Steuben's 4-H Program Recognized at CCE Steuben's Annual Dinner

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Steuben County announced several awards at their 2021 Annual Meeting held November 12th at Barrelhouse 6 Distillery. CCE Steuben Executive Director Tess McKinley recognized the support the organization has had from so many people as the reason for its strong mission of putting knowledge to work in Steuben County.



For the first time since its inception, CCE Steuben selected an outstanding youth to recognize at their event. The organization's first ever Outstanding Youth Award went to Braxtyn Elliott. Elliott has been a dedicated Steuben County 4-H member for 11 years and has become an aspiring leader to her fellow 4-H peers. She has been president of her 4-H club for four years, participates in community service projects with the club, has achieved highest honors at the at the Steuben County Fair and across New York State exhibiting her livestock, and is an active Junior Leader at the count level, leading multiple workshops on a variety of topics. Additionally, Braxtyn participated in the New York

State Ag Innovators Experience as a local teen participant, but also was selected to be a New York State Teen Leader for the project.

The Lifetime Achievement Award was the second award of the evening that showcased the amazing dedication within the 4-H Program at CCE Steuben. This award went to Phyllis Rathbun. Rathbun started her 71st year this fall as leader of the Willing Workers 4-H Club. She started the club at age 16 with 25 members and the club quickly grew to 40-60 members per year. Her club has a strong junior leader program and over the years her members have taken top honors in county, district, state and national events and award trips. Rathbun judges at the county level and has been recognized by New York State 4-H for her impact on youth and dedication and advocacy of the 4-H Program. She received the NYS Salute to excellence Lifetime Volunteer Award in 2004 and the New York State Fair Volunteer of the Day in 2006.

Please Note 4-H Office Policy!!!!

Any items, Achievement Night items, Banquet items, Fair items, etc., left in the 4-H Office over 60 days from the date you are notified will be disposed of as the 4-H Staff deems reasonable. You will receive one phone call or email notification. It will be noted on each item the date that you were notified. Please make sure items are picked up, for you or your club, in a timely manner.

2023 Fair Premiums

All 4-H members who exhibit a project in the 4-H Division at the 2023 Steuben County Fair are required to turn into the CCE Office at least one record on their project by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, September 18, 2023 to be eligible to receive 2023 Fair Premiums for that project. If you fail to meet the September 18th deadline or the record is incomplete, fair premiums will NOT be awarded for that project.

EXCEPTION – Market Animal Projects sold through the sale must have a <u>completed</u> market record turned in for that Market Animal to ID a market animal the following year

4-H Tractor and Machinery Operation Certification Program Registration Due January 2 with course Starting January 16th

Youth who will be 14 and over as of January 16, 2023 can take the course for certification. Participants who want to earn their certification must pass both the written exam and the driving test. 2022 Dairy Discovery



Pheasant Chick Project

The Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) will be distributing day-old pheasant chicks for rearing and release projects to 4-H Youth. All state pheasants are hatched and delivered from the DEC Reynolds Game Farm in Ithaca. Parents, leaders, or other volunteers who are willing to oversee and assist youth with this project are expected to become familiar with the DEC's Cooperative Day-Old Pheasant Chick Program Guide and DVD. CCE-Steuben can provide you with

Release of Pheasants: All pheasants must be released before December 1 of the current year & on land open to public hunting. Pheasants cannot be released until they are at least 8 weeks old (this allows the growing birds time to acclimate to the environment in an outdoor pen). Birds should never be released to the outdoors directly from the brooding facility.

these materials!

For those interested in starting a pheasant rearing program, there are a number of responsibilities the person overseeing the project should plan on. You'll be responsible for reviewing program requirements, discuss rearing techniques, and explain project expectations with the youth you are overseeing. You'll also be responsible for inspecting rearing facilities and evaluating the release site, in order to ensure proper rearing and release

condition for the birds. The youth & adult volunteer usually monitor progress together and share their experiences with other participants at 4-H meetings. The number of pheasants released is recorded at the end of the project.

