Exhibit Policies

- Fair Management reserves the deny entry to any project which does not meet the required elements and/or the right to remove any exhibit during the course of the Fair.
- 2. Cornell Cooperative Extension of Putnam County assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage to any exhibit and/or animal.
- 3. At all times, all exhibitors shall act with a mature and morally responsible attitude, recognizing the basic rules of society and the common rights of others. All 4-H Members will be expected to adhere to the 4-H Code of Conduct.
- 4. Any exhibitor responsible for misconduct resulting in damage to or destruction of the property of others will be expelled from the Putnam County 4-H Fair.
- 5. Dogs ARE NOT permitted on the Fairgrounds.
- 6. All Youth wishing to take part in animal shows at the Fair, must be currently enrolled 4-H members or enroll by July 8th to participate.
 Enrollment Fee: There will be a \$8.00 4-H Fair Youth Enrollment fee for participation in animal shows (does not

apply to currently enrolled Putnam youth) who wish to show animals at the Fair. Go to:

All membership enrollment paperwork must be completed and turned into the CCE office by July 8, 2019.

4-H Fair - Overnight Camping Policy

Actively enrolled **Putnam 4-H Members**, who are currently working with animals and/or have other leadership roles and responsibilities at the Putnam County 4-H Fair, may be eligible to camp overnight during the Putnam County 4-H Fair if they meet the criteria listed below:

Active **Club** Members:

If you have been actively enrolled in a Putnam 4-H Club for <u>at least 6 months</u>, you **may** be given permission to stay overnight during the fair. A club leader must grant permission for each member and be present at the fairgrounds to chaperone all members of their club. There must be at least one male and one female chaperone for all clubs. There must also be a tent for both male and female club members. All volunteer leaders and parent chaperones must comply with Cornell Cooperative Extension of Putnam County's 4-H Youth Development Criminal Background Check Policy. This must be completed <u>PRIOR</u> to the fair. All Requests to stay overnight must be made <u>BEFORE</u> July 8th and must be approved by the 4-H Program Director.

-OR-

Active Independent Members:

If you have been enrolled as an independent Putnam 4-H Member for the past year permission to camp overnight may be granted, with approval from the 4-H Program Director on a case by case basis. A parent or guardian must be present at all times with their child(ren). All parent and guardian chaperones must comply with Cornell Cooperative Extension of Putnam County's 4-H Youth Development Criminal Background Check Policy. This must be completed PRIOR to the fair. All Requests to stay overnight must be made BEFORE July 8th.

If you are granted permission to stay over you may be asked to supply a tent.

All campers and chaperones must adhere to any and all overnight guidelines, rules, and policies of Putnam County's 4-H youth development program.

Only adult volunteers with 4-H Club and/or animal responsibilities, who have been granted permission from the 4-H Program Director and have successfully completed complied with Cornell Cooperative Extension of Putnam County's 4-H Youth Development Criminal Background Check Policy will be permitted to stay overnight during the 4-H Fair.

No other adults are permitted to stay overnight on the fairgrounds.



4-H Fair Livestock Herdsman Responsibilities



(overnight not required)

All Youth and/or adults showing or displaying livestock must agree to the following:

PRE-FAIR:

- Make arrangements in advance directly with the 4-H Program Director or the Livestock Fair Chair for overnight care of your livestock if you are not camping at the fair. The Putnam County 4-H Fair cannot and does not guarantee such accommodations can be met. Overnight stays are not required to be eligible for Herdsmanship awards.
- Provide an overnight list and required Medical Release Forms for anyone who plans to stay overnight. You are responsible for providing your own accommodations and must obtain approval from the 4-H Program Director. There needs to be a 1:5 adult to youth ratio for overnight.

BARN SUPPLIES and MAINTENENCE:

- Clubs/Groups (showing more than 6 animals): Please bring a wheelbarrow, shovel, broom, leaf rake, and 50-foot hose
- Individuals: Please bring a broom and shovel.
- Maintain cleanliness of pens and common areas around livestock pens throughout the fair.
 Check in with Fair Chair (and/or Extension Educator): Two times daily, in the morning and evening for status report on livestock and youth members.
- All Exhibitors: Provide, bedding, feed, water buckets, leads for animals, and snaps for securing gates.

LIVESTOCK PAVILLION DRESS REQUIREMENTS:

- Bottoms: Long pants, capris, or modest shorts
- Footwear: Tennis shoes or boots. NO OPEN-TOES!
- Livestock Badge: Must be worn at all times (pick up and sign in each morning at the Pavilion)

Daily Requirements:

- Daily Sign In: Each individual volunteer (youth & adults) MUST sign in each day at the <u>RED</u> 4-H Information Booth to receive their "Full Access Livestock Badge," a nametag sticker, and a food bracelet (both of which must be worn throughout the fair). The badge will grant all pre-registered/entered exhibitors access to the back area of the livestock pavilion. (Green Chimneys ONLY: Please send an adult representative to the <u>RED</u> 4-H Information Booth with the completed daily sign-in sheet for your group to receive the stickers, badges, and bracelets for each member).
- Barn Greeter: This is not a one-man job. Everyone is expected to interact with the public to answer
 questions, supervise the booths, information table, etc., throughout the fair. These actions will also
 contribute to consideration for the Herdsmanship award.
- Care for Animal: Provide food, water and bedding for your animal as well as keep your animal cool
 and clean. Animal pens and cages will be cleaned regularly, including area underneath poultry and
 rabbit cages.

FRIDAY ONLY (July 26th):

- 10:00AM (Livestock Vet check-in): Each exhibitor responsible for presenting an original valid health certificate to the Fair Veterinarian
- 2:00PM: Swine Showmanship3:00PM: Llama Showmanship

SATURDAY ONLY (July 27th):

- Morning: Each club must provide 1 member/1 adult to assist with the dismantling of the grooming area and setting up of the judging ring (if not already set up).
- **10:00AM 2:00PM:** 2 adults per club will need to assist with judging and moving of animals in and out of the judging ring.
- **10:00AM:** Rabbit Showmanship
- 10:30AM: Cattle, Sheep, & Goats Showmanship
- 2:30PM: Poultry Showmanship
- After Judging: A club or individual must provide representation to assist with clean up of the judging ring/barn.

SUNDAY ONLY (July 28th):

- 9:30AM: 4-H Club Mini Equine Showmanship
- 11:00AM: Livestock Costume Class
- 4:00PM: 4-H Grows Leaders Parade This parade leads up to the 4-H Grows Leaders Awards
- Ceremony that officially concludes the Putnam County 4-H Fair. All youth and clubs are invited and encouraged to march in the parade. The Livestock Fair Chair and/or 4-H Staff will specifically identify animals and appropriate handlers to be a part of this parade.
- **5:00pm 7:00pm:** Each club/ group will provide 2 members/1 adult to help clean up the grounds, assist with the dismantling of pens, the taking down of all pen and cage signs, hauling away (hay & shavings), and clean-up of the barn; *individual exhibitors must provide either 1 youth or 1 adult*.

Daily responsibilities and other duties will be posted in the Livestock Pavilion. All questions, comments and concerns need to be directed to Maureen.

Herdsmanship Awards: (2 may be awarded per livestock area)

Will be awarded to Youth exhibitors who demonstrated outstanding:

- 1. Proper care of animal
- 2. Appearance of pen
- 3. Overall order and cleanliness
- 4. Appearance and conduct of the individual during all three (3) days of the Fair
- 5. Willingness to assume responsibility
- 6. Cooperation with the Livestock Fair Chair, other exhibitors, and the public during the Fair

General Exhibit Guidelines and Timeline for Animal Exhibits to the 4-H Fair

1. Participation

- After July 8, absolutely no entries will be accepted.
- Cloverbuds (5-8 years of age) are not eligible to show or exhibit Large Livestock, Mini Equine, or Horses. Cloverbuds may show Poultry, Rabbits, and small animals.
- 4-H membership is <u>required</u> to show animals at the Putnam County 4-H Fair.
- Putnam residency <u>not</u> required to show animals. However, due to a limited amount of pens and/or cages, animal entries *may be* restricted to those animals shown by Currently Enrolled Putnam County 4-H Members.
- All animals must be in clean condition and exhibitors must have cared for animals by May 1st of current year.
- WALK-INS PROHIBITED: No unregistered animals will be permitted on the fairgrounds including dogs.
- 2. <u>ETHICS</u> The goal of 4-H is to develop caring, responsible youth who will become respected leaders for tomorrow. We expect all Putnam County 4-H Fair exhibitors and parents to ascribe to and maintain the highest standards of ethical practices. This encompasses honesty and integrity in showmanship, herdsmanship, and respect for other exhibitors. Any practices deemed unsafe, inhumane or unethical shall be cause for immediate disqualification. The decision of the CCE Educator and/or Animal Fair Chairs is final.

3. July 8, 2019 - PRE-REGISTRATION FOR ALL EXHIBITS DUE! - 4:00 PM

If you plan to submit exhibits to the fair, you must pre-register each exhibit. Here are the simple guidelines for pre-registration:

Complete appropriate registration forms found in this guide.

Enrollment Fee: There will be a \$8.00 4-H Fair Youth Enrollment fee for participation in animal shows (does not apply to currently enrolled Putnam youth) for those who wish to show animals at the Fair. Go to: http://putnam.cce.cornell.edu/4-h-youth/putnam-county-4-h-fair for the youth enrollment forms – which will be located at the bottom right hand corner of the page.
In order to be eligible to receive a Herdsmanship award, complete the Herdsmanship application found on page 11.
Provide a Certificate of Insurance when required.
RABBITS & POULTRY: A photograph of each animal you register must be attached to your Registration Form.
(All 4-H Fair Registration forms can also be found on our website at <u>putnam.cce.cornell.edu</u> or at the Cornell Cooperative Extension office located at 1 Geneva Road in Brewster. Summer hours are 8 AM – 4 PM.)

Make a copy, for your records, of your completed Registration Form before mailing to our office. Mail, fax (845-278-6761) or drop-off the completed forms to the CCE office by **July 8 at 4 PM.** (Please remember to bring your copy to Exhibit Check-in on July 27 per guidelines.)

- 1. CHECK-IN & SUBMISSION (All animals should be brought to the Fairgrounds at Putnam County Veterans Memorial Park, Gipsy Trail Road, Carmel, NY at the designated dates and times listed below):

 - 10:00 am Large Livestock Vet Check and check-in

NOTE: ALL ANIMALS entering the 4-H Fairgrounds MUST BE Pre-Registered to take part in Showmanship or Demonstration events. Rabbits, Poultry & Livestock must provide all required health documentation and participate in the on-site Veterinary Check-in (listed above) unless given prior approval by the 4-H Program Director and/or Livestock Chairperson. Small Pets and Equine are not required to take part in the veterinary check-in but must submit all required health documentation by deadline as well as any other required forms and insurance documentation. Youth Participants must register by July 8th and pay appropriate fees (see page 13).

ALL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS LISTED IN GUIDE MUST BE MET ... NO EXCEPTIONS: The Putnam County 4-H Youth Development Program Director, Animal Fair Chairs and/or the Putnam County 4-H Fair veterinarian have the authority to request the removal of any animal from the fair, at any time, if in their opinion it is for the health and safety of the animal, other animals and/or fairgoers.

2. JUDGING & AWARDS SYSTEM:

Danish System: The 4-H Youth Development program uses the Danish System as the method for judging Youth Projects. In this system, each individual entry will be judged based on an "ideal" standard set for the specific class, category, animal, etc. Judges' decisions are final!

> Blue Ribbon: "Excellent" - Those exhibits of truly outstanding quality. "Very Good" **Gold Ribbon:** - Those exhibits of above average quality.

"Good" Red Ribbon: - Those exhibits of average quality.

White Ribbon: "Worthy" - Those exhibits of less or below par quality.

Grand and Reserve Champion: Of the exhibits receiving an "EXCELLENT" award, two entries from each class or category will be judged Grand and Reserve Champion. Grand Champion will be awarded in areas with three or more (3) qualifying exhibits; Reserve Champion will be awarded if there are at least four (4) qualifying exhibits.

Cloverbud: Entries will receive ribbons of participation.

General Prohibitions and Requirements

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to or require removal from the fair premises, or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.
 - <u>NOTE</u>: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.
- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

AI-202 (1/19)

Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, alpacas, deer, and misc. ruminants, require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by a Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- All animals must be officially identified. ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED. Note that there are new animal identification requirements for cattle and swine. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

New York Origin Livestock:

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI-61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI (see below).
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

Out of State Origin Livestock:

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of CVI inspection. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a NY fair must be within 30 days of the date of CVI inspection. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a NY state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

Animal Identification

ALL MANMADE ID MUST BE RECORDED

- Cattle must be identified by an official USDA radio frequency identification (RFID) eartag, commonly
 referred to as an "840 RFID tag," or an equivalent official RFID tag if the animal was tagged in another
 country. Cattle which are already identified with 840 visual eartags will be exempt from the 840 RFID
 tag requirement.
- Sheep and goats must be identified by official scrapie identification (see sheep and goat sections below).
- Swine must be identified by an official USDA radio frequency identification (RFID) eartag, commonly
 referred to as an "840 RFID tag" or an equivalent official RFID tag if the animal was tagged in another
 country. Swine which are already identified with 840 visual eartags will be exempt from the 840 RFID tag
 requirement. Nursing piglets do not have to be individually identified if the sow is correctly identified
 on the CVI and the number of piglets in the litter is noted on the CVI.
- Deer/elk must be identified with an official eartag.
- Llamas and alpacas must be identified by official eartag or microchip.
- Misc. ruminants must be identified by unique eartag or microchip.
- A complete written description is sufficient identification for horses entering New York accompanied by a CVI. The description must match the EIA test record. Horse sketches and descriptions should reference color pattern, hair whorls, chestnuts, scars and other markings as necessary to uniquely identify the horse. Tattoos and microchips if any should be included. "Bay, no markings" is not an acceptable description for a CVI or EIA test record.
- <u>NOTE</u>: If you are exhibiting animals identified by microchip, a working reader must be supplied by the exhibitor.
- For questions on animal identification please contact your veterinarian or our office at 518-457-3502.

Rabies Vaccination

- Rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 4 months of age or older on the date of admission to the fair.
- Vaccine must have been administered within the past 12 months. The exception is Imrab LA vaccine used in sheep which protects for 3 years after the second annual vaccination (consult your veterinarian).
- The rabies vaccination requirement must be met on the day of admission even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors. The <u>New York State Fair</u> requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the veterinarian administering the vaccine or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the Category 2 accredited veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.
- <u>NOTE</u>: Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination for dogs is a valid vaccination certificate or a copy of the dog license that contains the rabies vaccination information.

BVD-PI Testing

• All cattle, llamas and alpacas exhibited at NY county fairs or the State Fair must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The testing veterinarian is responsible to makesure the proper test is conducted. This is a once in a lifetime test that must be reported on the required certificate of veterinary inspection. The issuing veterinarian is responsible for verifying the validity of the test, the identification of the animal and recording the test date on the CVI. If a previous test is not verifiable the test must be repeated.

