I am going on with the work outside of our own ch. and with those who have already subscribed. If project falls through I can return the money. I have gone too far in these cases to withdraw now without injury. Did you tell A. of Mr. K's plans? You can, I think, tell him with safety.

~~XII~~ XI. Nichita. I have already written you, & sent you Bro. Miller's letter. It is simply deafening that I should have made us such positive promises, and thereby gotten us in this second trouble. Yes, yes - Men wanted, and not "female men" either. ~~XIII~~ XII. I too am doing pastoral work and it seems like old times, and comes quite natural to visit the sick, attend funerals &c. It makes me cross, however, to find so little of plan or arrangement for the care of this Church & and its work. We hear of Bro. H. and his wife, as "having a royal good time", "not coming home until all the hot weather is over" &c. &c. Bro. Graichen comes Saturday - preaches <sup>one sermon</sup> 20 to 30 minutes. goes back to Iowa City Monday A.M. It costs him about half of all he gets for N.A. fare, he is not satisfied and the people are not satisfied. No plan and no arrangement for his entertainment. I am expected to look after all pastoral work, Wednesday night service &c. and beside

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urged to help raise the \$1000.00 for new lot. I get tired doing that which is clearly the duty of others to people here cannot understand why Bro. Kraichen should be brought from Iowa city to preach, and I, at home all the month, a listener. It is sometimes good for us, I guess, to "sit still". You know how it is to be in a church, and not be its pastor. Here, in this capital city of Iowa, we might just as well have a new Church-Building by Pmas, as not but I fear we will not have it. This week I must arrange for securing the needed sum to pay funeral expenses of old Sipprie Weiser. Unless I do it, the doing of it will hang and hang, until nobody remembers the old man or his burial. Glad you are getting paid a little. I would gladly do the work, but chafe a little under the doing of it, and paying for the privilege beside. ~~XXXX~~ When you write Bro. Albert tell him not to forget to furnish me with the paper

to "Augustana" fellows, in time for Synod of Nebraska.  
-11a. ~~XXXX~~. Letters from Dr. Rhodes. "L & M". He seems  
to be "waxed up" considerably, as well as burdened  
with the great responsibility upon us. He has  
much personal sorrow too. He opened his heart  
to me on Wednesday last, and told me of his fears  
concerning his only remaining eye. There is danger  
of his losing his sight. He asked me to pray for  
him, that the calamity may be averted. His  
daughter - Marion - (not the one who was lost) is also  
quite delicate. She is from home under treatment, in  
hope that she will be able to be married in October.

Dr. R. seems greatly changed towards me, and has  
everything good and kind to say of you & Albert.  
Perhaps Rice's criticism to Lermer, and our talk to  
R. did good. do not speak of above to outsiders.

### XXV. Board of Education, burdens me.

He must have some money at once. It was very  
wrong for Genl Synod to impose upon us such a  
work, and then refuse to apportion the amount he  
need. You must write an article on our appeal.  
It is not a sectional or local work, but a work  
for the whole Church. No such opportunities were  
ever given us. Everything is in readiness - the school  
will be opened Sept. 15<sup>th</sup>, but the case and anxiety  
are tremendous. I feel the burden more and more.  
I believe you can have the Presidency of New College,  
or Genl Secy. ship of Bd. of Education, by unanimous  
vote of board if you want it, or if known that

you need at all. Consider it. We have several very fine offers for Academy, and want to prefer that work. The Church must give us the money.

Nor am I quite sure about his being the man for Atchison. I would rather see him go to Wichita if he intends leaving here. My fear is that he will not come west at all, but that his eyes are on Baltimore. This was one of the matters "arranged", if I am correctly informed. Bro. Schell thinking him just the man for St. Pauls of Baltimore. 2. The Omaha House.

