Hello 4-H Club Leaders!

As you may or may not know NYS 4-H was recently audited by the USDA on our Civil Rights compliance. The completion of this audit has raised some questions regarding the compliance of 4-H Clubs in other capacities including finance. I have been meeting with Donna Gatto who is the Oneida County Finance Manager as well as the Leatherstocking Region's SBN Lead. Our record keeping regarding 4-H Club finances is not compliant with current guidelines and we are required to remedy this in the 2018-2019 4-H Year.



I am working on creating a 4-H Financial Training class that will update you on the procedures that we must follow. Donna Gatto will also be planning on attending the training to help us get all of our club leaders up to speed. Clubs that have bank accounts will need to arrange a time to sit down with 4-H staff separately and make sure all record keeping protocol is being followed.

A couple important take aways that you should start doing immediately:

- Make sure you have submitted your 2017-2018 4-H Financial Statement. All clubs need to have this on file even if you do not maintain a treasury account.
- All 4-H Clubs that have bank accounts must provide copies of the monthly statements to the 4-H office
- Make sure your Permission to Raise Funds requests have been submitted and are on file at the 4-H office
- Going forward the CCE Finance Department will need receipts or copies of receipts for all deposits and payments issued from the 4-H Club's treasury. This may end up being a monthly report that needs to be turned in, so we can keep accurate records for our yearly audit.

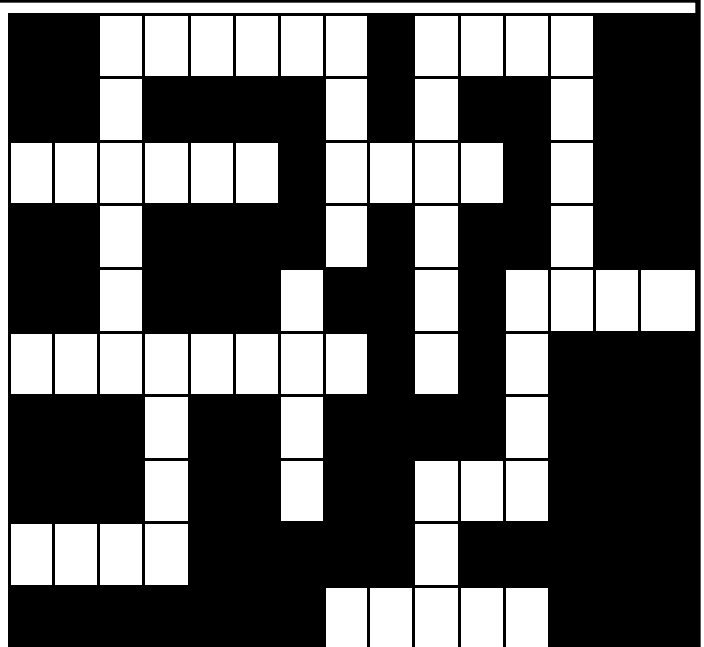

Just what are Public Presentations, Horse Communications, Creative Communications?

Ask any 4-H alumnus what program they have found the most beneficial and Public Speaking is always at the top of the list. They will also tell you that they were mad at their parents for making them do them, were scared at first but quickly gained the confidence to overcome their fears.

Oneida County 4-H encourages youth to share their knowledge with others by doing a **Public Presentation**: Youth choose a topic and speak in front of volunteer evaluators. Presentations can be from 5-15 minutes long. Length and time depends on the child's age and previous experience. Youth have the ability to advance from the County Level to District to invitation to attend Communications Institute. Contact Lynette for more info. RSVP for the March 16th at CCE Oneida. https://reg.cce.cornell.edu/_CPP2019_230

Horse Communications: are very similar to Public Presentations. The differences is that if you want to show a horse at the Boonville Fair you must do a Horse Communications and the topic must be horse related. Creative Communications: Communication comes in many forms. 4-H members have the opportunity to share their knowledge by submitting articles for our news letter, doing educational displays at the fair, or even teaching others how to do things (Make and Take). Youth wishing to apply for County Medals need to have completed a approved form of Communication that coordinated with the medal they are applying for. Example: explaining about 4-H exhibits to the public at the Boonville Fair (Ask Me Tours) would qualify as a communication for any of the Dairy or Livestock Medals. Regardless of what type of presentation you do your presentation should be made up of three parts:

- Introduction: This is where you tell the audience what you are going to talk about. Make it fun and catchy!
- Body: Tell them the information.
- Conclusion: Tell them what you told them.

