Board of Home Missions.

Mr. President, Fathers and Brethren: - It now becomes the duty of the your Board of Home Missions, in concluding the trust committed to them at the last General Synod, to present to your venerable body, the following report of their work during the two years intervening:

I. The Administration.

1. Organization. The Board, was reappointed at Omaha, Nebraska, met in Baltimore, Md. July 28th, 1887, and organized by electing Rev. Chas. S. Albert, D. D., President and Mr. Chas. S. Weiser as Treasurer. At the same meeting Rev. Jacob A. Blatz and Rev. S. B. Barritz were again reelected as General and Western Secretaries for another two years.

2. Resignations. At the meeting of the Board held Oct. 21st, 1887, Rev. H. W. Kuhns, D.D., tendered his resignation as a member of the Board, in view of his expected removal to Omaha, Nebraska, and Rev. W. E. Parson, of Washington D.C., was elected to fill the vacancy thus caused.

On November 10th, 1887, Mr. Char. S. Weiser of York, Pa., who had served the Board as Treasurer for nearly 6 years, also tendered his resignation both as Treasurer and as a member of the Board. This vacancy was filled by the election of Samuel P. Appold, Esq. of Baltimore.

3. Western Headquarters. — Owing to the continued pressure for means for the regular work, and the necessity of dedicating every energy to securing the necessary funds to carry it forward, the Board has done nothing as yet towards the erection of a house for Western Headquarters in Omaha. Mr. Kountze has, however, very generously allowed his offer of a lot to stand open, and we are still hoping to avail ourselves of it in the future, as we believe this would be a wise and helpful movement.

4. Printing and Postage.— It will be seen from the treasurer's report, that the amount expended for these two items has been considerably larger the past two years than during the preceding two years. In explanation of this it may be well to say that these bills include the cost of printing and sending over 20,000 copies of our last Biennial Report, and 20,000 English and 5,000 German copies of an annual report published last year, and also one-third of the cost of printing and distributing 50,000 copies of the Report on the State of Religion, as ordered by the last General Synod. The distribution of these reports, and of other tracts, has done much, we believe, towards increasing the interest and contributions of the church. These items also include the cost of printing and mailing nearly 200,000 envelopes to the Sunday Schools for use on "Luther Sunday" and 25,000 copies of the "Cry for Help" issued last spring. These together brought into our treasury nearly \$16,000.

II. The Finances.

We began the Biennium covered by this report, April 1st, 1887, with a balance of \$5,390.68 in our treasury. This, however, included \$760.98 of Trust Funds not available for current work, making our actual working balance \$4,629.70. To this there were added during the two years, from April 1st, 1887 to March 31st, 1889, \$67,175.63 received as follows:-

1. From the Synod on the Apportionment,	\$ 52,380.02
2. From the Woman's Missionary Society,	8,519.45
3. From Individuals,	1,704.09
4. From Legacies,	2660.26
5. From the Lutheran Publication Society,	1500.00
6. From Sunday Schools, not on the Apportionment,	242.81
7. From collection at the last General Synod,	88.50
8. From returned loans and interest ,	<u>60.00</u>

This gave the Board a grand total of \$71,805.35 with which to carry on the work.

Under this item of the report, we remark,-

1. That it shows an increase of \$6083.80,
~~over~~ the receipts for the previous two years. This
may not be as large an increase as some
had expected, seeing the Apportionment has
been advanced \$5,000. But, all things considered
we regard it as very encouraging, and con-
gratulate the church on making so much of
a forward movement.

2. The amount from the Synod, on the Apportion-
ment, has advanced \$3181.61. This is
especially gratifying, even though the
whole amount still falls \$12,619.98 short
of the ~~new~~ Apportionment of \$65,000. With
the increased membership of the General
Synod reported, and the more general
adoption, and more faithful use of apportion
systems in raising money, we doubt not
the church will soon come up to the full
measure of the Apportionment. For
this we devoutly pray.

3. The amount from individuals is also encouraging, especially because it shows some advance, ~~and~~ which gives cause for great ~~wor~~ ~~work~~ reported from this ~~area~~
~~for emancipation~~ ~~area~~. We are more than ever persuaded that much hope for the future lies in the development of this kind of giving. When our people of wealth come to regard their wealth as ~~the~~ a trust received from God, and to recognize their claims upon them for proportionate giving, and so begin to lay larger offerings on the altar for His and other great interests of Christ's kingdom, then, ~~as we seek a~~ ~~and labor~~, may we hope to see our treasuries filled, and the Lord's work truly prospering in our hands.

In this connection we mention with pleasure and gratitude a special gift of \$500 received last year from Mr. Peter Good and wife of Hollidaysburg, Pa. As, however, this money was paid to the Board through the Allegheny Synod, and regularly credited in that Synod's ~~treasures~~ ^{opportunities}, it does not appear ~~as~~ ^{in the} ~~treasuries~~ ^{the} ~~Board's~~ ^{the} ~~annual~~ ^{annual} report as a separate item.

4. The Receipts from Legacies has also show an advance of \$ 1516.26, and since the financial report of the Board has closed, another legacy of \$500 has been paid in.

