

ASPPH Advocacy Initiatives in 2018-2019

(Updated on January 24, 2019)

January 17, 2019: ASPPH submitted comments on the draft core, developmental and research objectives being considered for inclusion in Healthy People 2030, the HHS's nationwide health promotion and disease prevention goals. ASPPH did not oppose any of the proposed objectives but did suggest numerous revisions and additions.

January 17, 2019: ASPPH joined more than 275 other organizations from across a wide range of sectors in sending letters to Congress and the President urging an immediate end to the government shutdown. The letters highlighted just a few of the health impacts of the shutdown, including food safety, environmental health and tribal health.

January 15, 2019: ASPPH joined with more than 20 other organizations in sending a letter to the Office of the United States Trade Representative calling for the US to ensure than any trade agreement with the United Kingdom include provisions to protect their citizens from the death and disease caused by tobacco products Specifically, the letter calls for any agreement to ensure that the US and UK not face the threat of investor litigation from the tobacco industry.

January 11, 2019: ASPPH and more than 40 other organizations wrote to the Senate leadership urging them to break the impasse on the Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness and Advancing Innovation Act of 2019, which has been blocked by an unrelated dispute between GOP Senators Richard Burr and Johnny Isakson.

January 8, 2019: Dr. Michael Eriksen, Tony Mazzaschi and Mark Mioduski hosted an ASPPH Presents Webinar, "The New Congress and the Missions of Academic Public Health."

January 7, 2019: Members of the ASPPH leadership team met in Atlanta with CDC Director Dr. Robert Redfield and his senior staff on December 17, 2018. On January 7, 2019, ASPPH wrote to Dr. Redfield thanking him for the meeting and reiterated that ASPPH and our members are essential allies of the CDC and that we can add additional value to the CDC while supporting his priorities. We provided specific examples of ways that our members' work on workforce development, public health research, communications and advocacy align with CDC's objectives and can continue to help the CDC's senior leadership address the future challenges facing the nation's public health system.

December 11, 2018: ASPPH and eleven other groups submitted joint comments to the EPA regarding the Draft Integrated Science Assessment for Particulate Matter (ISA). The groups said, "Our organizations consider the review of the National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS) for particulate matter (PM) to be a top priority concern for the protection of public health, a position reinforced by the escalating evidence of its widespread harm. Particulate matter air pollution poses risks of serious health effects, including premature death, and the evidence compiled in this ISA documents greater risks than had previously been recognized."

December 10, 2018: ASPPH wrote to key Congressional leaders endorsing H.R. 1318, the Preventing Maternal Deaths Act. The bill would, among other provisions, direct the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to establish a grant program to states for the purpose of reviewing pregnancy-related and pregnancy-associated deaths (maternal deaths) and establishing and sustaining maternal mortality review committees to review relevant information.

December 7, 2018: ASPPH submitted formal comments strongly opposing the Department of Homeland Security's (DHS) Proposed Rule on the inadmissibility of immigrants on "public charge" grounds. DHS published the proposal in the *Federal Register* on October 10, 2018. The letter said, "ASPPH opposes the proposed rule as it would have profound and negative consequences on the health of the many immigrant families that would be affected by limiting their access to critical and life-saving health and wellness services. As such, this proposal also will negatively affect the health and wellness of entire communities. We urge you to withdraw the rule in its entirety and that long-standing immigration policies remain in effect."

December 7, 2018: ASPPH joined other members of the Public Service Loan Repayment Coalition in writing to all new members of the House of Representatives calling for support of the program and highlighting the current management challenges bedeviling the program.

December 6, 2018: ASPPH and a dozen other organizations issued a statement decrying an announcement by the Acting Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) of a proposed rule to dramatically weaken the Carbon Pollution Standards for New, Modified and Reconstructed Power Plants, which are protections against carbon pollution that have been in effect since 2015. ASPPH said, "This latest attempt from the Administration to give industry a license to pollute is irresponsible and illogical from both a health and economic perspective. We strongly oppose this proposal, which is a major threat to the health of all Americans, particularly those most vulnerable."

December 3, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar by the Congressional Management Foundation to enhance advocacy skills. The webinar was titled, "Strategies to Build Relationships with New Members of Congress."

November 29, 2018: ASPPH joined with a dozen other organizations in sending a letter to key appropriations committee leaders urging them to fully fund the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and oppose all policy riders – especially those that would block, weaken, or delay critical clean air and public health protections.

November 26, 2018: ASPPH joined with more than 20 other organizations in sending a letter to the Office of the United States Trade Representative calling for the US to ensure than any trade agreement with Japan include provisions to protect their citizens from the death and disease caused by tobacco products Specifically, the letter calls for any agreement to ensure that the US and Japan not face the threat of investor litigation from the tobacco industry.

November 19, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar by the Congressional Management Foundation to enhance advocacy skills. The webinar was titled, "Strategies to Build Relationships with New Members of Congress."

November 14, 2018: ASPPH and almost 20 other organizations sent a letter to Acting EPA Administrator Andrew Wheeler calling on him "to abandon the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's current plans to reconsider limits on mercury and other air toxics from power plants."

November 14, 2018: ASPPH and more than 80 other organizations sent a letter to Congressional leaders urging them to advance legislation during the lame duck session to reduce maternal mortality in the United States. The legislation (H.R. 1318/S. 1112) had already cleared the committees of jurisdiction in both the House and Senate.

October 31, 2018: ASPPH and a dozen other associations submitted joint comments on proposals by the Environmental Protection Agency on "Emission Guidelines for Greenhouse Gas Emissions from Existing Electric Utility Generating Units" and "Revisions to Emission Guideline Implementing Regulations; Revisions to New Source Review Program." The detailed comment letter urges EPA to withdraw their proposals.

October 26, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar, "Academic Public Health and the Family Immigration Crisis." The webinar featured the lead immigration counsel for the American Civil Liberties Union, physicians and child development experts, higher education advocates involved in immigration issues, and the director of a child advocacy legal clinic. [Trump Administration representatives were invited but declined to participate.]

October 23, 2018: ASPPH issued a statement, along with various other groups and individuals, expressing concern about the EPA's proposal to weaken health protections from coal plant emissions and calling on President Trump and the EPA to reconsider and rescind the Affordable Clean Energy (ACE) Rule, and to maintain critical health-protective Mercury and Air Toxics Standards (MATS) safeguards for coal plants.

October 19, 2018: ASPPH and other members of the coalition working to preserve the Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) Program wrote to Secretary DeVos expressing alarm about rejection rate data presented by the Government Accountability Office (GAO) and asking DeVos to detail how the Department plans to implement the GAO's recommendation. The groups also asked "the Department to provide a detailed breakdown of the reasons so many applicants failed to qualify for PSLF so we can be of greater assistance in supporting efforts to improve the implementation of the PSLF."

October 16, 2018: ASPPH joined several hundred other organizations and educational institutions in sending a thank you letter to Congressional leaders for the fiscal year 2019 funding levels they provided to the NIH and other research agencies.

October 4, 2018: ASPPH joined more than 100 other organizations in sending a letter to HHS Secretary Alex Azar saying we are "deeply concerned that funding to care for immigrant children—those forcibly separated from their parents at the border, and those detained in custody for extended periods of time—as a direct result of the Administration's immigration policies, is being drawn directly from money appropriated in fiscal year 2018 for public health and medical research." The groups called on the Administration to request supplemental funding from Congress to ensure the health and wellbeing of children and families in the Department's care."

September 27, 2018: ASPPH and two dozen other organizations submitted letter testimony to the Health Subcommittee of the House Energy and Commerce Committee in support of a new discussion draft of H.R. 1318, the Preventing Maternal Deaths Act (which mirrors S. 1112, the Maternal Health Accountability Act). The testimony voiced strong support for the work of state maternal mortality review committees (MMRCs), funded by the CDC. MMRCs are multidisciplinary groups of local experts in maternal, infant, and public health that examine cases of maternal death.

September 20, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar by the Congressional Management Foundation to enhance advocacy skills. The webinar was titled, "Behind the Scenes of Congressional Decision Making."

September 18, 2018: ASPPH and other members of the Health Air Coalition submitted a formal request to the Environmental Protection Agency asking them to extend the comment deadline for at least 60 additional days on the proposed Affordable Clean Energy (ACE) rule. We further requested that EPA hold at least three additional public hearings on the proposal.

September 13, 2018: ASPPH and other members of the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Coalition submitted comments on a Department of Education rulemaking on the application process related to the Temporary Expanded Public Service Loan Forgiveness (TEPSLF) program, created by Congress to offer relief for borrowers enrolled in nonqualifying repayment plans.

September 11, 2018: ASPPH and 50 partner organizations wrote to Congressional leaders urging that all tobacco policy riders be stricken from the FY 2019 Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations bill, including a provision that would weaken FDA oversight of tobacco products, including e-cigarettes and cigars.

September 7, 2018: ASPPH joined more than 170 other organizations in writing a letter to Congressional appropriators request that they fund the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) in fiscal year 2019 at a level equal to or higher than the House and Senate marks of \$334 million.

September 6, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote a letter to Congressional leaders expressing support for increased funding for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) National Center for Environmental Health (NCEH) in the FY 2019 Labor, HHS, Education appropriations bill.

August 31, 2018: ASPPH Board Chair Dr. Donna Petersen wrote a letter to the editor of the *New York Times* opposing the Department of Justice's threat to shut down state-sanctioned safe-injection sites. The letter reviewed the research on the success of such harm reduction strategies.

August 30, 2018: ASPPH wrote to Mrs. Cindy McCain expressing the sympathies of our members on the death of Senator John McCain and highlighting his initiatives advancing public health.

August 15, 2018: ASPPH and others submitted formal comments to the Environmental Protection Agency in opposition to the proposed rule, "Strengthening Transparency in Regulatory Science."

August 6, 2018: Dr. Michael Eriksen and Tony Mazzaschi hosted an ASPPH Presents Webinar, "Policy, Advocacy, and the Missions of Academic Public Health."

August 1, 2018: ASPPH sent a letter to key appropriations and authorization committee chairs opposing the Trump Administration's proposed cuts in the number of slots allocated to the US Public Health Service Commissioned Corps. The Association endorsed the creation of a "reserve corps" and also called for the creation of a dedicated funding line for the Corps.

July 25, 2018: ASPPH released, "Resources to Help Students Register and Vote," a collection of links and other bipartisan resources to promote civic participation.

July 24, 2018: ASPPH sponsored an "Advocacy Skill-Building Workshop" in Fort Lauderdale, Florida before the start of the annual ASPPH Leadership Retreat. The session was led by Bradford Fitch, President & CEO, Congressional Management Foundation.

July 16, 2018: ASPPH and others released a joint statement in opposition to the EPA's proposed rule, "Strengthening Transparency in Regulatory Science." The statement was released the day before the public hearing on the proposed rule.

July 13, 2018: ASPPH and others sent a community letter to HHS Secretary Azar protesting U.S. opposition to a breastfeeding resolution at the World Health Assembly.

July 9, 2018: ASPPH sent a letter to HHS Secretary Azar protesting U.S. opposition to a breastfeeding resolution at the World Health Assembly. In a letter to ASPPH dated October 26, 2018, G. Garrett Grigsby, director of the HHS Office of Global Affairs, responded on behalf of Secretary Azar. Mr. Grigsby said that "HHS unequivocally supports breastfeeding as scientifically proven to be one of the most important and effective ways to promote child health and development." While noting US objections to the initial resolution because it placed "unnecessary hurdles for families seeking to provide nutrition to their children and limiting access to information," he noted that the US eventually supported a revised resolution. The "hurdles" that Mr. Grigsby refers to relate to a ban on deceptive marketing practices by formula manufacturers and marketers.

June 21, 2018: ASPPH and five other public health associations sent a letter to the HHS and DHS Secretaries opposing the Administration's migrant family separation policy.

June 18, 2018: ASPPH and others sent a letter to Senators Marco Rubio (R-FL) and Orrin Hatch (R-UT) opposing the use of the Prevention and Public Health Fund as an offset to the Puerto Rico Economic Empowerment Act.

June 15, 2018: ASPPH strongly protested the Administration's program of separating migrant families in a letter to Donald Trump.

June 12, 2018: A letter signed by more than 65 public health deans and program directors on the importance of the Public Service Loan Forgiveness (PSLF) Program was distributed to all congressional offices.

June 5, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar on, "Opioid Litigation and a Possible Master Settlement Agreement."

May 29, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote the Appropriations Committees in calling on Congress "to recognize the essential role of publicly funded family planning and sexual health care services by funding Title X at \$327 million in FY 2019."

May 24, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote the leadership of the House and Senate Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations Subcommittees urging them to fully fund the CDC Office of Smoking and Health. The Trump Administration proposed killing the office in its FY 2019 budget submission.

May 23, 2918: ASPPH and others wrote Senate leaders to oppose riders added to the FY 2019 Agriculture appropriations bill by the House Appropriations Committee that would limit the authority that Congress granted the FDA under the Family Smoking Prevention and Tobacco Control Act.

May 22, 2018: ASPPH and other wrote to all Members of Congress opposing efforts to eliminate the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program.

May 21, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote to FDA Commissioner Dr. Scott Gotlieb in strong support of the FDA initiative "to move toward a product standard to reduce the nicotine level in cigarettes to non-addictive or minimally addictive levels."

May 7, 2018: ASPPH endorsed the recommendation of the Ad Hoc Group for Medical Research Funding to provide "at least \$39.3 billion for the NIH, including funds provided to the agency through the 21st Century Cures Act for targeted initiatives." The recommendation was then distributed to all members of the House and Senate.

May 4, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote members of the House Agricultural Appropriations Subcommittee opposing an amendment to the FY 2019 Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies Appropriations bill that would have reduced the FDA's tobacco oversight authority.

April 27, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote members of Congress asking them "to provide \$50 million in funding for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to conduct public health research into firearm morbidity and mortality prevention."

April 11, 2018: ASPPH and other members of the Friends of HRSA wrote to Congress urging them to provide \$8.56 billion for discretionary Health Resources and Services Administration programs in the FY 2019 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies appropriations bill.

April 9, 2018: ASPPH and other members of the CDC Coalition wrote Congress urging them to provide \$8.445 billion for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's programs in the FY 2019 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Appropriations bill.

April 6, 2018: The ASPPH leadership sent notes to the chairs and ranking members of the House and Senate Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations Subcommittees thanking them on behalf of the ASPPH membership for providing the NIH, CDC, and other critical research and public health accounts with significant funding increases as part of the FY 2018 omnibus appropriations bill.

April 5, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar by the Congressional Management Foundation to enhance advocacy skills. The webinar was titled, "New Social Media Research Revealed!"

April 3, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote Congress supporting funding for the Title V Maternal and Child Health (MCH) Services Block Grant program in the FY2019 Labor, Health and Human Services, Education & Related Agencies Appropriations bill.

March 27, 2018: ASPPH and others filed an amicus brief urging the Supreme Court to reinstate the nationwide injunction against the Trump Administration Proclamation 9645 that indefinitely bars individuals from entering the United States on the basis of their nationality.

March 27, 2018: ASPPH and other members of the Friends of AHRQ sent letters to Congressional leaders requesting \$454 million for FY19 for the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ).

March 26, 2018: ASPPH wrote to Dr. Robert Redfield congratulating him on his appointment as Director of the CDC.

March 19, 2918: ASPPH organized and wrote a letter to appropriators signed by various associations in support of funding the Public Health Training Centers and the Preventive Medicine Residency Programs.

February 23, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote to the members of the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor & Pensions commenting on draft legislation to reauthorize the Higher Education Act and urging the panel to preserve the Public Service Loan Forgiveness Program.

February 22, 2018: ASPPH and others sent a letter to Congress urging that they "find a bipartisan path forward for comprehensive legislative solutions to firearm-related injuries and fatalities."

February 22, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar by the Congressional Management Foundation to enhance advocacy skills. The webinar was titled, "Influencing Staff: What Congress' Policy Advisers Want in Briefing Materials."

February 16, 2018: ASPPH posted a statement on the Parkland, Florida school shooting, highlighting the need to fund gun violence research at the CDC.

February 2, 2018: ASPPH wrote to HHS Secretary Alex Azar urging the Trump Administration to consider appointing CDC Acting Director Dr. Anne Schuchat to the position on a permanent basis.

January 25, 2018: ASPPH sponsored a webinar by the Congressional Management Foundation to enhance advocacy skills. The webinar was titled, "Before, During, and After Meetings with Congress."

January 24, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote to members of the House and the Senate urging them "to help ensure adequate funding for programs funded through annual appropriations, by continuing the bipartisan practice of providing relief from sequestration budget cuts and opposing any new efforts to cut these programs more deeply."

January 19, 2018: ASPPH provided formal comments on the draft proposed strategic plan (2019-2023) of the NIH Office of Disease Prevention.

January 18, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote to Congressional leaders "to express our serious concern about the most recent continuing resolution, which cuts \$750 million from the Prevention and Public Health Fund (Prevention Fund) and will put Americans at greater risk for illnesses, injuries and preventable deaths."

January 17, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote to executives of Walgreens urging the firm "to discontinue its practice of selling of tobacco consumer products." Walgreen is the largest drug store chain in the country. The second largest chain, CVS, stopped selling tobacco products in 2014.

January 8, 2018: ASPPH and others wrote to House and Senate appropriators asking "that you fund the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) at a level equal to or higher than the Senate mark of \$324 million."
