Sunday, March 7th was spent in this County, dedicating the new Lutheran church, erected through the instrumentality of Rev. A. B. Shrader of Ponca, and the liberality of Mr. Simon P. Baetzley of that neighborhood. Though this is not a mission, in the sense of receiving an appropriation, it is nevertheless Missionary ground, and appreciates attention & encouragement. There was a threat, on the part of a few Congregationalists, to prevent the dedication of the house as a Lutheran church, but wisdom was given to circumvent them. At Sunday School - 10 A.M. - a paper was handed me, which I refused to take, and suggested that it was probably intended for the pastor and better be given to him. I then told Bro. Shrader to take the paper courteously, put it in his pocket until after service and then read it. He dedicated the church just as they were accepting the sermon, and read the "protest" after the service was altogether concluded. It was then too late to consider the protest. All the money needed - \$650.00 - was raised, so pay my expenses and as a personal gift, they handed me Ten Dollars (\$10.00) but I thought better to send the money to the treasurer, and report it as "one share" on the appeal for \$10,000.00. The Lutheran will. English and German - of the General Synod in this County is done well.

Snyder is working hard, but seems not adapted to "drawing people either to himself or the church". He is a success in raising money and, we long, will have the parsonage free from debt. He is also faithful in Sunday School and Catechetical work. The alienation of Mr. & Mrs. Miller and family, and Mr. Heller & family - the wealthy Germans who, at first, turned with the Mission, was caused by a brother-in-law of Pastor Snyder employed through his instrumentality by Mr. Miller, who turned out to be dishonest, and also attempted to "carry off Mr. Miller's daughter". Mrs. Rhodes thinks these families will, in time, come back to the church especially should there be a change of pastor. She is not clear that there ought to be a change of Missionary, and believes that Bro. Snyder will resign so soon as he has evidence that his work at D. is no longer successful, or that another will accomplish more than he can do.

There is now more religious interest in Davenport than for many years, and our Missionary is taking advantage of it by holding special services. Mrs. Rhodes reports the "Augustana" men from Rock Island very friendly - frequently present and Mrs. Heidner and Olsen preaching our own people.

The Board of Home Missions deserve the credit of this success to a large extent.

When the officers visited Denver in Au-
-gust last, the Missinary was greatly disappointed by the Board of Church Extension's not sending the Amb. ab-
-solutely needed for the lot. So delay
-ed were cost hundreds of Dollars!

The Board of Home Missions came to the rescue. Its promptness and foresight enabled the contract to be made from 33 to fifty percent less than they could possibly have been made ninety days later. "Honors to whom honor!"

The Beautiful new St. Paul's Church at Minneapolis I. C. was dedicated Sunday March 28th, with great joy and rejoicing. Rev. Dr. Leonard preached the dedication sermon, and the Western Secy of Home Missions conducted the liturgic service. The church is one of beauty and convenience and dedicated free of debt.

Though not on our list of Missions, it is really a Mission sustaining itself, and deserves our commendation & sympathy. Rev. W. B. Slidell has labored most faithfully and earnestly, and, at times, amid great discouragement, to accomplish the building of a Lutheran church in Minneapolis. He has succeeded beyond all expectation. The cost of the building was \$3300.00. Minneapolis has now a population of 2500, and is growing rapidly. Our hotel and our pastor stand very high in the estimation of the citizens of the town and surrounding country. A full description of Building & services will, no doubt, be given in Observer, and need not be repeated here.

At the evening service the collection was given on the "Appeal", and supplemented with what was given me for expenses, one & one fourth share.
