In December 2022 the Oneida County Conservation Education Days Committee announced the

Grand Prize Winner of the 2022 Conservation Education Days Poster Contest.

The winner was Matteo Viti, a sixthgrade student from Mrs. Fornino's class at Bradley Elementary School in New Hartford.



Posters were selected for superior artistic presentation of one or more of the conservation ideas presented this past year in person at Oneida County 4-H Conservation Education Days at Delta Lake State Park. Additional consideration was given to the content of the caption explaining the idea of the poster.

The 2022 Contest Grand Prize winner received a fishing package valued at \$100, given by the Federated Sportsmen's Clubs of Oneida County, and a framed wildlife



print by wildlife artist Tom Yacovella, an Outdoorsman and Wildlife Artist who passed away in January 2018—awarded in his memory by the Central New York Youth Fishing Educators.

Additional prizes of a 1-year subscription to the NYS Conservationist magazine were given to two winners chosen from each of the classrooms who entered the contest from the following schools: Bradley, ER Hughes, and Myles, New Hartford; Stokes, Rome; JD George, Verona; Clinton; Adirondack; and New York Mills. Subscriptions were donated by the Federated Sportsman's Clubs of Oneida County, Inc.

Awards and Recognition County Project Medals and Outstanding Awards

County Project Medal Criteria

Traditional 4-H youth who submit specific project(s) that are judged and on display at the Oneida County Boonville Fair within the current 4-H year may be eligible for a County Project Medal

Medals are grouped into specific categories by similar topics. Specific medal requirements are outlined below.

4-H Cloverbuds will receive a certificate of accomplishment.

Creative Sciences

Archery- Must have completed at least 6 hours of archery instruction and earned a blue ribbon for an archery themed project entered in the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Arts and Crafts- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the arts and craft section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Clothing and Textiles- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the clothing and textiles section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Food and Nutrition- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the food and nutrition section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Home Environment- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the home environment section the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Performance Arts- Must have completed at least 6 hours of instruction and or performance and earned a blue ribbon for a performance arts themed project entered in the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Photography- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the photography section the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Robotics-Must have competed at least 6 hours of robotics instruction or participated in a competition and earned a blue ribbon for a robotics themed project entered in the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Safety- Must have received a certification in a specific safety course and earned a blue ribbon for a safety themed project at the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

STEM, Electrical, Woodworking- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the STEM section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Natural Resources

Entomology- Must receive at least three blue ribbons for projects submitted in the entomology section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair

Horticulture-Must receive at least three blue ribbons for projects submitted in the horticulture section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Natural Resources- Must receive at least three blue ribbons for projects submitted in the natural resources section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Personal Development

Community Service- Must have completed and logged in at least 6 hours of community service into the on-line Faces of 4-H registration. To count towards a Medal the hours must directly support Oneida County 4-H Program. Hours must be from the current 4-H year and youth is required to submit a community service based project that earned a blue ribbon at the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Public Presentations/Horse Communications- Must have received a blue ribbon for their current year County Level Public Presentation or a Horse Communication.

Leadership– Must have performed at least 6 hours of leadership and earned a blue ribbon for a leadership themed project submitted for the Oneida County Boonville Fair. Hours must be logged in on line and

Creative Communications- Must have received 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted into the communications section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Animal Science

County Project Medals are awarded to all youth who show an animal and receive a blue ribbon at the Oneida County Boonville Fair within the current 4-H year.

Outstanding Awards

Youth ages 13+ must submit a on-line application requesting an interview to be considered for an Outstanding Award. Youth may apply for one or more of the Outstanding Awards. Each award is listed below along with the specific Award Trip associated with it.

Creative Sciences—STARR-TBA
Animal Science—Career Exploration-Cornell
Natural Resources—Teen Winter Weekend TBA
Personal Development—Capital Days-Albany

Applicants should demonstrate Outstanding participation within multiple topics that fall within the categories listed below. (For a list of what topics fall within the categories please see the County Project Medals criteria.) Applicants will participate in a face to face interview where their current years activities will be discussed.



Outstanding Animal applicants should be prepared to talk about the care and management of their project animals, including but not limited to health records, breeding production, nutrition, income, expenses, etc.....

Creative Science Applicants should be able to discuss the projects they have completed within this area including what they learned, challenges they faced, how they overcame those obstacles and how these projects have led them to try and expand their interests in other ways.

Natural Resources applicants should be able to share the knowledge they gained from their projects with the interviewer. They should demonstrate an understanding of topics like invasive species, pesticides, herbicides and organic alternatives.

Personal Development applicants should be able to communicate the importance of volunteerism and show how they have grown through their community service and or leadership experiences.

The information supplied will enable us to determine how many judges and in what categories they are

needed.

Pre-registration will also allow us to print out the Exhibitor's Cards (Eliminating the need for you to hand write them)

We are limiting the number of exhibits a youth can submit Cloverbuds no more than 7 and Traditional 4-H Members no more than 12.

One of our most common questions is

What type of Projects can I enter in the Fair?

Almost anything can turn into a 4-H Project.

In simplified terms this is how to submit a project for the Boonville Fair.

- 1. Do something:)
- 2. Review the Fair Book to decide what section and class the item belongs.
- 3. Enter the projects that you want to submit in the on line registration. Due by July 1st
- 4. Bring your item to CCE Oneida for evaluation.
- 5. When youth are called, take your item to the judge. He/She will ask you to explain: The Who , What, When, Where, Why and How of your project.
- 6. After all your projects are evaluated you can go home.
- 7. Projects are left with Staff and taken to be set up at The Boonville Fair.
- 8. Projects can be picked up after 7 pm the last day of the Fair or at the office 1 week after the Fair.
- 9. Youth earn premium money for the projects they submit.
- 10. Projects Selected for the State Fair should be picked up and inspected, repaired or improved before being dropped off at the office to be taken to the State Fair. State Fair Projects must also be registered on line.

About Face to Face Evaluations for the Fair

Youth wishing to submit projects for the youth building are required to participate in Face to Face judging. While meeting with someone and speaking about their project may sound very intimidating, the experience and procedure is very simple especially for Cloverbuds. First it is important to understand that Cloverbud youth are not "Judged or Scored."

At every age level, especially Cloverbud, the goal is to encourage the youth to continue trying new things and to be excited to tell others what and how they did it. If you as a parent have concerns about your child participating in this activity or any activity I would suggest that you and your child attend, observe and participate in the actual judging event prior to submitting projects for the fair. For many the fear of the unknown is a major inhibitor. Once you and your child participate or observe the event you will have a better understanding of the procedure which will make it easier for you and your child to prepare for future participation.

During the evaluation process youth will speak with a volunteer judge about their project. They will be asked how they did the project, what they liked, what they would do different, what they learned, if they faced any challenges? Judges can also offer suggestions on ways to improve or offer suggestions on techniques they may want to try in the future.

While the project itself is important, this activity is also an opportunity for youth to improve their speaking skills. If the youth enjoyed a project so much that they want to submit it for the fair then they should be excited to tell others about it.

Communication is a key component of youth development and this allows youth an opportunity to practice and learn without the pressures associated with Formal Public Speaking.

Faux Stained Glass for the Boonville Fair 2023

Supplies:

- Frame
- Sharpie Markers in various colors including black
- Coloring pattern (See gingerbread man example)
- Frame
- Aluminum Foil






1. Select pattern. Choose a design/pattern that has large simple shapes. You can use coloring book pages or search the web for actual stained glass patterns. Do not choose anything with letters or words. I suggest you use a design/pattern that is black and white.

- 2. Remove the back of the frame by lifting the small metal tabs. Insert the coloring page into the frame and secure the back by bending the tabs back into place. The design/pattern should now be under the glass.
- 3. Using the black Sharpie Marker start tracing the basic outline of your design/pattern. You should be drawing on the glass that is in the frame. Make sure the black line is dark and well defined. This represents the lead of the "Stained Glass". NOTE make sure you remind the youth that they are drawing on glass and if they press hard or lean heavily the glass may break.
- 4. Once the black lead line is complete start filling in your design with different sharpie colors. You need to color everything so it is **solid**. You do not want to see any of the white paper from your original design.
- 5. When everything is colored in completely, open the frame by bending those metal tabs. Remove the back and your paper design/pattern.
- 6. Carefully remove the glass from the frame.
- 7. Flip the glass over and put it back into the frame. The side you colored should now be "inside the frame" (This way you can clean the outside and not wipe away the sharpie marker coloring.)
- 8. Grab some Aluminum Foil and wrinkle it up. Be careful not to rip it.
- 9. Flatten out the foil. Make sure it is big enough to cover the inside of the frame. Bigger is better.
- 10. Place the shiny side of the foil in the frame. The shiny side should be touching the glass.
- 11. Put the back on the frame.
- 12. Fold over extra foil or cut it if it is sticking out from behind the backing.
- 13. Fold the metal tabs in to secure your frame.