Guidelines for Public Presentations your speech should be in relation to your age. If you are 10 you should speak 10 minutes. If you are 15 then 15 minutes. Public Presentations are no longer than 15 minutes.

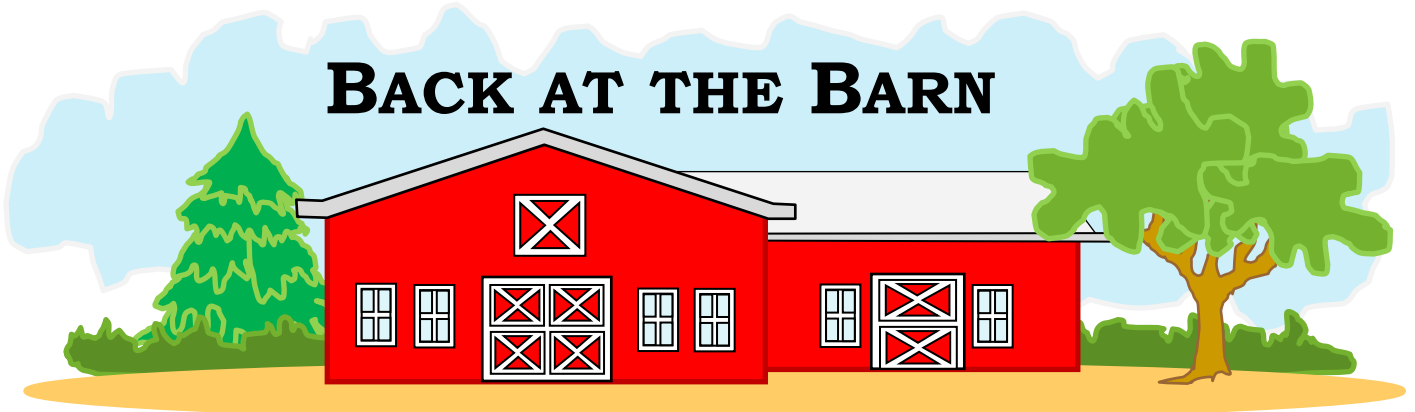

The Oneida County 4-H Dog Program is once again offering Spring Dog Obedience Classes!

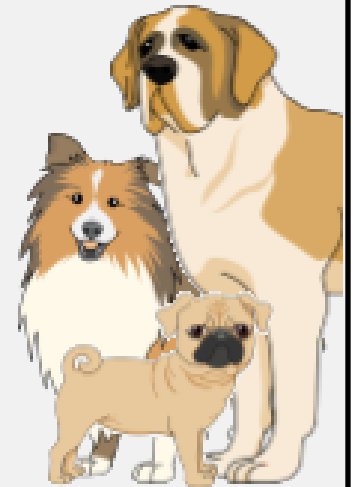
These classes are offered for beginner and advanced beginner levels. The classes are taught by 4-H volunteers Bonnie Barrett and Janet DiNitto.

This workshop is for 4-H members interested in learning more about their favorite livestock, companion or pet animal species; emphasis on different species groupings and activities varies annually. Participants will learn about different aspects of animal care, interact and exchange information with faculty, staff, students, professional producers, industry experts, and more, utilizing the unique facilities of Cornell University. Hands-on workshops are planned for each species group.

When/Where: This Saturday workshop is held every May on the Cornell campus (Morrison Hall – 507 Tower Rd, Ithaca, NY 14853).

Who: The program is geared to 4-H members involved in animal science projects. Youth are strongly encouraged to attend with their parents or chaperones. Suggested age range is 9-12, however, all youth 9 and up are welcome.