Among the legacies coming into our treasury last year, was one of \$1,000 from the estate of Miss Katie Good of Polo, Ills. This legacy, according to the will, was left "to the General Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the United States", and was paid by the administrator into the treasury of the General Synod. But it was clearly evident from the testimony of the friend of the deceased and also of the person who drew the will, as well as from other collateral evidence, that the testator desired and fully intended to make her legacy to "the Board of Home Missions of the General Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the United States", but that the words "Board of Home Missions" had been unintentionally omitted in drawing the will. Therefore the Treasurer of the General Synod, on the application of the Board, agreed to, and did, pay over the \$1000 into our treasury on an order so to do from the President and Secretary.

of the General Synod, and also with the understanding that the Board would refund the \$1000 of the General Synod should not approve his action. ~~The papers increase are submitted herewith~~ for your examination, and ~~for your approval~~. We trust this action of the Treasurer will meet with your approval.

5. The Sunday Schools have done nobly during the past two years having contributed nearly \$10,000 through the envelope furnished by the Board for the Luther Memorial offering on the Sunday nearest November 10th, the birthday of Martin Luther. This Sunday is now coming to be quite widely known and observed in all Sunday Schools as "Luther Sunday", and at the time when the offerings for Home Missions are to be made by the children and young people. We trust that this excellent custom will continue to spread until it has reached every Sunday School in the General Synod. If it were made thus universal, we have no

doubt that our Sunday Schools would alone contribute each year at least half of the amount un-called for by the Apportionment.

We fear, however, that some congregations have made the liberality of their Sunday Schools an excuse for reducing their own contributions, since the total advance of receipts on the Apportionment has been considerably less than the advance in the Sunday School offerings alone. This ought not to be. Let no burden be shifted from the congregation of adults to the Sunday Schools, but rather let each bear its own burden, and both together strive to fill up the full measure of their mutual responsibility to Christ and His cause.

Though one of the Sunday School Missions has become self-sustaining, the Third Church of Louisville, Ky., no new mission has been added to this list. But if the receipts from this source continue as large as they have been, the number can be at least double.

Several of the other Boards last year adopted the same ~~plan~~ method of reaching the Sunday Schools, by the distribution of envelopes, inaugurated by us three years ago. This will likely affect our receipts from this source

to some extent. ~~Boards~~^{the Board} and ~~are~~^{the use of this plan} called to lay claim to the exclusive right to the place of work, ~~which~~^{for the use of the} have not objected to ~~passage~~^{the use of the} by the other Boards, and have only asked that no other collectors be made so near to ~~our~~^{our} established date, or Luther Sunday, as to seriously interfere.

We are glad to add that St. Paul's Sunday School of York, Pa., Rev. W. S. Frear pastor, has continued to support the Mission at Nevada, Iowa.

6. The Lutheran Publication Society, is credited with \$1500, our share of the distribution of profits made at Omaha. The Board of Publication have also generously continued to favor our Mission Sunday Schools with a special discount on all their own publications.

7. The Woman's Missionary Society, have given the Board \$1028.04 more than two years ago. They have continued to sustain the five missions credited to them two years ago; Freeport, Ills., Lincoln, Neb., Denver, Col., and San Francisco and Los Angeles, Cal.
~~The last~~^{more pleased} to report that the Mission at San Francisco became self-supporting at the close of their third Mission year, Feb. 1st, 1889. We doubt not that, thus encouraged, the Woman's Society will

establish

one or two additional new missions.
The local societies have continued
also the preparing and sending of
"boxes", by which much cheer, and
comfort, and help, have been af-
forded to many of our missionaries
and other pastors who receive an
inadequate support.

8. A Special Appeal, or "cry for Help,"
was issued in the Spring of 1888, calling
for a special offering of \$10,000 to re-
lieve our overburdened, and then nearly
exhausted treasury. In response to
this "cry" over \$6000 was contributed,
but as most of this was paid through
the regular channels, and was duly
credited on the Appropriation it does
not appear as a separate item in the
Treasurer's report.

We doubt not the whole \$10,000 called
for would have been raised but unfortun-
ately, at least for us, ~~the Board of Foreign Missions and the Board of Church~~
~~Extension under straits similar to our~~
~~own, both issued special appeals also~~

about the same time. This of course somewhat divided the interest and the gifts of the people.

These special appeals we seem to some to have been too numerous the past two years. And it certainly is to be deplored that there should be any need for them. The average amount asked from each member by the apportionment for all purposes combined is so small, as compared with the ~~gen~~ average ability of the people to give, that there really ought to be no difficulty in raising the whole ~~amount~~ of it every year without any special appeal. At the same time we believe that the general effect has been good in educating the church on these subjects, ~~awakening~~ awakening new and deeper interest, and enlarging their benevolence.

III The Work.

In passing now to a brief review of the work in the field, we present it under three aspects:

1. The Work accomplished, ~~during~~ ~~the past two years~~.

Our records show that, 114 Missions have been enrolled, 11 more than for the preceding two years. The accompanying tabulated statement will give you the principal items from the reports of ~~the~~ each mission as submitted to the Board:
