Dairy Discovery Workshop

March 24 & 25, 2023

This is a great opportunity for 4-H'ers interested in Dairy Herd Health & Management. The statewide program for youth ages 14 to 19 years-old is held March 24 & 25 at Cornell University's Frank Morrison Hall. Youth learn about dairy careers by rotating through a series of hands-on stations that focus on specific aspects of the dairy industry. Dairy Discovery workshop topics changes each year but include: Dairy Herd Health and Management, Calf and Heifer Production Management, Quality Milk and Milk Production, Whole Farm Management Planning, and Maximizing the Feed Management Program. Youth who are 14 to 19 years of age on January 1 of the program year and have an interest in dairy cattle and production management are eligible and strongly encouraged to attend (with their parents or chaper-

ones). This program is not limited to any organization, 4-H project members, FFA youth, and others with a dairy interest or desire to learn about dairy are all welcome. 2023 Ontario County-Casella Scholarship



The Ontario County/Casella Waste Management Systems

Scholarship will provide eight \$2,500 scholarships to students who reside in Ontario County and are committed to college-level study in the fields related to environmental science, environmental engineering, agricultural, or waste management. The scholarship is available to selected, college-bound, graduating high school seniors or undergraduate college students, who have been accepted into a recognized (registered) college-level program of study leading to an associate or bachelor's degree. Students must be residents of Ontario County, U.S. citizens or possess permanent resident visas at the time of application; and demonstrate academic proficiency.

Applicants must complete:

- 1. Application Checklist
- 2. Application Form
- 3. A minimum of a three-page essay which addresses the essay criteria in the essay format.
- 4. Most current and an available copy of high school and/or college transcripts.
- 5. For applicants, presently in college, evidence the applicant is in good standing to continue at the institution of higher education in 2023.
- 6. Two letters of reference mailed to the application address. It is highly recommended that applicants request their references early lack of two quality references is often a cause for not being awarded the scholarship.

GUERNSEY CALF SCHOLARSHIP

The Guernsey Calf Scholarship is a great opportunity for youth to get involved in different organizations or programs along with learning about the Guernsey Dairy Breed. Youth who have won this scholarship in the past have had the opportunity to grow personally through learning to care and show their animal, meeting and



mentoring with others in the dairy field, and building long lasting friendships across the dairy community. 2023 SAGES Advancement in Agricultural Studies Scholarship

The Student Association of the Geneva Experiment Station (SAGES) is now accepting applications for the 2023 Advancement in Agricultural Studies Scholarship. SAGES established this scholarship in 2009, and since then has awarded \$14,750 to local high school seniors who have shown leadership in the classroom, in their communities, and who have expressed a desire to pursue higher education in agriculture-related fields of study.

SAGES hopes to build upon this legacy by offering a \$500 scholarship for up to 2 deserving students from the Class of 2023. The scholarship committee will accept applications from graduating seniors. Eligible applicants must be residents or attend high school in the following counties: **Ontario**, **Yates**, **Seneca**, **Tompkins**, **Cayuga**, **Schuyler**, and **Wayne**. Successful applicants must be graduating high



school seniors who intend to enroll in a 2 or 4-year degree program in the agricultural sciences or an agriculturally-related field (examples are listed on the application). Eligible students can obtain application materials by emailing the chair of the SAGES Scholarship Committee, Kathleen Kanaley (kk697@cornell.edu), or from their high school guidance counselor. Applications are due by **April 15**, **2023** and winner(s) will be notified by the end of May.

Jerome Family Scholarship

The Jerome Family Scholarship serves to honor generations of the Jerome Family. Long standing Naples farmers who have celebrated their love for farming by encouraging others who are looking to their future and a career in production Agriculture. This scholarship is a one-time amount of \$500 presented to an Ontario County graduating senior who enrolls at an agricultural school of higher learning. Agricultural Citizenship Scholarship

The Agricultural Citizenship Scholarship will recognize a student who may or may not be pursuing a career in agriculture but who has shown that they are an advocate of agriculture by the clubs they belong too, work they have done, and how they have been part of this industry. This scholarship is a one-time amount of \$500 to an Ontario County graduating senior who has proven that they will continue to be a positive voice for agriculture no matter their college or career path, for the Agricultural Citizenship Scholarship.

Applicants must either reside in Ontario County or attend an Ontario County school. Home school applicants are also welcomed.

New York Farm Bureau's Youth Scholarship

Application Due March 17, 2023

New York high school seniors who are graduating and interested in pursuing a career in agriculture can apply for New York Farm Bureau's Agricultural Youth Scholarship. Eligible students can use the financial award for college or advanced training in the skilled trades. Statewide winners can earn up to \$3,000 towards their future education. The applicant or their family must be a New York Farm Bureau member, and the student must live and/or work a farm or be involved with agriculture in the state. The student must also complete the application which includes writing an essay addressing what they value and stand for in agriculture and life and how these values have impacted their decision to pursue an agricultural career. Scoring will determine the district winners and may include a personal interview. Each district winner will

receive \$250 and then compete for one of two state scholarships worth \$3,000 and \$2,000, based on their submitted applications. A Note from WHEP Club Leader Pete

In Winter, dehydration can be as much or more of a threat than starvation for birds. At this time of year, bird often drink water from melting icicles and puddles. When it is severely cold and there is no available water, they eat snow. It takes alot more energy for birds to thaw snow and for their bodies to bring the freezing temperature of snow to their body temperature (roughly 102 degrees) than it does to take a drink of water. Water is also key to keeping a bird warm in winter, as it is used to preen, or clean and realign, their feathers so that they can maintain the pockets of air next to the skin that retain body heat "