Program Introduction:

The 4-H Earn-A-Project program is proudly supported by Top Notch Livestock of Jordanville, NY. Top Notch Livestock is generously donating (1) market lamb whether projects and (1) market hog barrow projects. This project is open to all Oneida and Herkimer County youth that are traditional 4-H members (ages 8 to 19 as of January 1, 2019). The youth and parents agree to accept all costs associated with their project animal. Youth agree to raise awarded project animal to be sold in the Annual Mohawk Valley Show and Sale. - Write an essay of about 250-500 words stating why you would like to receive the Earn-A-Project award
- Accept all costs occurred by providing adequate housing, and nutrition for my project
- Keep accurate project records provided at the initial Show and Sale meeting for the project animal
- Attend (2) educational 4-H events pertaining to your Earn A Project species
- Show the animal at the Junior Livestock Show (species specific)
- Show the animal at the local county 4-H Fair
- Display an informational sign at County Fair regarding the Earn-A-Project program
- Create an educational display for my Earn-A-Project and records to be shown during the County Fair
- Sell your Earn-A-Project in the 2019 Mohawk Valley Show and Sale.
- The 4-H youth will be responsible finding at minimum 3 buyers to come bid on/purchase their project.

In simplified terms this is how to submit a project for the Boonville Fair.

1. Do something :)
2. Review the Fair Book to decide what section and class the item belongs.
3. Enter the projects that you want to submit in the on line registration. Due by July 1st
4. Bring your item to CCE Oneida for evaluation (Tentatively July 17, 2019)
5. When youth are called, take your item to the judge. He/She will ask you to explain: The Who , What, When, Where, Why and How of your project.
6. After all your projects are evaluated you can go home.
7. Projects are left with Staff and taken to be set up at The Boonville Fair.
8. Projects can be picked up after 7 pm the last day of the Fair or at the office 1 week after the Fair.
9. Youth earn premium money for the projects they submit.
10. Projects Selected for the State Fair should be picked up and inspected, repaired or improved before being dropped off at the office to be taken to the State Fair. State Fair Projects must also be registered on line.

CREATIVE COMMUNICATIO S EXPLAINED: 4-H understands that doing a formal Public Presentation may be overwhelming for some youth. That is why we provide alternate communication opportunities for those youth to apply and earn County Medals. The key point to remember is that the youth should be sharing their knowledge and skills with others. We would accept youth writing an article for On the Move. 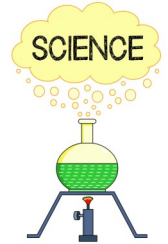

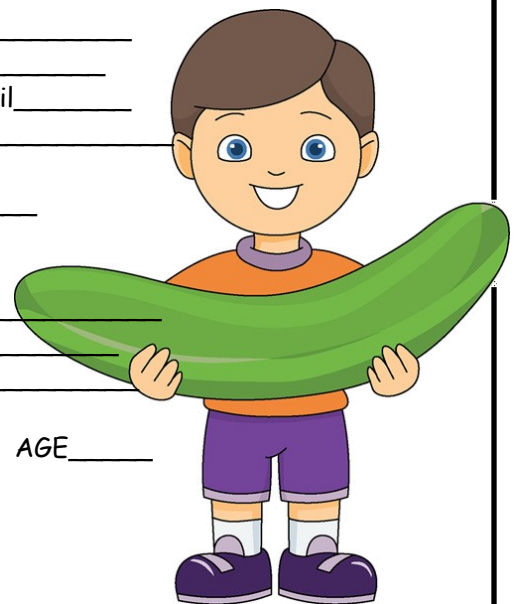

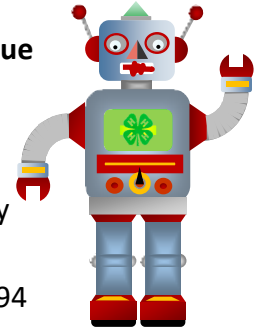

TRACKING FISH WITH E-DNA

A Citizen Science Project at Cornell University

FishTracker is a student-oriented citizen science project based at Cornell University and funded by the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture. The program records and maps the presence of several species of fish, both endangered and invasive, in New York State. New York State teachers and students play a critical role in monitoring the range of fish species using materials and protocols supplied by this program. Students collect environmental DNA (eDNA) from water samples from nearby lakes, streams, or ponds, using GPS coordinates to identify each site surveyed.

