

Public Presentations Guidelines

Time Expectancy: Cloverbud: 1-3 minutes 1st year: 3-5 minutes 2nd– 4th year: 3-8 minutes 5th year and up 10-15 minutes Experienced Presenters have served as Teen Evaluators Pick a topic you like

- Keep it simple- you can do a lot of detail with a simple idea
- Prepare your presentation
- Gather your information
- Prepare your posters
- Develop an outline
- You should have an introduction (a question, quotation, or statistic that arouses interest in your topic– something that draws the audience into your presentation)
- * Your presentation should explain a topic
- And a conclusion should sum up what you explained. You should also ask if anyone has any questions.

Practice what you are going to say.

Practice what you are going to do. This is very important. Make sure you handle your equipment, ingredients, diagrams, models, or posters comfortably.

- This should be a positive and meaningful experience.
- Listen to the comments from your evaluators.
- Ask questions so you understand.
- Review the written evaluation.



This annual state-wide event brings teens from across New York State to Cornell University for 3 days. Youth will participate directly with Cornell University faculty and students to explore a variety of program areas. Additionally, youth have the opportunity to create lasting friendships with other 4-H'ers from across the state. This is an overnight trip, youth stay in university housing and receive meals at university cafeterias. The county 4-H program provides partial scholarships to 4-H members based on application materials.

Requirements:

- 2. Activity Log Fillable PDF can be found on our website—should reflect activities from the most current completed year.
- 3. Resume:
 - The resume should be one page in length (one-sided).
 - It should be printed in a size 10 or 12 Arial or Times New Roman font. (Utilize your margins) sleek and simple is best, keep it consistent and stick with basic colors.
 - Spell-check and proofread words may be spelled correctly but will not be picked up by spellcheck.

- Your Resume must include:
 - Professional Summary
 - 4-H Project Work including 3-5 life skills that were obtained within each project area (see list of 4–H projects on the members and leader's forms of our website)
 - 4-H Leadership and Participation
 - o School Summary
 - Community Activities

How to Write Your Résumé

Professional Summary

This is a statement explaining why you should be chosen to attend the Award Trip, and what you are hoping to get out of the trip. This statement will give the Trip Committee an idea of why you want to

attend the Award Trip. Future employers will read this to understand why you want to apply for a job with their company. We look forward to reading everyone's summary.

Make a list of all of your 4-H projects then select 3 to 5 projects that you feel best represent you.

- Your resume is a great way to show your accomplishments and qualifications.
- You want to present a strong statement concisely.
- Remember— quality is more important than quantity.

Think about those 3-5 projects.

- Written in a paragraph or bulleted format show the depth and scope of the project area (how long you have worked in that project area and how you have progressed). What you did.
- Then highlight 3 to 5 life skills you have learned or sharpened for each project area. (see life skills model on the website). These should be in bullet format.

4-H Projects

Sewing and Textiles (2020– present)

While working on several sewing projects which included a blanket, dress, and numerous small projects, many skills were attained; how to use a sewing machine, matching seams, and ironing.

- Self-motivation has improved through this project
- Many decisions and planning had to take place while working on these sewing and textiles projects and this has helped in other areas outside the project area as well
- Self-confidence was obtained when others complimented the finished projects.

Leadership roles and participation

- Be brief organize and consolidate your leadership roles
- Combine roles, when possible, e.g., Teen Council (President, Vice President, Secretary) or State Fair Teen Assistant (County Booth, Poultry Exhibit, Press Corps)

School Summary (This should be smaller in comparison to 4-H project work and participation because this is a 4-H resume, think of who your audience is when writing)

- Course of study and special interest courses
- Extracurricular activities
- Awards and honors
- Extra-curricular activities

Community Activities:

• Select the most important- Remember "quality vs. quantity." If you must shorten your list, include activities that you have participated in the longest. A wide variety of activities is not always a good idea, especially if you have tried things and moved on. Colleges and employers are looking for commitment.



Tradition of the Yule Log At Dyken Pond Center, December 10th - 1pm – 3pm

The Dyken Pond Center celebrates uniquely every December. Every year, the Center hosts a Yule log celebration, and you are invited! The Yule log celebration roughly coincides with the winter solstice which is the shortest day of the year and occurs on December 21, 2023. Following the winter solstice, the days increase in length which is a true cause for celebration!

Yule logs have been a seasonal tradition for Centuries and have their origins in Europe. Imagine that the days keep getting shorter and shorter and you have no explanation as to why. That is exactly what people were experiencing in the 1600s when the tradition of the Yule log began. Yule logs were burned to coax the sun to return for longer and track higher through the sky. There is much mystery around the origins of Yule log celebrations and numerous traditions associated with these gatherings. At Dyken Pond, our celebration touches on a lot of these traditions in our unique way.

Our celebration begins with an explanation of the science behind the winter solstice. We talk about why the days have been getting shorter, provide an explanation of the changing seasons, and allow youth to move around a campfire in the manner of the earth circling the sun. We then provide clues as to the location of the hidden Yule log. The group goes out into the forest, finds the Yule log, and rings a bell to alert the others that it has been found. We then work as a team to carry it back to the campfire where it is burned and enjoyed. Historically Yule logs were so large that they burned for several days. The celebration traditionally lasted as long as the log. Our Yule log is a more manageable size and only burns for a short time. As the log burns one tradition is to make a wish for the coming year when you see sparks fly up from the fire. Another tradition that we follow is to not burn the log completely and to save a portion to start the following year's Yule log fire. It is considered good luck to do this and bad luck to burn the log completely.

Once the log is burning on the fire there is time to visit around the fire while enjoying some seasonal refreshments. Greens are available to make holiday arrangements. The Yule Log Celebration is a unique event that kicks off the Winter in a festive and fun way. We hope that you can join us! The program is free but we ask that you preregister at (518) 658-2055 or jp844@cornell.edu. If you want to bring a treat to share, feel free to but there is no pressure to bring anything other than yourselves!