Cleaning and Disinfection

All buildings on the fairgrounds housing animals must be cleaned and disinfected prior to the opening
of the fair and between groups of animals when housing is rotated (Section 50.2 of Agriculture and
Market regulations).

Animal Deaths

Occasionally animal deaths occur at a fair. If a death occurs it must be reported to the state veterinarian
in charge as soon as possible for review. The animal must be promptly removed from the public exhibit
area to a secure location and held for the veterinarian prior to disposal.

Calving, Kidding, and Lambing

 Any cattle, goats, or sheep that calve, kid, or lamb while at a county fair or the State Fair will be ordered removed from the fairgrounds along with their offspring, unless the animals are part of a birthing demonstration.

Commingling of Sheep and Cattle

• Due to the potential spread of malignant catarrhal fever from sheep to cattle, it is strongly recommended that cattle be kept separate from sheep.

Commingling of Swine and Poultry

• Due to the potential spread of influenza viruses it is recommended that swine and poultry be housed in separate locations.

Isolation on Returning Home

• The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin. If any illness is noted in the exhibition animals, the owner should contact their veterinarian immediately.

Individual Species Requirements

Horses

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) is <u>not</u> required for New York origin horses. CVI is required for imported horses. Extended Equine CVIs (EECVIs) are acceptable. For more information on EECVIs, visit http://www.globalvetlink.com.
- Negative Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test is required for all horses 6 months of age or older. The
 horse must be accompanied by a valid negative EIA test record. The sample collection date for the
 qualifying EIA test must have been on or after January 1, 2018 for New York origin horses. For imported
 horses, the EIA test must have been conducted within 12 months prior to entry.
- The EIA test certificate must include a complete description of the horse.
- Rabies vaccination is required for all horses 4 months of age or older (see above).

Cattle

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. Note that there are new identification requirements for cattle (see Animal Identification section above.)
- Rabies vaccination is required for all cattle 4 months of age or older (see above).
- All cattle must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea persistent infection (BVD-PI). The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection.
- All cattle must be vaccinated against bovine respiratory disease complex including bovine respiratory syncytial virus, bovine virus diarrhea, infectious bovine rhinotracheitis and parainfluenza with a product administered in a manner and time frame adequate to confer protective immunity for these diseases for the duration of the fair.

Sheep

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible USDA approved flock tattoo and individual animal ID number or 3) electronic implant device (microchip) if the sheep is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- Rabies vaccination is required for all sheep 4 months of age or older (see above).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the flock of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.

• If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Goats

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved scrapie identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo or 3) a legible USDA approved herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic implant device (microchip) if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic implant ID is recorded on the goat's registration paper. For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 1-866-USDA-TAG (1-866-873-2824).
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing Category 2 accredited veterinarian that the
 herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious
 or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Swine

• Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified. Note that there are new identification requirements for swine (see Animal Identification section above.)

Llamas and Alpacas

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).
- All llamas and alpacas must be negative to an approved test appropriate to detect Bovine Viral Diarrhea
 persistent infection (BVD-PI). The date and results of the testing must be noted on the certificate of
 veterinary inspection.

<u>Poultry</u>

- Poultry (with the exception of doves, pigeons and waterfowl) must be accompanied by 1) results of a
 negative pullorum typhoid test conducted within 90 days prior to exhibition <u>OR</u> 2) proof that the birds
 originated directly from a US pullorum-typhoid clean flock or equivalent flock.
- Poultry qualified by 90 day test must be identified by official leg band.
- Proof of NPIP status must be in the form of an NPIP certificate or purchase receipt containing NPIP
 certification information. If utilizing a receipt it must be dated within 1 year of the date of admission to
 the fair.

Deer/Elk (Cervidae)

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).
- Originate from a herd classified as accredited or qualified under USDA tuberculosis regulations.
- A movement permit obtained from the Division of Animal Industry is required for all deer movements. All CWD and TB program requirements must be met before a permit will be issued. Questions regarding movement permits should be directed to the Division of Animal Industry at 518-457-3971.