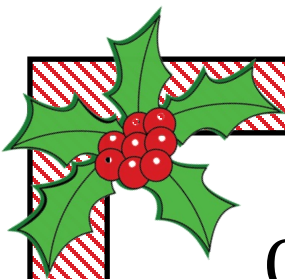

Light Bulb Ornaments

- Ribbon
- Toothpicks
- Felt
- Buttons
- Twigs
- Old gloves
- Paintbrushes
- Hot glue
- Fishing line
- Fun foam
- Rubbing alcohol
- Cotton balls
- Scraps of plaid fabric
- Acrylic craft paint spray with primer first or paints specific to painting on ceramic or glass



Directions: Wipe bulb down with rubbing alcohol, this removes oil from fingerprints and will help the paint adhere to the bulb. Let dry.

Paint entire light bulb with acrylic paint and let dry. Apply a second coat. If finish appears streaked, you can use a large paintbrush or a sponge to blot on a "stucco" look. It is not necessary to paint the socket. Allow bulb to dry completely. Depending on the light bulb you are creating apply different colors only after each previous coat has dried.

Once painting is complete start adding accessories such as hats (used scrap bits of felt or the fingers from knit gloves). Fun foam can be cut into ears for the dog and cow or the wings of the penguin. Twigs can make snowman arms. The pointed ends of toothpick make great snowman noses or penguin bills.

Use the fishing line or colorful ribbon as the hanger.

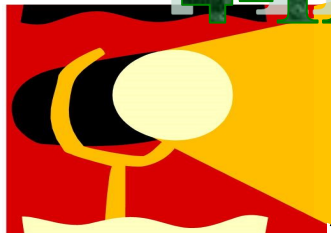

Hard Work Pays Off

Christopher and Casey Roman 4-H rabbit projects has lead them on quite an adventure in 2018.

The year kicked off in April with the Lop Rabbit Club of America (LRCA) holding their National Show at the NY State Fairgrounds in Syracuse. In addition to showing their individual animals the boys decided to compete for the Royalty Court. This required that they write essays, do interviews, take a handwritten test and actually judge animals to demonstrate their knowledge in judging rabbit classes. Christopher earned the winning distinction of King and Casey ended up winning Duke. This is a huge honor as this was the inaugural year for the LRCA to offer these titles.

May brought a phone call from the president of the American Rabbit Breeders Association (ARBA) congratulating Christopher on being nominated, by the open breeders of NY State, and earning the title of District 7 Youth Representative for The American Rabbit Breeders Association. As the representative he is the contact point for all youth in this district. It is his responsibility to make sure the ARBA is aware of any concerns or suggestions the District 7 youth might have.

Both boys competed at the NY State Fair Rabbit /Cavy Weekend. On Saturday, Chris won Reserve in Show with his White crested cavy. Their biggest achievements came on Sunday at the Rabbit and Cavy Decathlons where youth compete as individuals and in teams. The Decatholon consists of 10 stations with topics such as disease, anatomy, and nutrition. At each station youth are challenged to answer specific questions and are then scored on their knowledge. The boys had a really good day with Chris finishing in 8th place Senior Rabbit, 2nd place Senior Cavy, 2nd place Senior Rabbit Team and 1st place Senior Cavy Team. Casey finished 3rd place Intermediate Rabbit, 8th place Intermediate Cavy, 2nd place Intermediate Rabbit Team and 2nd place Intermediate Cavy Team.