The diagram below shows you how your project should be layered when it is complete and ready to hang



Seed Art for the Boonville Fair 2023

Supplies:

- Frame
- Glue
- Seeds
- 1. Remove the back of the frame by lifting the small metal tabs.
- Carefully remove the glass and discard.
- 3. Put the back on the frame.
- 4. Plan out your seed design and start gluing seeds to the inside of the back of the frame.
- 5. Once your design is complete leave it flat on a table till the glue hardens.



Faux Stained Glass*

If you enjoy coloring with sharpie markers then this simple craft project is perfect for you.

Please take the time to register so that we can give you the proper frame to use for this project.

If you aren't sure how to do this project we are offering craft workshops in 2023. Can't come to the workshop then when you pick up the frame I can show you what you need to do.

You can carve it with simple tools like paperclips or a bobby pin.

We will be offering a class on this project in January. Check out the County Craft Club registration

Since we are not providing any supplies for this project there is no need for you to register. However to show it at the Boonville Fair you will need to register it.

This will fall under Section DB Class D in the 2023 Boonville Fair Book.

Changes for the Youth Building

The ultimate goal is that the youth be more involved in the items that are being sent for evaluation to the State Fair. This could mean rethinking how projects are evaluated, thus a change to the evaluation sheet. They also wanted to update the Photography section of the fair book.

In anticipation of these changes, and I am sure more changes coming in the future, I think we are going to be proactive and come up with a procedure that will not only work now but for the future.

Boonville Fair Judging and procedures will remain the same. The fair book may change but you will still go on line and register your projects and come to judging here at CCE.

What will change will be the procedure for sending things to the State Fair.

Youth will only be able to send one project to the State Fair*.

Now before you start yelling at me.

There were comments that overall 4-H Projects in the Youth building (NOT JUST OUR BOOTH) were not "the Best" and up to standards and they do not want to see duplications. Therefore Staff needs to come up with a way to screen the projects. Combine that with the fact that they are going to expect much more input from the youth on the written self evaluation. Changes will need to be made.

I do not want us to become one of those counties that sends: one photograph, one article of sewing, one cake or one drawing. I prefer to put the power in the hands of our youth.

Therefore if a 4-H Member has multiple things selected to go to the State Fair, that youth will select the best one of those projects. They will then put the time and effort into that one project to take it to the next level and make it truly "The Best." This could mean creating a step by step guide or poster to go along with it. As new information becomes available we will keep you posted on the changes.

NEW YORK YOUTH LIVESTOCK "NON-OWNERSHIP" POLICY

The exhibitor, upon request to the event sponsor, shall provide proof of ownership of any exhibit.

This **certificate** verifies that a 4-H member in New York has enrolled this animal as a 4-H Project Animal by June 1 of the current year.

For all "non-owned" animals, the 4-H member and the owner of the animal have entered an agreement. A lease agreement allows a 4-H member to use the specified animal as a 4-H project.

Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) encourages the use of written lease agreements, however, it is the responsibility of the exhibitor and the animal owner to agree upon the lease terms. Neither CCE nor Cornell University is legally involved in writing, implementing or terminating any lease agreements.

The following bill was legally adopted by the NYS Department of Agriculture & Markets July 1987.

Exhibits shall have been owned by the exhibitor for a period of at least (30) days prior to the entry of the exhibit provided, however, that any animal exhibit entered in a youth fair, youth exhibition or 4-H show or exhibition shall have been in the care of the exhibitor for a period of at least (60) days prior to entry of the exhibit.

CCE staff and state program administrators have maintained the following philosophy since 1987.

Non-owner/lease opportunities are intended for youth who do not already own an animal of this type. For exhibition purposes, youth are limited to one non-owned breeding class animal of this type.

Specific for Equine:

The only approved NYS Horse Program exceptions are donkey, mule, miniature equine, and driving equine (used only for driving). In which cases a youth may own or lease an equine and also lease a donkey, mule, miniature equine, and driving equine (used only for driving).

REMEMBER TO:

- Include a copy of your CURRENT <u>COGGIN'S TEST</u> (Test dated this year or last year)
- Include proof of <u>RABIES VACCINATION</u> (Must be current; dated this year, given more than 14 days prior to the arrival to the Fairgrounds and remain current for the duration of the Fair)
- Please make sure the horse's name on the Coggins and Rabies Certificates <u>matches</u> the horse's name listed on the Horse Certificate!