Miscellaneous Ruminants

 Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals properly identified (see Animal Identification section above).

Exhibitor Prefair Guidelines

Cattle, Sheep, Goats, Swine, Llamas and Alpacas, Cervids, Misc. Ruminants

- Review the animal health requirements booklet including information for your species **before** your veterinarian arrives to inspect your animals. If you have any questions **ask.**
- Your veterinarian is responsible for inspecting your animals and completing the certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI). Call **early** to avoid the last minute rush when mistakes are made and there is no time to correct.
- Make sure 840 eartags (RFID or visual) are present on cattle and swine and USDA approved scrapie ID is in place on sheep and goats.
- Llamas and alpacas require a microchip or eartag. If a microchip is utilized make sure the veterinarian confirms the microchip ID or places one. If your animal is identified by a microchip, make sure you bring a working reader with you to the fair.
- ALL IDENTIFICATION MUST BE RECORDED. Make sure it is.
- Review the CVI carefully upon receipt to make sure all the information is correct including any required test or vaccination information.
- **DO NOT** stuff it in an envelope and assume all is well. The time to correct is before pulling them out at the fair. The CVI is your document and you share responsibility if it is incorrect.
- If you are **importing** livestock from out of state, make sure the interstate requirements are met and you have a valid **interstate certificate of veterinary inspection.**

Poultry

- Schedule pullorum flock inspection and testing well ahead of the fair if your flock is participating in the NPIP program.
- If you're having your birds tested within 90 days of the fair you must go to a pullorum clinic. Available clinics are listed on the Dept. website. No individual testing is available if you miss a clinic.
- Birds qualified by 90 day test must be identified by official leg band.
- **Bring documentation** with you to the fair in the form of a 1) current NPIP certificate, 2) 90 day test chart or 3) purchase receipt with NPIP certification within 1 year of the date of admission to the fair.

<u>Horses</u>

- NY origin horses must be accompanied by a negative EIA test report. The date of sample collection for the qualifying EIA test must have been on or after January 1, 2018.
- **Imported** horses must be accompanied by an interstate certificate of veterinary inspection with a **negative EIA test** within 12 months. Rabies vaccination information can be incorporated into the CVI.
- Drawing or photograph **must** match the horse.
- Rabies vaccination must be within 1 year of arrival at the fair and be documented by a **signed** rabies certificate or a signed statement on the EIA test chart with the required information (see requirements).

MOST IMPORTANT

• When you are loading your livestock for the trip to the fair take the time to examine them. Make sure they are the same animals that are on the paperwork and, if they are showing any signs of illness, **LEAVE THEM HOME**.

Important Notes on Pullorum Testing and RFID Livestock Identification Tags:

- As of May 13, 2019, the Pullorum test requirement for poultry has been waived for the 2019 fair season for
 poultry of New York origin (as per the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets.) This is due to a nationwide
 shortage of pullorum antigen. This waiver does not apply to poultry from out-of-state. It should be expected that
 testing will resume for the 2020 fair season. Further waiver information can be found on the NYS Department of
 Agriculture's website: https://www.agriculture.ny.gov/AI/AIHome.html.
- As of April 19, 2019, the implementation of a RFID tag requirement, for the identification of cattle and swine, has been delayed until the 2020 fair season (as per the NYS Department of Agriculture and Markets.) Cattle and swine exhibitors for all NYS county fairs and the NYS Fair may use the same types of official ID as were accepted in 2018.



- Follow all Health Regulations as indicated in this guide.
- It is recommended that you consult with a veterinarian or avian specialist about vaccinating poultry against infectious laryngotracheitis (ILT).
- The sale of eggs and/or Poultry is not permitted at the Putnam County 4-H Fair.