Their year was topped off by being able to attend the American Rabbit Breeders Association Convention in Springfield Massachusetts in October. The boys wrote essays about their accomplishments and the management of their Rabbitry. Christopher won Senior District 7 Achievement and District 7

Average (size) Rabbitry Management. Casey won District 7 Intermediate Achievement. They also competed in teams and individually in breed ID contests and judging. When showing their animals the boys competed with youth from all over the United States. Casey was proud to win 2nd place in the Intermediate Broken French Lop class. Christopher won the Junior Broken English Lop Class. The buck then went on to win Best Broken Buck and finally onto Best Opposite Sex. (Which means a doe won Best of Breed and then they pick the best buck.)

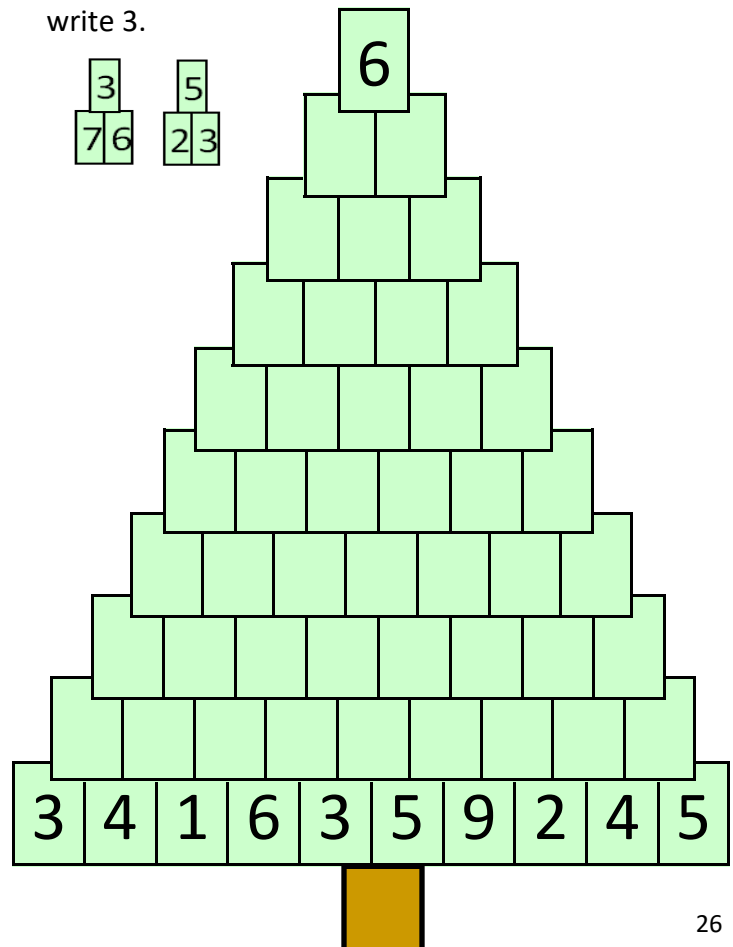

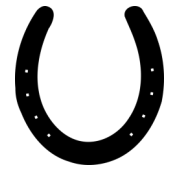

One \$500 or two \$250 scholarships may be awarded annually. Each scholarship winner will receive a check for the designated amount following the receipt of proof of successful completion of the first semester of school, acceptance for the second semester and a commitment to schooling. Proof will include an official copy of the first semester grades (minimum 2.5 GPA required) and a letter from the registrar stating the individual is enrolled for the second semester.

REFERENCE LETTER FORMS:

Attached is a copy of a reference letter form. Three need to be submitted. One of the three should be completed by a former 4-H leader or other adult familiar with the applicant's 4-H experience. The remaining two may be from a teacher, neighbor or other adult who knows the applicant well.

References should seal the completed form in the envelope provided.

The envelope may be mailed or included unopened with the application packet.