In addition to the actual rearing project, leaders may choose to integrate other wildlife management strategies. Pheasants could be banded and released at different ages and on different sites to monitor mortality and survival. With landowner permission, habitat at the release site could be improved to benefit pheasants and other wildlife. There are many opportunities to expand the rearing and release program to include additional wildlife conservation activities.

The Great Backyard Bird Count

The Great Backyard Birds Count is February 18-21, 2022. This annual four-day event engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are across the continent. Anyone can participate, from beginning bird watchers to experts. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one or more of the count days, anywhere they like. It's free, fun, and easy—and it helps the birds. Then they enter their counts on the Great Backyard Bird Count web site https://www.birdcount.org/. The Great Backyard Bird Count is led by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and National Audubon Society, with Canadian partner Bird Studies Canada and is sponsored by Wild Birds Unlimited. Cornell Information Technologies, Natural Resources Conservation Service, and National Science Foundation. As tallies pour in from around the United States and Canada, everyone can watch the results in real time.

4-H Spring Garden Meeting


All 4-H members, leaders, and parents are invited to attend the annual 4-H Spring Garden Meeting.

DOG OBEDIENCE CLASSES

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Steuben County's 4-H Program is currently offering dog obedience classes for youth. Classes are typically held every other Monday from 5:00-6:30 pm at the Howard Community Building – monthly dates will be posted in Monday Memos.

4-H members and dogs who attend the NYS 4-H Dog Show <u>must</u> participate in the Steuben County Fair Dog Show. Dogs must be at least six months old to be exhibited at the Steuben County Fair or the NYS Fair.

Please see the following requirements necessary to complete PRIOR TO ATTENDING ANY OBEDIENCE CLASSES:

- 1) Complete the NYS 4-H Dog Registration form <u>http://bit.ly/nysdogregistration</u>
- 2) Provide the CCE Office with a copy of the dogs current rabies certificate

3) Youth ages 5-18 as of January 1, 2022 must be enrolled in the Steuben County 4-H



Program before attending classes

All dogs must conform to the rules and regulations of the Livestock Health requirements as determined by the Department of Agriculture and Markets. Dogs must have current vaccinations for rabies, distemper, hepatitis, parvovirus and leptospirosis (as appropriate for their age). It is highly recommended to also have your dog vaccinated for Bordetella and parainfluenza virus. Participants should consult their veterinarian for further information about these vaccines as well as internal and external parasite control programs.

When former members of 4-H are asked what helped them the most in preparing for their adult years, the answer was doing public presentations. The reason for this is that it prepared them to organize information and be able to get up in front of a group at work, in the community or at a club meeting and feel comfortable. With this in mind, the 4-H Program Committee decided that everyone in 4-H should do a presentation each year, whether it is at the county or club level. Remember, a 4-Her's total involvement in 4-H is considered when selecting for most awards and trips.

ALL 4-H members ages 8 and up as of January 1, 2021 are required to participate in the public presentation program to receive any project completion. Cloverbuds are strongly encouraged to do a presentation but it is not mandatory. In addition to the County presentations, there is another option of presenting at a Club Meeting and being "judged" by one of the leaders of the club. If you are an independent member, you can give your presentation to family and friends, and have a parent complete the club level evaluation form. The Club Presentation is meant to be just a **stepping stone for a year or two**, and the member should then attend the county level event. A club level presentation does **NOT** make a 4-H member eligible to be selected to participate in District Public Presentations.

If members 8 and over as of January 1, 2022 do not give a public presentation at the club or county level, then you do not receive a project completion sticker AND the club does not receive 100% completion.


Types of Presentations

Public Presentations is one of our larger county events with 4-H members of all ages participating. By preparing and participating in a Public Presentation, youth will

Develop poise ♦ Build confidence ♦ Gain leadership skills ♦ Develop reasoning skills

Learn to organize their thoughts in order to get their point across

Participation in this county-wide event also helps qualify youth for many of the Award Trips offered through the 4-H Program. So why not get started. Just pick your topic; prepare an outline; practice, practice, practice; and present.