Rules & Regulations

- Attach a photo for each animal you are registering to your Pre-Registration Form. Computer printed photos are acceptable. For your convenience you may e-mail photos to ms2648@cornell.edu label subject as "Fair Animal Photo".
- 2. Poultry Showmanship information sheets will be available at the health check-in.
- 3. Exhibitors are required to be present during the Breed and Showmanship Contest at 2:30 P.M., Saturday, July 27th.
- 4. Birds can be picked up at the Fair between 4:00pm 5:00pm on Sunday, July 28th.
- 5. CHICKENS: State if bird is to be judged as a show bird or a production bird. Make sure to state breed in the description.
- 6. Any youth who is showing or displaying chickens, ducks or any bird must provide care for their birds throughout the weekend.
- 7. All exhibitors are responsible for feeding (no wet food permitted) and watering their birds. Water is available at the Fairgrounds; **FEED IS NOT AVAILABLE**.



- 8. All exhibitors must bring their birds in a durable, sturdy carrier that is the appropriate size for their birds. Exhibitor must stay with birds until Poultry Fair Chair has completely checked them in. Cages will be provided during the Fair.
- 9. All exhibitors are responsible for keeping the poultry area clean.
- 10. All poultry must be kept in the barn at night. Any poultry removed from the Poultry Barn will not be allowed to return to the barn. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 11. All exhibitors are expected to participate and bring appropriate materials to assist Poultry Barn clean up on Sunday night. Such materials include, but are not limited to rake(s), broom(s), and or shovel(s).

Poultry Class Descriptions: (Exhibition Options & Definitions) See Pages 22-23

- Showmanship: In showmanship, your primary goal is to develop, groom and present your animal so that it will make the best impression possible on the judge. The showman, dressed professionally, must have total control of the animal at all times, exuding a quiet confidence. The judge will expect the animal to be cleaned properly and fitted according to expectations assigned to each of the varying species of animals. The showman will also be expected to share their knowledge of their show animal with the judge; this knowledge should include details about raising and care of the animal, uses for the animal and knowledge of the animal's body. (Source: http://cceschoharie-otsego.org/resources/4-h-poultry-showmanship-made-easy)
- <u>Breed Conformation</u>: Breed conformation classes are classes where only the animal exhibit is judged, not the showman. The judge evaluates the quality of the animal's pedigree, health, fitness, and cleanliness, checking whether the body structure conforms to the standard type of breed represented. He or she then makes a decision based on the standards each breed is upheld to by the 4-H guidelines. (Source: http://www.ansi.okstate.edu/breeds/poultry)



- Any Cloverbud or Youth wishing to show Rabbits must be an Enrolled 4-H Member by or before July 8. For information regarding Enrollment please contact CCE.
- Rabbit Chairperson reserves the right to dismiss any animal which does not appear to be in good health.
- Follow all Health Regulations as indicated in this guide.
- All rabbits entered in the Fair must be clean, healthy and free from external parasites. Nail must be trimmed.
- NO pregnant does, does with litters, or rabbits under eight (8) weeks of age can be exhibited.
- The sale of rabbits is not permitted at the Putnam County 4-H Fair.

Rules & Regulations

- 1. Attach a photo for each animal you are registering to your Pre-Registration Form. Computer printed photos are acceptable. For your convenience you may e-mail photos to ms2648@cornell.edu label subject as "Fair Animal Photo".
- 2. There is a limit of five (5) entries per Youth exhibitor and two (2) entries per Cloverbud exhibitor. During check-in, exhibitors will be encouraged to sign-up for Rabbit Showmanship and/or Knowledge (Skill-a-thon) Class time-slot. Additional Rabbit Resources will be available upon request and at check-in.
- 3. Rabbits can be picked up between 4:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. on Sunday, July 28.
- 4. Rabbits of any breed may be entered. All animals will receive ribbons. Rabbits are judged based on the 4-H Danish System. Rabbits without proper pedigree papers can be entered in the 'Rabbit Pet Class'.
- 5. Exhibitor **must** provide dishes/bottles for food and water. **Purina Rabbit Chow will be available**. Exhibitor may provide own food if this is not acceptable.
- 6. Exhibitors may line the bottom of the cages with cardboard or wood. Indoor, nylon carpet may not be used to line the rabbits' cages.