THE SCORING AND DECISION MAKING PROCESS:

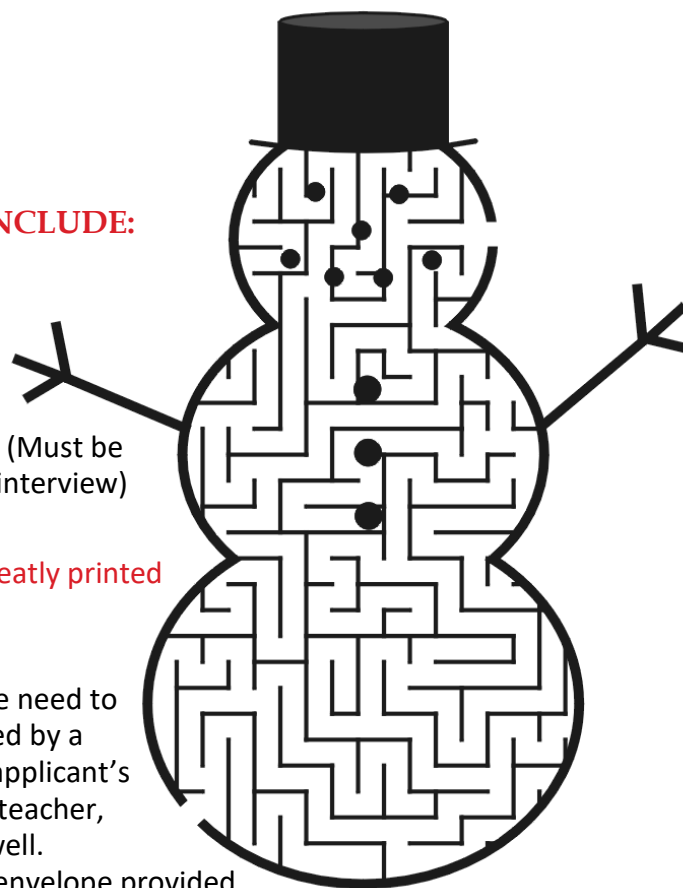
A team of **five** people will read and score each application separately. No names will appear on the applications when they are being scored. Scores will be totaled and the top scoring applicants will be scheduled for interviews. Following the interviews, one or two and an alternate may be chosen. Scoring is as follows.

Application: 60%

Interview: 40%.

All those interviewed will be notified by telephone or letter prior to announcements in the 4-H News, a press release and notification to high schools.

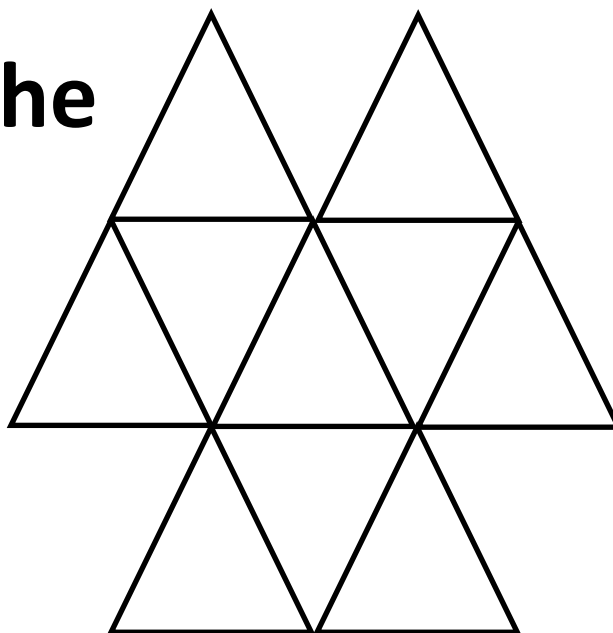
Criteria:

Start seeing things from a different angle! Count the number of triangles of all sizes in the diagram.



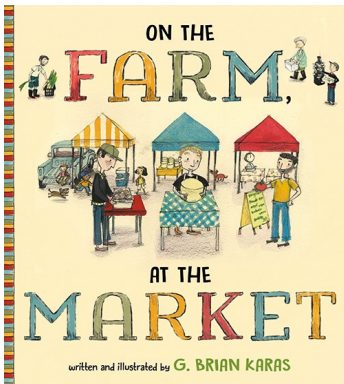
