The Board of Home Missions will please accept my assurances of gratitude and appreciation for re-election to the office of Western Secretary. As the attack at General Synod was made on both Board and Secretaries, the reappointment of the Board, without a dissenting vote, was an endorsement not alone of their work and policy, but also of those selected by them as their representatives in the field. Indeed the opposition was confined to a very small circle, and that opposition, in nearly every case, based on some personal disappointment.

Whilst I cannot promise any more hours per day to the great work, neither any more labor in these hours, I can assure the Board of the same attention to the interests of Home Missions as in the past, and of my desire for greater results from the same efforts, because of larger and enlarging experience. My heart desire and prayer to God is that the years upon which we have entered may be noted ones in the history of the General Synod.

Some days were spent with the brethren of this Synod, and three sermons and four addresses delivered.

Though improvement comes slowly in this territory, it is manifest, and could we but fill the vacancies with the

Rigat kind of ministers, a great work
can be done in the bounds of this Synod.

During the year two new churches
quite modern in architecture have been
built and paid for, and a third one
is now in course of re-building. One
of the new churches takes the place of
the house of worship where Synod met
during my first visit in 1872, which
had in it a hollow square Amens bench
instead of the communion rail and altar.

The Pastor and "Men-Singers and Wo-
men Singers" and "Aids to the Mourners",
occupied the inside of the square, and
the "Amens" and "Mourners" the outside.

That church, in 1872, reported a great
sermon - 150 souls added to the Kingdom,
and one dollar and fifty cents for Missions.

All this is now changed. One or
two of the congregations have made up their
appointment. Two M. & W. C. M.
Societies have been organized, and a third
one about to be manufactured. The Order
of Service is used in several of the churches.
\$30 envelopes have been ordered for Chil-
dren's Home Mission Day, and prayer is
being made to the Lord of the harvest for
young men for the ministry. There
are, however, a number of vacancies,
and several new posts which ought to
be occupied. There is a disposition
on the part of several of the ministers of
this Synod, to unite the body with the

Synod of Central Illinois. To this end I have been laboring for several years, and would have accomplished the desirable end, but for the unreasonable demands of Central Ills. Synod. The matter will be accomplished by many years and will be a benefit to the territory of both bodies.

Without doubt, we have a field in this section of Illinois, and one worthy of better cultivation. It has been a "front district", and a front district located in "Egypt", but as there is improvement in schools, farms, farming & the people are "coming up", and the church must keep pace with other improvements. It has not been doing this because the ministry has not been of the right type. That we have an abundance of material here, will appear from the fact that over 1200 people attended services on Sunday morning Sept. 25th, and more than one half of these were young men and maidens, and all adherents of the Sutheran or German Reformed Churches. The services commenced at half past nine A. M. and closed at five P. M. with an intermission of one hour for lunch in the fore. If time permitted, a Missionary visitation to the territory would accomplish great results.

Pastors and people need information as well as a general and kindly "stringing up" from the territory of the Synod

1. ANNA.

1. Anna. Union Co. asks aid to the extent of two hundred dollars, for a year. I met with the Church Council and told them I could give them no encouragement whatever, as our treasury is empty. I enclose their petition marked A. If at all possible, I suggest an appropriation of one hundred and fifty dollars to this field. The members have one vote, and the church at Anna will be strengthened by remonstrances from the country churches in the immediate neighborhood. It will help our work in all that section, and through our the Synod, if Anna can be aided.

2. MURPHYSBORO.

2. Murphysboro. The new Pastor for this field - Rev. W. Petrea, was not at Synod, but expected to enter upon his Duties, October 1st. He is now, I learn, at work, well pleased, and thus far, giving good satisfaction. I have urged upon the people at all, to make an extra effort for Pastors support and benevolence, and if Rev. Mr. Petrea is all that he is represented, there will be "a coming up" on the part of this conference.

B. Synod of Northern Illinois. A ride of thirty one hours from Synod of Southern Illinois near Anna, brought me to Synod of Northern Illinois at Sena, Ills. One

full day and evening were given to this synod, and some Missions and Church Extension fully discussed before the synod in the afternoon, and before a crowded audience at night.