Remember the four "P" of presenting:

P#1 - Plan – Select a topic about something you are interested in telling people about or learning more about. Think about your topic and plan what you want to say, how you will show the audience "how-to" if it is a demonstration.

P#2 – **Prepare** – After you have selected a topic, think about how you will present the topic. Prepare a poster (unless it is a public speaking), various steps of the finished product or other visuals that will help you explain your topic to give an effective presentation.

P#3 – **Practice** - Practice, practice! The more you "run through" your presentation, the easier it will be on the actual presentation day.

P#4 – Present – Present your 4-H Presentation at the club level or at the County Level on February 24 or July (TBA) in Bath


4-H Market Rabbit Project

Steuben County 4-H members (8-18 years old as of January 1, 2022) will have an opportunity to raise meat rabbits to be consigned to the Steuben County 4-H & FFA Market Animal Sale to be held on Saturday, August 20th at the Steuben County Fairgrounds. **4-H Cloverbud members are ineligible to participate in the Market Animal Project.**

Meat Rabbits can be a purebred American Chinchilla, Argente Brun, Bevern, Blanc de Hotot, Californian, Champagne de Argent, Cinnamon, Crème de Argent, Flemish Giant, Florida White, Giant Chinchilla, Harlequin, Palomino, New Zealand, Satin, Silver Fox or a cross of these breeds. Two (2) market rabbits can be entered in the Roaster Class and must be 5-8 pounds and under 6 months of age; entries are consigned to the 4-H & FFA Sale. If the Roaster rabbits are under 5 lbs or over 8 lbs they cannot be sold through the sale but could be entered in the Pet Class if you do not already have 6 entries in Sections I-III. Rabbits' ages are computed as of the opening day of the fair, Tuesday, August 16, 2022. Only Rabbits receive a Blue/Excellent Ribbon will be sold through the Market Animal sale on Saturday, August 20th, 2022.

4-H Rabbit & Cavy Projects

Exhibitors will be allowed to enter and show up to 6 rabbits in the breed show with 2 additional Market Rabbits.
Exhibitors may show 4 Cavies at County Fair. All rabbits and must be owned by the exhibitor by June 15 to be eligible to show at the Steuben County Fair.





2022 4-H Market Chicken & Turkey Projects

Steuben County 4-H members (ages 8-18 as of January 1, 2022) will have an opportunity to raise market chickens and/or turkeys to be consigned to the Steuben County 4-H & FFA Sale to be held on Saturday, August 20, 2022 at the Steuben County Fairgrounds. There will be a class in the Steuben County Fair 4-H Poultry Division for Market Chickens Consigned and a class for the Market Turkeys. 4-H members will be allowed to enter one pen of 2 chickens in the market chicken consigned class and sell the pen of 2 market chickens through

the sale. 4-H members will be allowed to enter 1 turkey in the market turkey consigned class and sell 1 market turkey through the sale. It is recommended that 4-H members purchase more than 2 market chicken chicks or 1 market turkey chicks in case of fatality before the fair. Animals cannot be entered in both market classes and breeding

classes. Only birds
receiving a Blue/Excellent
Ribbon will be sold
through the Market
Animal sale on
Saturday, August 20th,
2022.

Again for 2022!

Showmanship - If the market chicken(s)/turkey(s) are the only poultry/waterfowl that a 4-H member are exhibiting at

the Steuben County Fair then the 4-H member must participate in the Market Poultry Showmanship Division or market poultry premiums will be withheld. This class will NOT require the handling of the market animals, but will include questions related to poultry production and poultry science topics. More information will be provided soon! The 4-H Office is happy to help you! Please contact us with any questions!

