To Meeting Held June Seventeenth 1886

II. KEN-TUCKYA. LOUIS--VILLE.SECONDCHURCH.THIRDORNEWMISSION.II. Kentucky. A. Louisville.

Sunday May 16th and Monday May 17th were spent with our churches in this city, and especially in the interest of the New or third mission. The work of the Second church which is still a mission - is doing well, and certainly has bright promise for the future. A Sunday School of nearly three hundred, and a congregation filling the audience room greeted me at this church.

The property has been much improved since the visit of 1885, the debt to Board of Church Extension is being reduced, and the entire work growing in strength, interest and importance.

From the members I learned that Rev. Fennier is sustaining himself well, and giving daily with compensation and community.

The afternoon was given to the Third, or New, church, which, in my judgment, is a field of great interest and importance. The S. Schore numbered 214, and the collection was \$5.67. Pastors Waltz, Fennier Sr., Fennier Jr., and many members of the First and Second churches, were on hand to give encouragement to the new organization, and to pledge to it support. A meeting for organization was held on Monday evening - the constitution suggested

by Board of Home Missions was adopted and twenty-one (21) persons gave their names as members of the new English Lutheran Church of Sonisville Ky. Eighteen (18) of these were from German United Synod of the West-Churches, and three (3) from First Eng. Lutheran Church. Mr. Ringer of 1st Ch. pled for \$500.00 "for himself and a few friends" towards the new church-building. On May 20th the organization was completed by the election of Officers. See letter A herewith sent. The important part of the work now is a pastor. If in the judgment of Mr. Clutz and the brethren who are acquainted with Rev. Schmitz of the Seminary at Es. he has enough culture and vim for City work send him to S. at once. If deemed best to have him spend a few weeks in Sonisville before deciding, I will try to secure him reduced rates. Be sure to send some good man without delay.

The Mission is as promising as any ever undertaken by the Board.

The "Opposition" spoken of by Bro. West, comes from German Pastors and will prove a blessing to the Mission.

A Fourth Mission is advocated by Mr. Waltz, and several prominent members of the 1st Church, on "Broadway extended" a new and elegant

part of the city, two to three miles from the First Church. No doubt of success if a suitable pastor could be placed there.

III. Ohio. A. Springfield.

By request of Rev. S. W. Gotwald D.D. Wednesday and Wednesday night were given Springfield Q. the afternoon to looking at New Mission territory two miles from his new church. the evening to an address to his congregation. A splendid new field opens up to us in S. and the First and Second Churches, with the Professors and Students should occupy it at once. I believe it will be done so soon as the First Church secures a pastor. Occupy!

B. Delaware. On route to Newark Q., I looked in on the Mission and Missionary at this point. I found the Missionary and people a little disengaged because of the small appropriation from Board of Church Extension, but tried to explain to them "the reasons why" &c. and to show them their own ability if trusting in God. The corner-stone of the new edifice has been laid, and the work of building is being pushed.

The field looks like one of much promise in immediate results.

C. Newark. At this Mission a much better state of things exists than I expected to find. There seems to be entire harmony in the congregation and a desire and determined purpose to go forward. The Service - May 20th P.M. was well attended and the singing most excellent. The place of worship has been greatly improved, and is now quite churchly and attractive. Rev. Dr. D. Barclay has left "a few debts" for one or two of the members to pay, and "told a good many lies". Our people seem to keep these things among themselves and they do not injure the work to any great extent in the outside community. Rev. C. W. Sifford of Anna Ohs. preached at the Mission May 30th and has consented to accept a call. I enclose his letter. Marked B. and can endorse every word of it. I suggest that \$400.00 be appropriated for New-Ark Mission - Rev. C. W. Sifford Missionary - for first year of his work.

He will be obliged to preach three (3) times each Sunday, driving 3½ miles to the afternoon appointment. This will enable him to give attention to all the services in town including the S. School. I rejoice in securing so good a man as Rev. C. W. Sifford for the Mission at Newark. Ohio.

III. Kansas. A. Sopella.

Leaving Newark O. at 10.40 P.M.
 May 20th. Sopella, Kansas. 914 miles dis-
 tance was reached at noon of Saturday
 -22nd. The services of Sunday were well
 attended, though on all sides of us were
 "Sabbath attractions". On the North side
 the "Seventh Day Adventist" were holding
 a "big camp-meeting". On the South the
 "big Preacher Garrison", (now a grand-
 father, I believe) was camping on gen-
 erally. To the East the Episcopalians
 were having "a Mission" &c. &c. The
 Lutheran Past was nevertheless held &
 the day was one of encouragement. The
 resignation of Rev. S. J. Domleser was
 "unanimously rejected" and \$200.00 ad-
 ded to his salary. Everything seems
 harmonious, they are having some good
 and valuable receipts to the confirma-
 tion, and are reducing their church
 debt. I talked plainly to the confirmation
 and the church council, and told them
 that though they are doing well, greater
 things are expected of them. I urged
 them to place in the church at once
 a communion railing, and make
 their handsome edifice a little more
 Sutheran. The missionary seems encou-
 aged, and satisfied now that all the mem-
 bers of the church want him. As the
 number at first calling him was small,
 he "desired the reception of later years to
 have a voice in selecting their pastor.

C. Hays-Bethy. Report from this field continue very favorable. I have nothing direct from the missionary, but many cheering words from members and visitors.