The synod was well attended, and the spirit good, concerning

I. Freeport, a special committee was appointed to make a thorough investigation of everything pertaining to the building of the church, indebtedness etc. This action was taken by request of Wm. A. & F. M. Soc. R. Com. Committee. To my surprise and regret I have been made a member of this committee by a vote of the synod. A letter from the President - marked B - asks that a date be fixed for a meeting. I have answered that it will not be possible for me to visit Freeport with the committee until after the synods are over, but when through with visits to them, will aid in any way in my power, to get affairs straightened out. As preliminary, I suggested that Rev. Mr. Reeser, prepare and submit a detailed report of receipts and expenditures for church building. At Dena I learned that he claims that he was "appointed agent and committee of the Board of Church Extension to erect and superintend the building of the church, that W. A. & F. M. Soc. com. had nothing to do with it, that Board of Church Ex-

tension had not yet asked him for a statement, and that he did not propose to do the bidding of the women."

How he will act with reference to committee of synod, I do not know.

The Board of Church Extension certainly have asked for this account, and Mr. Theser makes a great mistake in not rendering it. If I must act with this "Committee of investigation", I will insist on their finding out all that can be found out, or going to the very bottom of things; if it takes all winter. The Secy. of Board of Church Extension, should have been on the Committee, instead of the Western Secy. of Home Missions. It is Church Extension, rather than Home Mission work.

2. Rockford. Considerable attention was given the mission at Rockford, and its embarrassed condition because of the debt on church property. A special committee was appointed to report some action for the relief of the compensation, but this committee had not yet reported when I left synod. I suggested an extra effort on the part of the synod, to raise \$1000.00 in addition to apportionment, for the benefit of this mission. If this could be done, and Board of Church Extension add to it a loan of five thousand dollars (\$2000.00) the compensation would be greatly relieved, and the General Synod virtually become

owner of the handsome property. There ought to be something done to make more the future of our General Synod work in this important city. The pastor and delegate stated that the Compensation will make a warranty deed to Board of Church Extension, or General Synod, for the beautiful church property in case the burden of debt could be lifted.

They have promptly met the interest regularly when due, and have kept up the payment of all other expenses.

The delegate and pastor plead for an English Missionary at the earliest possible date, and declared that "an earnest American Suthern pastor could gather a large number of young people in short time." There are now virtually two English Suthern Sunday Schools in Rockford superintended by Compensationist laymen.

One of the schools is that of our own Mission, and the other that of the "Swedish Independent or Free Church".

It is believed that under an English Suthern pastor these schools could be united in our church and the membership largely increased. I am convinced that it would be a great step forward, a wise movement to place an English Suthern pastor of the General Synod in Rockford. We must, we long on this, unless we want to hand over our own young people to other denominations.

C. Synod of Iowa. Session Sena
Ibs. After Missionary Meeting, Wednesday night, the Synod of Iowa, at Dicksburg Iowa, was reached Thursday at 10 A.M. The meeting was a good and earnest one, nearly all the time having been given to Mission and Education work. Considering the vacancies, the small congregations, the early history of the Church in Iowa - the "burnt districts" &c. with which this synod has to contend, its record in the past five years has been a noble and magnificent one. In Generosity it is really the "Gambier Synod." The apportionment has been exceeded, the special \$1000.00 fund for Sing-city completed, and over \$300.00 given for the "Board of Education".

The great burden of all the speeches, sermons and addresses, was the need of a state or district missionary, not so much for new work, as to help the weak, and "strengthen the things which remain". Iowa needs this kind of service more than any other state of synod, and I sincerely wish we could devise some way to give help and relief. We cannot afford to lose Iowa, because of the future. There are thousands of Suthern children of German and Scandinavian parent rapidly becoming English. There is destined to be a "refuge immigration" - a coming from the west into Iowa.

There is yet much valuable and unoccupied land - especially in the Northern part of the state, and this will be taken up by settlers. Synod pleads for \$300.00 to \$400.00 to help sustain a District Missionary. Such Missionary would save us the appropriation to Knoxville now again vacant, thus bringing down the amount. He would also bring up the contributions for missions by regularly supplying the vacant charges until the pastors can be secured for them.