Ordering Chicks through the Office:

4-H members interested in exhibiting and consigning market poultry can place their order through Cornell Cooperative Extension of Steuben County by Friday, February 25th for Turkeys and Friday, April 1st for Chickens. Orders are limited to enrolled 4-H members and

each member may only order 12 chicken chicks and 4 turkey poults. You will need to make arrangements to pick up the market

chicks on the day(s) they arrive or your market chicks will be given to someone else. Pick up date will be confirmed closer to delivery. Turkeys and Chicks will NOT come in on the same date. Turkey's will be available sooner as they take longer to mature. The 4-H Office will receive notice that chicks are

from a Pullorum-Typhoid Free Flock so you will not need to bring your market chickens to the clinic.

Members can purchase their own Market Chicks, but Turkeys

MUST be hatched April 26th or later; and Chickens hatched June 14th or later! Proof of hatch date must be provided with fair entries if

not ordered through thr 4-H Office! 4-H

WHAT ANIMALS NEED TO BE IDENTIFIED BY JANUARY 3rd?

Market Beef Steers, Market Beef Heifers, Small Frame Market Beef Steers, Market Dairy Steers & Dairy Feeder Steers (Born Sept. 1- Dec. 31 2021)

- Market Dairy Steers MUST be owned by January 1, 2022, 100% Dairy, fully castrated, dehorned, and have a minimum weight of 1,100lbs @ weigh in & cannot be over 26 months of age by Tuesday, August 16, 2022
- All Market Beef Steers & Market Beef heifers MUST be owned by January 1, 2022 & MUST be under 24 months of age & weigh a minimum of 900lbs by Tuesday, August 16, 2022
- Small Frame Market Beef Steers MUST be owned by January 1, 2022 (Lowline, Dexter, Mini Herefords, etc.) must be fully castrated & have a minimum weight of 700lbs and a maximum weight of 900lbs at weigh in
- Large Frame Market Beef Steers (must be fully castrated) & Market Beef Heifers must have a minimum weight of 900lbs at weigh in
- Dairy Feeder Steers (Born Sept 1-Dec 31, 2021) MUST be 100% Dairy, fully castrated & dehorned & are not eligible for Championship
- USDA RFID Tags are REQUIRED for each beef animal that will be exhibited at the 2022 Steuben County Fair (Please contact the CCE Office if you need one). A 4-H Market ID Tag will be issued to each animal, once entries have been submitted.
- After identifying your market beef animal in January, you will not have to enter another entry for county fair. However, please let the CCE Office know if you plan to scratch any of the animals you've entered BY July 18, 2022

The *primary objective* of 4-H Dairy Bowl Contests is to provide an opportunity for youth to demonstrate their knowledge of dairy related subject matter in a competitive setting where attitudes of friendliness and fairness prevail.

The Dairy Bowl Program is designed to encourage youth to increase their knowledge of dairy by learning life skills as they prepare for contests - critical thinking, decision-making, problem solving, communication skills, listening skills, speaking skills and independent thinking. They experience the value of teamwork, character building, and goal setting. Youth also gain knowledge in dairy nutrition, milk quality, herd health, breeding and genetics, marketing, dairy foods, calf raising and knowledge of all cattle breeds.

You don't have to own dairy cattle to participate in dairy quiz bowl.

Age of contestants is as of January 1, 2022:

Beginner: 8-10 years old Junior: 9 - 13 years old Senior: 14- 18 years old.

Opportunities? Finger Lakes District Dairy Judging Contest (Alfred State College) – Tentative. There's typically a dairy judging contest at the Steuben County Fair. 4-H members who are selected can represent Steuben County at NYS Fair 4-H Dairy Judging Contest.

Why should I attend? It will help you understand what to look for what choosing your own dairy show animal & help you understand why the judge places your animal the way he/she does at county fair or any other dairy show.

What is Livestock Judging?

Livestock judging is the process of ranking beef, sheep, swine, and meat goats classes from top to bottom, based on their bone structure, muscle, body capacity, body composition, and performance.

Livestock Judging develops the following life skills: critical thinking, organization, time management, public speaking, self confidence, self motivation, team building and competition.

4-H members 5-18 years old are eligible to participate. Cloverbud members 5-7 years old (as of January 1, 2022) who are interested in learning may participate only if they are accompanied at all times by a responsible adult who is at least 21 years old who will be accompanying them the entire time.

