Poultry Exhibitors - Pullorum Testing to show at Fairs

Pullorum- an infectious, bacterial, poultry disease caused by the bacterium Salmonella pullorum. The disease affects mainly young chicks and pullets, but can also affect older chickens, game birds, guinea fowl, ostriches, parrots, peafowl, ring doves, sparrows and turkeys.

Birds must be tested for pullorum-typhoid in order to attend New York fairs and shows. The testing date for Schaghticoke Fair is 7/15/23 from 8:30 am – 11:30 am. Fair Clean Up

On **Wednesday**, **August 16th** 4-H families from across Rensselaer County will gather at the fairgrounds to clean out the winter cobwebs and spruce up for the fair. Although the majority of 4-H'ers display projects in the 4-H Building, there is a relatively small crew of volunteers to clean up and set up. Everyone is asked to chip in to help. Remember - many hands make light work! Cleanup will start at 1 PM for those available, "Make and Take" workshops at 4 PM followed by finishing cleaning and setup in the 4-H Building and Barns. Since attendance at Fair Clean-Up Day has fallen off in recent years, the clean-up/set-up process has been streamlined. Display dividers are no longer covered with new paper on fair clean-up day. Clubs should keep this in mind when preparing their stationary exhibits. Paper will be available during judging and exhibit set-up for clubs that need to cover the dividers.

The fair schedule often conflicts with back-to-school activities, so members and volunteers should mark the dates on their calendars and be prepared to plan ahead in order to be able to fit everything in.

General Interest Evaluations

There will again be two General Interest Judging Days this year, Saturday, August 26th from 9-11am and Monday, August 28th from 4-7pm. **All perishable entries can only be evaluated on Monday August 28th (foods, vegetables, horticulture)** General Interest entries are due on or before August 16th (Fair Clean Up Day).

Prepare for the Fair

All of the pages of the 4-H Schaghticoke Fair book are crammed full of important information, rules, and regulations. **And there are some changes this year!** It can be a daunting task to try to figure out what to enter, and where to enter it. Leaders, parents, and members are encouraged to call the 4-H office with questions about any of the classes or projects listed in the fair book.

Now is the time to ask questions about projects that may fall outside of recognized 4-H curricula.

Help us avoid disappointments on judging days. We certainly don't want members showing up with items that cannot be evaluated by our judges.

Unfortunately, 4-H members often bring wonderful items to the fair only to find out they are not suitable for exhibit in the 4-H Building. 4-H leaders can be our first line of defense in preventing this disappointment. As we approach fair time, please remind your members that not everything we do and not everything we make during the project year is eligible to exhibit at the fair. Leaders should use their fair book as a guide. If your club has made something or worked on a project that does not fit into a category in the fair book, it is probably not appropriate for exhibit in the CCE Building and cannot be evaluated by our judges. If you have any questions, please call the 4-H office. If we cannot find a way to make projects fit into the CCE Building, we can help you enter in the Open Class.

Please be sure to remove all tags and ribbons from your project, repair any damage that may have occurred during the year, make sure it is neat and clear. Pack it securely for transport to the State Fair.

Horse Project Paperwork

Due June 1st

Members who plan to show their horse at 4-H Horse Shows this year need to be sure their information is up to date in the office. All members will need to have a current rabies (dated 2023), either a 2022 or 2023 negative Coggins test as well as Project horse certificate by June 1st. Additionally, you will need to be sure you have a current riding evaluation on file in the office for the proper level you will be riding this year. If you are using the same horse/s as the 2022 season all you will need to do is send in your rabies and negative Coggins. If you are riding the same horse/s and level as 2022 you will be set for this year. If this is not the case you will need to submit an updated riding evaluation before our first county wide riding event. If you are participating in the 3 Day Clinic, you will need to bring updated proof of vaccination and Coggins test. Contact Bernie if you have any questions – <u>bw27@cornell.edu</u>.



Embracing the Dandelion

The dandelion is one of the most common flowers dotting our landscape. While typically referred to as a weed and often viewed as an invasive species this amazing plant is an important and beneficial part of our ecosystem. Dandelions are not native to the Americas. It is believed that they were introduced by the Pilgrims who planted them for their medicinal properties. Dandelions are said to have reached the west coast prior to any European settlers. They spread amazingly fast through airborne seeds and as many gardeners know they are impossible to get rid of entirely. Because of their deep taproots and tendency to reseed perpetually herbicides are ineffective at eradicating dandelions. Dandelions are here to stay. So knowing that we will never be able to win the battle against dandelions, we might as well embrace them as an ally. The following list are a few of the many reasons why we should all embrace dandelions.

1. **Are really good for your lawn**- Dandelions have deep taproots that loosen the soil aiding in aeration and the soil's ability to absorb water. In addition the roots of dandelions move minerals and nutrients from deeper in the earth to the surface where they can be used by growing grass. Dandelions can both aerate and fertilize lawns making them healthier while also supporting pollinators and native wildlife. Dandelions actually improve the quality of the soil in which they grow! Dandelions are here to stay and beneficial in many ways so let's appreciate them for all that they can offer us.

2. **Not as invasive as other plants**- Dandelions are prolific but do not tend to outcompete native wildflowers. They do not tend to take over the habitats of native plants. They are considered most problematic as a lawn weed where they are actually highly beneficial by supplying needed nutrients, minerals and aeration.

3. **Pollinators need them-** Due to their early bloom time dandelions provide pollen and nectar for pollinators when there are few other sources available for insects who will later pollinate our crops and native plants. Pollinators are in decline and need the early season help provided by dandelions. Many pollinators are able to visit dandelions due to their inviting open flower. They provide an easy meal for insects.

4. **Animal food-** The seeds of dandelions are an important food source for a large number of birds and rodents. Dandelions are a key piece at the base of the food chain. Domestic chickens also use dandelion greens to collect needed spring nutrients helping to develop rich yellow yolks.

5. **People food-** With proper preparation all parts of the dandelion can be edible and provide many health benefits. Dandelion greens and roots are sold in grocery stores and can cost over \$30 per pound. Never attempt to harvest wild edible plants for consumption without proper training. 4-H offers training and curriculum for youth and adults on the collection of wild edibles. Contact the office for more information.

6. **Medicinal use-** Dandelions have historically been used as diuretics, for a host of stomach and skin issues and to treat inflammation. Dandelion root tea is sold commercially as a detoxifying kidney flush.