The plan to unite Iowa and Nebraska under Nebraska's State Missionary, would not answer. I have been thinking of uniting the Securing of Church Lots, and the District Mission work in one man. Would that be feasible?

As Mr. Knutze would pay one fourth of his entire salary, and the Board of Church Extension another fourth, our share would be comparatively small, as he would be credited with what might be raised on the field. Will the Board please, carefully consider this plan?

D. Synod of Nebraska.

A journey of 100 miles from Lisbon La. brought me to Synod of Nebraska at Beatrice Neb.

Arriving there Saturday afternoon, I found that nearly everything concerning Home Missions and Education had been postponed until Monday Morning.

The Synod was largely attended, and not very ably managed. The Germans concentrated in Rev. G. H. Schurr Jr. for President, and elected him by one majority over Rev. Adam Stump the choice of the American Pastors and Delegates. The feeling throughout however seemed good. The report of the State Secretary and the Committee

having the dissecting of his work called forth my earnest discription. Rev. Bro. Griffith called attention to the fact that State Secy. had not organized one solitary new congregation, and thought \$1600.00 per year could accomplish greater results in some other direction.

Rev. G. Baird wanted "no interference with his work in his own charge." When he could no longer manage the

affairs of his congregation, he would resign." Robert W. Hildensall answered Bro. Griffith by saying that "State Secy. had not organized New congregations because the Board of Home Missions had forbidden him." This I flatly contradicted by saying that the Board of Home Missions would forgive at the organization of ten congregations a week, provided they were not promised aid from Home Mission Treasury, that organizing congregations and organizing congregations to be aided by the Board of Home Missions were two entirely different things. I kindly, but earnestly protested against such a misrepresentation. Robert W. also asserted that "the officers of the Board - Mrs. C. S. Albert Post, and Mr. J. A. Belk, Secy. had been consulted, and gave their approval, that he went out of his way to go to Baltimore for this purpose, and when there walked through a terrible rain-storm to see the officers of Board &c. &c." I replied that I knew he had so done, but that it was after the Committee had organized, selected the man, fixed the salary and ordered him to work, and not according to the resolution of Synod appointing the Committee. Bro. Deliverer, Chairman of Committee, stood by me in this statement, and we were set right before the Synod. I told the Synod how large a proportion of our funds were

being expended in Nebraska, & showed them the pro-pes in the Home Mission work in their State during the past four years. They acknowledged all this and "had no complaint whatever to make against the Board of Home Missions nor any of its officers".

When objection was made to raising money for salary of State Secy. Bro. Nott. Heidensall told them not to be troubled about that part, that he expected to raise the same amt., or more, for coming year than he had raised for present year &c. &c. Synod resolved to continue State Secy. Rev. L. Huber and passed a series of resolutions looking to work something after the manner of the Y. M. C. A. Bro. Huber goes East this month, and desires to meet with the Boards of Home Missions & Church Extension. I enclose a letter from him, marked D.

2. AUGUSTANA SYNODS PROTEST. The committee appointed by the Nebraska Conference of the Augustana Synod to meet the Synod of Nebraska, and protest against their doing Mission work among the Scandinavians, did not appear, but instead sent their "resolutions".

The Nebraska Synod appointed a committee to meet the Augustana Committee in Omaha, at some date

to be hereafter arranged. I find I have been placed on this committee also, and since this is so, I want to "hold up our end" in the best manner possible, and would therefore like the Board to make deeply to the action or request of the Nebraska Conference. The Board has a copy of the action which to my mind is impertinent, and reflects on the orthodoxy of the General Synod.

As all the Scandinavian work in the Nebraska Synod is our mission work, the protest of Augustana concerns us.

3 Cheyenne. Pastor Beckman was on hand "in full force", but, I think, learned something before the Synod was over. The Ministerium had almost decided to ordain him, but at my suggestion, concluded to "sever his license". He was quite "impudent" for awhile, but "settled down" and accepted the severed license. He confronted me with "promises made by Board of Church Extension, with secy. of that Board taking away the deed and allowing nearly three months to pass without giving them any satisfaction, and then instead of giving them corner lot as promised, offering them the inside lot &c. &c." As I had not heard the "promise of corner lot", I could say I had not heard it, and I was very glad to be able to say so, and glad I was not present when the assurance was given.