2022 Horse Show Information

4-H Members Participating in the Horse Project Please Note: Members must participate in one county level or beyond Horse Educational Event (i.e. Public presentations, Horse Quiz Bowl, Hippology, or Horse Judging) or attend alternate educational events and do a one-page written report on what they saw and learned to receive educational credit to be eligible to participate in any Steuben County 4-H Horse Shows.

Public Presentation Credit - Horse members will receive educational credit towards showing if they give a public presentation on a horse related topic at the **county** event **or** by completing a **club level** presentation and turning in the evaluation form with a summary/outline of the presentation.

County Level Credit for Horse Bowl or Hippology - For a Horse member to receive county level credit for Horse Bowl or Hippology they must attend at least 3 of the practice sessions.


Regional/State Credit – To receive regional credit 4-H members must participate in the Regional/State contests.

4-H members age 8 - 18 as of January 1, 2022

are eligible to participate in the Steuben County 4-H Horse Shows after meeting the Steuben County 4-H Horse Show Rules requirements. 4-H club members who are ages 5-8 as of January 1, 2022 have the option of participating in the Cloverbud Leadline or Walk/Trot classes offered at our qualifying shows but are NOT required to attend an Education Event, but are strongly encourage to do so! 4-H families enrolled in a horse project will be receiving a post card informing them of the updated show information available on the web/from their leader. The 2022 Show Packet will be sent to each Organizational Leader and will include the 4-H Horse Certificates, horse eligibility requirements, a calendar of dates, Steuben County 4-H Horse Show rules, class listings for the Steuben County qualifying shows, entry forms for the Steuben County qualifying shows, point system and information on protective helmets. Horse Bowl & Hippology

Horse Bowl – is a fast-paced, fun, horse knowledge competition that uses buzzers and can be more easily compared to game show Jeopardy. There's a wide range of topics covered including: basic grooming, genetics, tack and equipment, riding, stable management, breeds, history, etc.! Contestants are split by age/experience levels: Novice – 8 & 9 years old OR 1st year up to 14; Junior – 10-13 years of age; Senior – 14 and up. Juniors and Seniors are eligible for the State Competition if they receive qualifying scores



at the Regional Contest. County practices will be set up if there is enough so PLEASE contact Jenny at the 4-H Office if you'd like to participate!

Hippology – is a slightly slower paced, hands-on horse knowledge competition where youth rotate through various stations. These stations include: slides, written test, horse judging, tack ID, breeds, nutrition, parasites, confirmation, and team problem (JR/SR only). The levels for this competition are the same as Horse Bowl: Novice – 8 & 9 years old OR 1^{st} year up to 14; Junior – 10-13 years of age; Senior – 14 and up. Juniors and Seniors are eligible for the State Competition if they receive qualifying scores at the Regional. 
New York Farm Bureau Offers Scholarships To Students Who Plan An Ag-Related Future.

New York Farm Bureau is encouraging high school seniors who will continue their education to prepare for a career in some way connected to the diverse agricultural industry to apply for the New York Farm Bureau Agricultural Youth Scholarship sponsored by the New York Farm Bureau Promotion and Education Committee. Scholarship awards are \$1,500 for first place, \$1,200 for second, and \$1,000 for third place. District winners will each receive \$100 and a memento. County winners are recognized at the discretion of their County Farm Bureau.

Students applying must have a family Farm Bureau membership or a Student Farm Bureau membership (a membership application may be included with scholarship enclosures). Students are required to complete an application which is a fillable pdf available on the NYFB website, and submit a brief 300-500 word essay discussing an issue facing agriculture in their county, explaining how they think NYFB can support members who may deal with this issue. We suggest that they feel free to visit the NYFB website www.nyfb.org to learn more about Farm Bureau.

At the District level scoring will determine the County winners as well as the District winner. The judging event may necessitate a personal interview and essay presentation or may be based solely upon the application and attachments. The state winner selection will be made from District Winners based solely on the submitted applications; there will be no personal interviews.