- 7. All exhibitors must bring their rabbits in a durable, sturdy carrier that is the appropriate size for their rabbits. Exhibitor must stay with rabbits until Rabbit Fair Chair has completely checked them in. Cages will be provided during the Fair.
- 8. Any rabbit removed from the Rabbit Barn will not be allowed to return to the barn. NO EXCEPTIONS.



- 9. With permission from the Rabbit Committee Chairperson, individuals may enter a rabbit for display only.
- 10. During check-in, any youth (9 and up) showing rabbits are required to sign up for two (2) hours volunteer work in the Rabbit Barn.

Rabbit Class Descriptions: (Exhibition Options & Definitions)

- <u>Rabbit Showmanship:</u> Putnam County 4-H Fair does not require ARBA Standards. Participants are judged based on their age, number of years, experience with rabbits and overall knowledge, skill and appearance of their rabbit.
- Breed: Breed Conformation requires Rabbit Exhibitors provide pedigree papers.
- <u>Pet Rabbits:</u> Rabbits of mixed breed are considered pet class. Putnam County 4-H Fair rabbit entries are judged by 4-H standards which means overall appearance and handle-ability.



<u>Onsite Veterinary Check-in REQUIRED</u>: All livestock for show or exhibition must take part in the on-site veterinary check-in: (unless authorized by the 4-H Program Director and/or Livestock Chairperson)

Friday Morning, July 26th: 10:00 am – Large Livestock Health Vet Check-in

- *Punctual arrival to vet check-in is imperative. Volunteer vets and CCE staff reserve the right to turn away late arrivals.
- **Equine that are not staying at the 4-H Fair are not required to attend Vet Check but must submit all appropriate / required health documentation and registration forms.

- 1. Pre-registration and 4-H Fair Animal Showmanship Enrollment is required by July 8, 2019.
- 2. All Large Livestock (unless otherwise approved by 4-H Program Director) must arrive and be checked by veterinarian on Friday, July 26th, 10:00 a.m. Late Arrivals will not be permitted.
- Feed and Bedding will not be provided and must be provided by exhibitor. All exhibitors are
 required to provide their own buckets. All exhibitors are responsible for keeping the livestock area
 clean.
- 4. All 4-H clubs and individuals showing livestock are required to help with set-up immediately after check-in, Friday, July 26th and clean-up of livestock area (starting at 5:00 pm, Sunday, July 28th).
- 5. Suggested attire for youth showing livestock: neat, clean and appropriately dressed (4-H Club t-shirts are acceptable). For foot safety reasons, it is recommended that livestock exhibitors wear an all-leather shoe/boot. Open toe shoes/sandals may not be worn. FYI: There are ideal standards of dress for certain species, if you are interested in this information call Cornell Cooperative Extension.
- 6. Showmanship will be determined by the following:
 - 1st year experience qualifies as a Junior Showman
 - 2nd year of experience, if showman is 10 years or older, qualifies as Senior Showman

Special Contests

- 1. **Herdsmanship Awards:** Will be awarded to Youth exhibitors who demonstrated outstanding: (1) Proper care of animal; (2) Appearance of pen; (3) Overall order and cleanliness; (4) Appearance and conduct of the individual during all three days of the Fair; (5) Willingness to assume responsibility. All livestock exhibitors must do their own work or they can be disqualified from Herdsmanship Award; and (6) Cooperation with the Livestock Fair Chair, other exhibitors, and the public during the Fair.
- 2. **Livestock Costume Class** will be held after the livestock show. Exhibitors can be part of the costume. The Theme must be printed on 3" x 5" index card and handed to the show secretary upon entering the ring.