There was considerable feeling over this matter, and the following resolution was offered and strongly advocated.

"Resolved that this synod recommend to the Board of Church Extension, that in its treatment of the Nebraska synod, they know of no difference between nationalities where the confederation have adopted the constitution recommended by the Board of Home Missions, and give to the confederation at Cheyenne the same privilege as at other places, where the Board have church lots." This is a copy of the action passed a year ago, only that at that time the Board of Home Missions was included.

The "Special Representative of Bd of Ch. Ex." plead with the synod not to pass this, but as his name was to it one year ago he was soon discomfited. I fought it by showing how unwise it was to ^{hope} pass such a thing a year ago, what trouble it had made us. I asked the German brethren, if it would be right to give the Scandinavians lots in a city, where we might some day need one of them for a German church or so. The resolution was defeated, and by the wise help of Bro. Huler, one adopted telling the church at Cheyenne to accept the inside lot and be satisfied. It is never safe to make a promise or hold out an inducement to expect something from the boards, unless it is very certain to be made good. The se case of the purchase of lots in North-Platte,

the refusing of additional aid to Cheyenne
and the change of promises from donations
to loans at Pueblo and South Slump-City
did not help any in the Cheyenne matter.

Bp. Beckman was advised to go home
and "by the authority of synod" urge the
compensation to accept the inside lot
and go to work and build a chapel. It
was also suggested that Bp. Sennett ar-
range with Bp. of Ch. Bp. to authorize him
to visit Cheyenne and Pueblo, and aid
in taking subscriptions etc.

It is more and more evident
every day, that there will be ^{no} final peace
on this "Carhns lot question" until
the Board of Church Extension farms also
into control and ownership of every re-
maining piece of property, by sending
a representative to Boston and securing
warranty deeds by purchase or otherwise.

This I have said for six years, and had
it been done much trouble and money
would have been saved. If the Board had
actual possession, it would be in condition
to say who claimed here the lots, and
who claimed not. I report this fully
because these things concern and trouble
our own Board, and because, being in the
field, I am constantly appealed to with
reference to them.

- cure ^{an} additional loan from the Board of Church Extension, was a severe blow and a great disappointment. Missionary Albright said to me, "I am afraid to tell my people. ~~Now~~ what was said when you were here, we were led to expect that the Board of Church Extension would grant us an additional loan". I fear they will "swamp" us if they receive additional help. The "Wittenberg Addition" marked F - may help them out, as Elright and Albright say "they will give their "profs" towards the church debt." The trouble about this is that the money must be realized before it can be given, and the "goon" is somewhat off. There were some "reflections" or "remarks" made by Bro. Kummel, and others, at synod which raised the ire of Mr. Albright, and the word "liar" passed, and a fight seemed imminent. The combatants were parted in the church vestibule, and then Bro. A. brought charges in a sort of a funeral way, and a committee was appointed - the parties hunkered together, and all things reported "settled".

The Missionary reported to me, that he has "had some excellent additions of new families", that his work is more encouraging etc. That same day, however, I was invited to dinner with one of these "new families", and the gentleman (a book-keeper for a large coal & wood Co.) said, "I was quite mortified a few days after entering upon my duties, to be

asked by my employer, if I could not in some way manage to get from Rev. G. H. Albright a bill of his years standing, for \$40⁰⁰. This is present with me now whenever I hear him preach." He further said: "I have gone to prayer meeting several times this summer, but found the church closed, and no sign of light, de-
tton or pastor." What to suggest I really know not. If the debt was in better shape, and the compensation under no obligations to the missionary, advice could be more easily given. So far as the missionary himself is concerned, he reports encouragement, and says "the outlook was never more promising."

5. Lincoln. Mr. Sipe reports "harmony,"

and the hope of letting the contract for building church not later than October 10th. Whether they have done so or not, I have not learned. When at Lin-
coln in July, I told the missionary that I would, if he desired, spend Sunday Aug.
31st with the Missions, it being the Sunday before Convention of Nebraska Synod.

Never heard any more about it until the 19th of Sept. letter G. The meeting of synod was changed to Sept. 26, and he "thought Sept. 26, would do me as well."

