranged before his protest appeared.

Kearney is growing rapidly and substantially, and should even now have one English service each Sunday. In a year or two the church will be an English one. Pastor Nelson of Grand-

Island, will serve Kearney, and is
making himself acceptable to the Danish
Norwegian element. The "Opposition
Church" is, as yet, unfinished, and the
misled leader - Mr. Siemann is dead.
They have a pastor who is accomplishing
but little. "The Wolfman" of Dr. Papenau
continues to stab the General Synod Board
of Home Missions, and ignorantly or wickedly
to lie concerning our Kearney and Siem-
annian work. But for the bad spec-
-tacle it would present to our laity, I

On-route to Saranac.

I arranged for meeting with Church Council and Trustees of N. Platte compensation, for Monday evening April 27.

The meeting was a full one, and the "State of the Church" was fully and freely discussed. These people are very sore over the conduct and treatment of Rev. C. Anderson. He evidently became a "time server" so soon as he took the "land fever". He used our kindness and our means and position to do a worldly business, and of course the church now suffers. The people complain of his lack of visiting, of his "looking after the dollars" &c. e. They declare that he raised the membership to fifty, in order to secure the \$33.33 $\frac{1}{3}$ per month, by putting down names which should never have appeared on the church roll. The actual membership at North Platte is only thirty-one (31) i.e. the membership which can be depended upon. The council feel sure that with efficiency on the part of Pastor A. the membership might ^{now} be far beyond fifty (50) and all might be efficient. I found the dissatisfaction with Mr. Anderson very general and very decided. The field is surely a magnificent one, and a true and lar-

Nest Minister will find much to encourage in cultivating it.

The Church-Bancie deemed it best to submit to the congregation the letter of Secretary Blatz concerning Bro. Gottwald's visit, and their paying part of his expenses. I urged them to abolish Bro. G's visit, and advised them the burden would not be great, as excursion rates can be secured from Pitts-burgh to Chicago, and half-rate from Chicago to North-Platte and return.

I will send Bro. G. the tickets, c. e. the orders for them this week, and hope also the word from the congregation will be favorable. They were to discuss the matter on the third day of May, at which time Rev. Mr. Gearhardt was to occupy the pulpit. I have no doubt the letter of Bro. G. and my visit have put an end to any idea of calling him, but believe also that he will persist in thrusting himself upon them. I tried to make plain to them the fact that he would be a very heavy investment, even though he offered to "preach for what they can raise". I told them the town was too important to be trifled with, and that the Board would rather increase the appropriation, if need be, for a good man, than to decrease it and put an inferior man - "half farmer and half preacher".

into the field. The town is growing rapidly, and the emigration to the whole country "round about" is simply wonderful.

Fifteen families of German Lutherans from Cleveland, O. reached there in April, and fifteen more are on the way. If Bro. Gottrall could use the German language, he could secure most of these people to the English Church.

I urged upon the Conference of Neb. Synod, to have Rev. Wm Rosensteel visit Mr. Platte and give these people an occasional service, preaching also in English while there. I did not see Pastor Anderson. I felt it due to him to write him of my coming, and told him when I came to his Sydney, his present residence. He was not there, though he kindly sent his son to depot for us, and his wife had a nice dinner prepared. He was also absent on our return from Saratoga, but had the same arrangement for dinner at his house. He is busy building and selling land at Potter, which may more to some people an "Andersonville".

I am sorely grieved and disappointed in Charles Anderson, and think the time has fully come for the General Synod to drop him entirely and emphatically.

Our people at Mr. Platte are considering plans for building, and in every way manifest a deep interest as to the future of our work.

I had one full morning, and part of another day with Pastor Hansen, and discussed his field and the management of it. I think he is a thoroughly good man - earnest and conscientious, but not as prudent in some respects as he might be. His readiness and inclination are to "scatter" too much, instead of working up and developing what he has already organized. I told him very decidedly that he must work up Fort-Collins and Pueblo, and not attempt to "go everywhere". Often coming in conflict with Augustana now & so. I declined to secure him a free pass, as that would give him greater opportunity to "run about"; and declined also, because I feared the privilege afforded him, might be abused to our cause injured. We cannot risk either asking too much of R. Road officials, or asking favors for those who might not properly represent us. Pastor Hansen will have enough to do, if he will faithfully work up the Danish-Norwegian work in Denver, Pueblo and Fort-Collins. The Augustana people have virtually given over Pueblo and Ft. Collins to Pastor Hansen, and we better confine him, for the present, to these points. In all this Mr. Heilman, and Pastor Hansen's wife agree with me, as also does Dr. Heiser.

I might add to that report the very interesting statement, that the following papers are subscribed for and paid for, by the first Lutheran congregation ever organized in Wyoming territory - viz. Trinity Evan.
