The President's Report was pronounced a very able document both as to literary merit and ministerial acts - the committee of which Rev. The Women's W. F. M. Society has also done a splendid work during the year. They have now assumed the entire support of Miss Ritter-one of their own number-for the year, the money having been raised at their Anniversary meeting - October 25th -.

The whole Amt. \$ 500.00, was subscribed in about one hour, through the splendid leading and management of Mrs. Isot-Wald, Gromer, Settnan, Dre, Hartcock, and notably Rev. S. F. Dombleser-Bowers, and indeed every member, or nearly every member of the Synod of Kansas W. F. M. Soc., and many members in the church at Lawrence. This

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for the African Mission Steamboat & succeeded admirably - over \$110.00 having been subscribed. By the time we reached Home Missions Friday night the money "in sight and available" was too scarce for any special effort, and therefore we took a basket collection & commended Bros. Bush and Farber to Ministers and laymen for private subscriptions to their needy building enterprises. The effect of the "Srimper Memorial" effort was evidently very good upon the Lawrence Conference. It brought Father T's friends to the front & opened their pocket-books, and enabled me to present "Decrease of Appropriation to Lawrence, and the support of their own pastor" as I could not otherwise have done. Father Srimper's own son, who had not, I presume, given anything to the Lord's cause for many years, gave

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The exact Report of Committee which was unanimously adopted, is set forth paper. Marked A - Though the Conference pledged itself to the advice of a State Secy. the facts presented of the opening of the Missions at Hutchinson, the visitation of many Missions on their territory, and the appropriation of \$7000.00 to Kansas. Alone the Am't they are giving to Home Missions, rather settled the question.

The report of the Committee was not made until after the Home Mission facts were presented to Synod. and Collected

Harris had a long interview with Mr. S. P. Hyman and heard his side of the trouble at Lawrence. From his own lips I am prepared to report that he was very hasty and impudent in his course and, to a great extent, brought upon himself the displeasure of the people. His own statement gives evidence of this. He preached several sermons touching in matters which had no business in the pulpit at that time, and which were calculated to create division and distrust. He has evidently been very tenacious about money, and has made this tenacity so prominent, as to cause it to be a matter of public talk.

He took very kindly all I said to him, and admitted that he had made a mistake.

He seems to desire success in the ministry, and longs for a field of useful-

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After my interview with Bro. Heyman, I spent two hours with the Secy. of the Ch. Council and the "Records," and must say that I have never met with more carefully made records, neither with written statement so full and clear. All of Bro. Heyman's letters are in file, as well as copies of all communications sent to him. Every vote is recorded, and all resolutions and motions fully written out.

Bro. Selig, Secy. Ch. Council gave me the story from his stand-point, which differed but little from Bro. Heyman's own account, save that Bro. Heyman made some personal charges against Mr. Selig. I send herewith several communications - marked B - which have not heretofore been sent to the Board. They were given me by Bro. Heyman, who desires them returned to him.

to "fire them just the very man for them" Dr. Dr. Rev. W. M. Geiger suggested Rev. Josephus Sponseller, formerly of Bellville, Ohio, who has been down at Hays City, Kansas, buying land for his health.

As other "burnt districts" had brought up full apportionment, the explanation was not "entirely satisfactory". Though I did not say so on "the floor of synod", I felt that Bro. W. had good excuse as I knew that many of his people had absolutely no means at all and were borrowing money on which to live and paying interest at the rate of ten per cent a month.

D. Ottawa. Document marked D.

Shows the action of Synod concerning Ottawa. On this he had quite a little discussion, as a few of the brethren here inclined to "pitch in" on the abandoning of the work at O.

Bro. Daniel Altman - stimulated no doubt by his father, asserted that it was a shame to abandon such a field.

the property was to get it into the hands of the Board of Church Extension, that whenever there is any prospect for a Church in Ottawa, either on account of the growth of the city, or Lutherans moving in, the Board of Home Missions will gladly assume the work.

As the resolution requesting "a suitable man at the earliest possible date" seemed to please some of the Lutherans, and could do us no harm, I do not at all oppose it.

There were some pretty severe reflections on Bro. Seidel, and his course in granting certificates to members after he had ceased to be pastor &c. &c. but the Pres. of Synod decided that Bro. Seidel was not under suspicion, and thus ended the speeches.

This action came about through the committee on Correspondence. A communication from Barnes requested separation from Greenleaf, which by alone resolution was denied, and an additional standing resolution adopted making it a matter of discipline for any minister of the synod to divide a charge without the consent of synod, or to preach for one compafition in a charge, and refuse to preach for the other or others. My visit to New Mexico was one of very great interest, and I am sure also one of encouragement to Rev. William Rosenstengel, the faithful and only Dutchman missionary or pastor in all that territory. Having visited all his present preaching places, and carefully examined the work, I am prepared to endorse it and recommend an appropriation for the support of Rev. W^m Rosenstengel as missionary. The work will be slow, must needs be slow, on account of circumstances and surroundings, but nowhere in all our land is the pure gospel needed more than it is in New Mexico, and nowhere, perhaps, are our Indian people more entirely without it. All protestant work in New Mexico is slow, as the territory is cursed with Romanism and is

It is one bolt to Bro. Rosenstengel and Sennler to say, that their statement concerning "the necessity for immediate occupancy of New Mexico because of the Missourians" was not correctly understood or interpreted. So soon as Bro. Sennler, by request or suggestion of Mr. Rommel, I think, visited the territory for Securing Church property, and had secured several lots & found people ready to organize congregations, a relative of some Missouri Sutheran Preacher, wrote this Preacher of Mr. Sennler's visit, and he was about to follow the "special representative of the Bd. of Ch. R." and "enter into his lairs" by creating discord, abusing the General Synod &c. No Sutheran - Missouri or otherwise - had ever before attempted any work in New Mexico, and Bro. Sennler idea was to occupy

The erection of the parsmate will strengthen our work and add to its permanency. Albuquerque is a "Divisim town" of the great "Santa Fe Santa Fe" Railway lines and is growing rapidly. Here Bro. R. preaches on alternate Sundays - the Presbyterian House of Worship being granted for the use of our people.

then leaves for his appointment at Albuquerque or Santa Fe. The preaching is held in an abandoned adobe house, very primitive, he assured, but yet a place where "the Lord's name has been recorded."

A subscription has been started for a church-edifice, which will, I trust, be speedily built. As at Santa Fe, so here the services here intensely interesting, the little company dwelling in every utterance of the faithful teacher. One person here will give \$5.00 per month to the support of Bro. R. and the least able among them will give sums which would put to the blush some of the subscriptions to pastor's support in other places.

All these things being considered, and the synod of Nebraska strongly advocating Bro. Rosenstens' commission, I give it my endorsement. The field