This kind of thoughtfull (?) calculation is what "plays hob" with some of our work. He said "it turned out for the best that it did not suit me to come, as the M.C. Conference was in session

that week, but the fact did not occur to him when he wrote me." I urged pushing the work without any "let-up".

6. Benedict, York Co.

After receiving letter H - knowing the propensity of Mr. G. A. Schurr Sr. to complain and lament and knowing also of the grumblings of the York Co. N.W. people because "the best" and seeds passed by them 1875, I concluded to make a forced march, and attend the corner-stone laying at Benedict. Sept. 18, I left Wichita Ks. Friday night - 16th, and reached York at midnight of the 17th then drove fifteen miles to Benedict, preached afternoon in open air, and night at "Bethel" six miles distant, and at 10 P.M. started for the return drive of 16 miles - reaching York at one o. elk. A.M. and taking train for Chicago (S. Ills. Synod) at 5 A.M. No "hobles on," or could not have made it.

The day was beautiful and large audiences present. About \$100.00 was subscribed at corner-stone laying.

"Benedict" is a new town on the St. Joe and Western Ry. and our church will be the first one erected. The payments are provided for within \$300.00. The church will be ready for dedication by Decem. 1st. With good management this "York County field" can, in a few years be made a strong one.

Bro. Miller talked of having Bro. Schurr called to Yutan, and placing a new man in York Co., but I said "there can now be no vacancy."

7 Kearney. The Missionary - Rev. R. J. Stamer, State Secy. Huber and Rev. Albert Shrader report property at Kearney and much greater interest on the part of the people. I insisted on the ground making good its promise to pay interest on the "Stock" and debts & monies loaned to Kearney. Mr. Geo. Appertiment of \$100.00 now due, and \$100.00 due in Sept. 1889. Past. Huber refers to this matter in his letter marked E - herewith sent. The property at Kearney is reported as increasing in value.

10. BOXES OF CLOTHING.

10 Boxes of Clothing &c. Nearly all our German and Scandinavian Missionaries will need help in the way of clothing &c. &c. the coming winter. I took the list of names and sent them to Mrs. Wilson of W.H. & F.M. Co. Many of our American Pastors will be greatly helped by a "Box", and will appreciate the help.



EXPLANATION.

Wittenberg Addition to Beatrice comprises a beautiful quarter section of land on the east side of the city. Whilst the above plat is not precisely accurate as to scale, it is perfect as to relative positions and numbers of lots and blocks. All east and west streets are 80 feet wide, and all north and south streets are 66 feet wide. All alleys are 20 feet wide, except those in the south tier of blocks, which are 18 feet wide. All lots are the regular size, 50 by 140 feet, except those in the south tier, which are 125 feet long, and except those bordering on the north and east lines of the tract, which are all above the regular size.

This addition is especially fortunate in its location relative to the business part of the city. Court street is the lead-

ing business street, and the business is steadily moving eastward on that street. On one corner of 6th and Court is a model Postoffice building, and on another is being erected one of the finest hotel buildings in the west. Nineteenth street is precisely one mile east of 6th street. Wittenberg addition is destined to become the most popular residence portion of the city.

The construction of a Rapid Transit street car line, as indicated on the plat, will be commenced early next spring and will be completed at the earliest possible moment. This line will connect with the business part of the city, the depots, etc., and will render unusually desirable service to all citizens within its reach. This, with the lines already existing in the city, will make the street car service in Beatrice most helpful, satisfactory and gratifying to the citizens in general, and it will add to the already

enviable popularity of the city.

Beatrice is one of the most beautiful, thrifty and enterprising cities of the west. It is the county seat of Gage county, one of the very best agricultural counties of Nebraska. It contains about 10,000 inhabitants, and promises to become a great mercantile and manufacturing city. Its water works and electric light system are the pride of the people. Its several systems of railways are doing wonderful work for the city. To these more will soon be added. The Blue river flowing through the city furnishes excellent water power. A strong and influential company is now being formed for the further development of the water power and for the aid and encouragement of additional manufacturing institutions. It is becoming a very popular thing to have a home in Beatrice, the "Queen of the Blue."