D. The growing field. With this report I send a letter marked D from our faithful and excellent pastor at Waterville Kansas, concerning the growing Kansas field, and the need of more aggressive work in occupying it. This is being pressed upon us from all sides and the pressure will grow stronger and stronger every month.

I know of no better man for the Southern Kansas territory or the field he marks out than Rev. Angus Sone himself. He has as much zeal and much more prudence than Missionary Cimme. I ask the serious and careful attention of the Board to this matter, and believe it wise, of Rev. Angus Sone can be secured, to put him in the field at once. I believe he will be obliged to employ this kind of Missionaries in order to keep up with even the Moderate demands of the work.

E. Ottawa. How would Rev. Mr. Ditzler of Ambridge Pa. answer for this Mission? Card enclosed marked E. How about Rev. J. Surand? His letter in Sutherens Observer does not manifest much "fumption", but still he may be a good and suitable man. Has the Board adequate knowledge of either of these men? I do not know their worth.

DIV. Nebraska. A. Western-Head-Quarters.

In accordance with suggestion in letter of Bro. Clubz of May 25th I visited Omaha and selected a most eligible and beautiful spot of ground for western Head-quarters. It is on "Washington" St. a half square from 10th, is 77½ feet front by 157 feet deep. I send map of Omaha showing location, and also letter of Mr. H. Romitz describing it. Letter marked E

Mr. H. Romitz said if Augustus thought the frontage too large, he would make that good, as he wanted the Sutherland house to have sufficient ground. The location is a corner about four squares from New Union Depot and half square from street car line leading to it. Mr. Drefell, one of the oldest members of our church in O., says the 77½ by 157 feet of ground are worth \$3000.00, and at last year's rate of increase will be worth \$5000.00 next year.

E. Tellamah. Oakland, Grace Church.
A batch of correspondence concerning this field is herewith sent. Letter marked J. The action of the conference is also in the hands of Secy. Clift. From Dr. Sime letter marked D - it is evident that he has no desire to accept a call to Tellamah. The action of the conference suggesting a union of "Oakland and Grace" would be well enough if Tellamah and West Point could stand alone. West Point could probably support its pastor for long, with little or no aid from the Board, but Tellamah is as yet not strong enough, by considerable, to stand alone. The natural and proper union is "Oakland and Grace", and if the latter be willing to cut loose from Tellamah, and we can increase the appropriation at Tellamah, the case is a plain one. We might hold and develop the Oakland field, and the only way to do it successfully is to place a pastor in the parsonage at Oakland whose entire time can be given to this and Grace Church. Rev. C. Baird seems ready to "leave the free Rev." and no doubt also to take charge of it. He has done good work in Dakota County. He preaches better than he spells or writes.

F. David City. Visited David City and Rising May 3rd, preaching at the former in the afternoon and the latter at night. Had fine audiences at both places, the hall at David-City being crowded to its utmost capacity. Prof. Weller of the Synod of Nebraska, visited David-City in advance of me, going also to the country districts adjacent. He thinks a sufficient salary can be raised on the ground so as to require only \$300.00 from the Board. I discussed the matter of a Union with Rising, with both Bro. Pugh and Miller, and while Bro. Pugh would be very willing to "design for the sale of the Union", it would really be wrong to have him leave Rising at this time. Bro. Miller opposes this with vehemence, says it would greatly distract the work at Rising &c. &c. Nor will it do, while Schuetz is on the ground, for Bro. Pugh to undertake the David-City field. Bro. S. is sensitive - a little "jealous", a good deal really &c. &c. &c.

From letter handed me, as Train was passing Monday Morning, I judge Bro. Schuetz will leave David-City. From my present knowledge I pity him, and yet scarce know what to do with him. He has worked hard, founded a nice S. School, and the beginning for a Church. Used up his own means &c.

If only he would feel called to farming or something else outside the ministry, it would be a blessing to him, and also to the church. Letter referred to. sent to Secy. Clutzy. I offer the following suggestions.

He must not forget that unless the lots at David City are used by us for Church-Building within eighteen months, they revert to the County.

H. The Nebraska Field - State Supt. etc.

While not at all apologizing for the vehemence of Mr. Aug. Knutze, neither for his strong language during the recent visit of the Committee on Head-quarters, it must be remembered that he has seen so many opportunities slip away from us, so many splendid fields lost by the Lutheran Church and taken by others, as to create a burning desire that these things shall not be repeated. It must be remembered also that his generosity to the Confession at Omaha has been most cruelly and wickedly taken advantage of, and that his plans for making Omaha a Lutheran centre, and a power for the General Synod in the State of Nebraska, have been well nigh thwarted.

At the time of the Omaha Convention eight years ago - the Presbyterians had but one church in Omaha, and now they have five, with a good house and good news-paper. Those eight years were virtually lost to us in Omaha. Mr. Knutze

is an intense man in everything and hence intense with reference to our mission work.

I believe we ought to place several more men in the field as he suggests. But the difficulty is to get the kind of men adapted to that kind of work. Mr. T. might know that we cannot manufacture them. The response for these State or District missionaries grows stronger every day. The western Synods will be full of it the coming autumn, and we must meet it. The Board of Church Extension is, however, as much or more interested than we are, and should take a part in it. Why not, in connection with Bd. Ch. Extension, place Seminaries in Northern Nebraska, and some in S. or Central Kansas, and make a trial of the "lot letting business" in connection with organizing and supplying compensation?

I wish I could be present with you to discuss these features of our work.

Praise the Lord for the awakening on the subject of Home Mission and Missions; and we pray the gifts of Sons and Money may be increased a thousand fold!