I will do what I can on this important mat-  
ter without interfering with any special effort  
he may want to make on some missions. You  
need not write to or see Mr. K. as I think I  
can fix up matters with him. 3. Melita,  
I enclose a letter from Bro. Miller, marked A,  
which I have answered very fully, expressing  
regret at my inability to come at this time,  
for a month's work, on account of the sprouts.  
I offered to visit them Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> and  
15<sup>th</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup>, or if I can be released from en-  
gagement at Atchison, <sup>will visit them</sup> Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup> to 12<sup>th</sup> and  
16<sup>th</sup> to 22<sup>nd</sup>. Also told them Board would give  
them my services, during month of November,  
if they will only hold on, and not be discouraged.  
Told Bro. Miller to write me or you promptly the reply  
of Bro. S. Miller. Also had enclosed marked A. 1 from  
Bro. Sank. On receipt of yours of 19<sup>th</sup> I wrote  
Bauskin, copy of letter A. 2, enclosed. I also  
wrote Bro. Miller, that if they would excuse some  
place, no matter how humble, for the holding  
of our our services, he would see to it that they  
had services by good preachers every two weeks or  
so, and that they then could have visits from min-  
isters who might want to examine the field  
with a view to undertaking the work. Letter from  
Rev. Sumner A. 3. What do you know of him?

would he do? I wrote him that at this time they  
were in correspondence with others, and that if  
he is doing so remarkably well at Seipsie, he had  
better remain there &c. &c. Crans would be a

he be moved? So soon as I hear from Gauslin  
and Sumner, will write you, and then let us

Michita? See letter A. H. Zimmermann's per-  
formance - accepting and declining "hobnobbing"  
is dreadful and abominable. It has given Pinsky,  
Commer and others a handle. It is too bad, but  
I pray that the Master may over-rule for his glory.

Have a long letter from Suther Garner,  
which I will not send you, until I have answered  
it, and can send my answer with it. I will not  
answer it either, for a little while. I have  
written Gauslin, as I note above, hoping that he  
will use his manuscript, or read it up closely,  
well. I have said all I can now say on "Michita".

11. I think Bro. Ch. W. should have taken Schofield's

letter, and made some inquiry about it. I must do something with it, & think I will send it to Miller. It is clearly Church Extension interests.

12. Bro. Geiger's Church is being re-built, but I agree with you that "the loan fund" is being made too much of, and the donation too little. They cannot pay \$1000.00 back to the Board, and it ought not be asked of them. Where <sup>are</sup> the \$12.00 per year subscriptions on appeal for these new churches?

13. Gaughen's letter on Denver. All right for you to keep it for Board. I have not written B, as yet. I will do my utmost to investigate Denver, though I cannot credit the reports in B's letter. Still you I have been somewhat disappointed in H's success at Denver, but knowing, as his few know, the difficulties of that field, I have made all allowance.

14. South Sioux City. I am glad we have kept South all along the line, and have made good our promises. Letter from Board - D -. You need not return to me, as I will not be "imbalanced" without it.

15. Sioux City. I agree with you that we have done about all we can do. I will keep at it through Iowa Synod's committee of which I am not a member.

16. Southern Kansas. I enclose recent letters from Bros. Hush and Henry. Oh, b. must I write Cedarvale: "no hope for help" - no money. Have not done so as yet. You know we promised help to Cedarvale as one of the S. Kansas points, and calculated on \$800.00 to \$1000.00 for the General or District Missionary for Southern Kansas. I do not agree

with Hursh about Rev. Warton, but will write to  
him to give me names at Winton, prospects at  
Winfield &c. &c. From what you saw of Warton's  
appearance, I guess there is not much hope of our  
being able to use him. Yes, they have had a terri-  
-ble hard season in Sumner Co! It is really  
distressing. It is the same in a large portion  
of Iowa & Illinois, and a small part of Nebraska.  
It will have its effect on our Home Missions work.  
Letters marked E. 17. Oakland, Selmanah &c.

Though we cannot but  
be interested in these places, they are no longer  
missions, and we perhaps, better hand them  
over to Nebraska Synod. I have written Secy.  
Huler, and enclose his reply marked F. As to  
Bro. Gearhart, I fear only Robt. Hansen, and no  
others, want him back. If Robt. H. could be  
paid what is due him on Parsonage, and he get  
his hand or grip off the people, which is on them  
because of the debt Gearhart made, there would  
be no trouble at Oakland. If they want him back  
at Oakland, and will pay him, I have no objec-  
-tions. Yes. G's letter is a good one, that is shows  
a good spirit, but I do not believe any charge  
in Nebraska Synod would call him, excepting  
Robt. Hansen. With you, I am willing to try him,  
but with some "doubts and fears." I do not believe
