J. Kansas A. Hutchinson.

Letter from Dr. H. - marked A has just been received, and though it gives information it is not very satisfactory as to Jesus. Rev. Sime's letter disappoints me. He is usually very explicit and very accurate in statement, but this report or letter is not at all definite.

My hope was that he would go West, meet the people and then decide that he would title the mission. Possibly the best course to pursue is to call him to H and thus place the matter directly before him. There is no confession to call him, and the only way to begin at H. is to put a man there and tell him to go to work. This should be done at once, else we may have another Wichita trial repeated. I believe Prof. L. is the man to do the work at Hutchinson.

B. Wichita. "Well, well", another of Prof.

Perrin's arrant proceeding. Postal card - marked B tells of his plan for supplying Wichita. "Hartsock".

Rev. A. G. Hartsock, if I am correctly informed has never yet made straight his account in connection with the Salina church, and it seems to me that the experience of the Board of Church Extension with him should prevent their ^{superior} judgment.

I will answer his card by saying that I have sent it to the Board of Home Missions. Why will the Pres. of Kansas Synod direct such men to fields without consulting the Board? I am sure he never consulted the members of his own advisory

board, else he never would have written
Mr. Hartsock making such a suggestion.

The difficulty about this kind of
thing is that of P. S. W. M. does not ap-
point Hartsock to the place - and I
certainly cannot endorse him - he
reats antislavery to the work. He
is a most bitter and relentless foe
to those who in any wise oppose him.

If, at this time, the P. S. is in cor-
respondence with any other person
for Wichita, it will be a splendid &
irrational excuse for holding H. off.

C. Stetson. Had a great day for
Sutherlandism at Stetson. August
19th. It was the occasion of the laying
of the corner-stone of new Chapel. Over
200 people were present at the various
services. "The Champion" account is, I un-
doubtedly, very correct and as this has
been sent you, I need not enter into
details. I enclose "Program" &c. marked C

D. Wellington. Spent Friday
Aug. 31st at Wellington, formng new
church plans and discussing the
field with Missionary Bush. The
corner-stone for the new and very
beautiful church-edifice will, I
believe, be laid about Sept. 16th. A compe-
tent architect has been engaged, and
all the work is progressing nicely. Rev.
Schose - who is now a visiting Bro

Hush, is giving satisfaction, and will likely accept a part of the large field in Summer Co. Nothing will be done however, towards a division until the meeting of Kansas Synod.

The outlook at Wellington is very promising.

E. Manchester - "Keystone Post-Office".

Sunday, Sept. 2nd was a great day for the new town of Manchester and the "Country Friend Abut".

Rev. James Sweet - licensed by the Synod of Kansas last Autumn, has amid many and peculiar trials, succeeded in the erection of a very chunky and beautiful church. Securing the plans and specifications from the Board of Church Extension, he held the workmen to them, and the result is a very satisfactory church edifice. The P. C. B. also granted a loan of \$300.00 for five years. The building is 46 x 28, with steep pulpit 4 x 12 and vestry 8 x 6 x 6.6, and neat steeple 40 feet from ground. The furniture is of hard wood. The cost of the edifice was \$1700.00, a marvel of cheapness and good management. There remained \$600.00 to be raised on day of dedication which included the \$300.00 from P. C. B. The "hot winds" and partial crop failure made this a very difficult task, but it was accomplished within one hundred dollars.

The work was commenced in July
and the corner-stone laid July 4th.

The lots are 100 x 120 feet and very
slightly located. Bro. West has not had
the advantages of a thorough education,
but as a worker and builder has proven
himself "a workman that need not
be ashamed. Some little aid may
be needed for this field for next year,
but no application will be made un-
til a thorough canvass is made, &
the field arranged at Kansas. Synod.

III. Missouri, A. Kansas City,
Children's Memorial.

Though July 29th was one of the hottest Sundays of the year, the attendance at church and S. School at the Memorial Lutheran Church, Kansas City, Mo. was most excellent & cheering.

I spent the entire day with this mission, as I had not given them a service since the dedication of their Chapel. I was greatly pleased with every department of the work of the Memorial, and regard the future as full of promise and hope. There is method in the work that is depressing, and at the same time such earnestness as leaves its impress upon every attendant. The S. School is full of life, and means a strong church for the future. Mr. Farmer of the ^{the evening} Ch. having no service announced attended the Memorial Home Mission meeting Sunday night, bring a number of his people with him. Altogether the day was one long to be remembered.

Rev. M. F. Sweet, our faithful & efficient missionary of Children's Memorial, will likely resign, as he has been unanimously elected Secretary of Board of Education, and should enter upon the work of visiting the synods in that interest at once. His place will be difficult to fill, as he has stamped his impress upon the work, and gathered many

of the members by his own personal
apostleship. There are comparatively
few in the congregation who have
been brought up Sutlerans. I have
thought of Rev. Geo. D. Gottwald of Salina
Ks, as a very suitable person for the
Memorial, provided he can be secured.

Salina can get a man much
more easily than Kansas City. The
"Memorial" is more hopeful than at
any time in its history. They are ac-
cumulating a Building Fund, and
with the Main Church-building e-
xecuted, Meep is sure, the S. School
even now, far exceeds that of the
First Church, in numbers and ef-
ficacy. I have not seen Bro. Just-
ell since his election, but presume
he will make full report to Board,
and also suggestions as to his suc-
cession or the work future.
