To be eligible for year-end awards and to receive project credit, 4-H members are required to complete records for **animal** science, clothing, flower gardening, vegetable gardening, junior leader, and citizenship. Check out our records page

Project Record Requirement for Exhibits @ the 2022 County Fair

All 4-H members who exhibit a project in the 4-H Division at the 2022 Steuben County Fair are REQUIRED to turn into the CCE Office at least one record on their exhibits/project animal(s) per species by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, September 19, 2022 to be considered for year-end Project Champion. There will be no consequences for showing the following year (except market animals see below). This is the same for all animal species exhibited as well as youth building exhibits. <u>Market animal exhibitors</u>, every 4-H member who sells a market animal through the 4-H & FFA Livestock Sale must turn in a market animal project record to be eligible to identify and show/sell a market animal in 4-H division at the 2023 Steuben County Fair.

End-Of-Year Completion and 4-H on Display and Community Service Reports

4-H organizational leaders and independent members: don't forget to fill out and hand in the End-Of-The-Year Completion Forms, Project Champion nomination forms, 4-H on Display forms and Community Service These forms are essential for your club records. members to receive a completion certificate at the Achievement Program or for Project Champion. DO NOT DISAPPOINT THE MEMBERS OF YOUR CLUB BY NOT COMPLETING THEM! Please complete and return these forms to the CCE Office by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, September 19, 2022. Senior Summary & Junior Activity Reports

Senior Summary and Junior Activity Reports are due September 30, 2022. Senior Summary report forms are to be completed by 4-H members in grades 7 and higher (as of fall 2022). The Senior Summary report is intended to be a cumulative report with members changing the front page and the 4-H story pages each year. Everything else is just updated to reflect the current year. 4-H members in grades 7 and up can pick up the Senior Summary Report at the CCE Office, request a senior summary report be mailed to them or it can be downloaded from the CCE Steuben County website at <u>http://putknowledgetowork.org/4-h-youth/4-</u> h-program-areas and click on 4-H youth Development.

The Junior Activity Report is to be completed by 4-H members in grades 3-6 (as of fall 2022). Cloverbud members are not required to complete a Junior report. This report is also available on the CCE website at http://putknowledgetowork.org/4-h-youth/4-h-programareas.

Both of these forms are used by the 4-H Awards Committee to select 4-H members for trips and awards such as the Junior Award Trip, Washington Focus, and Career Exploration in addition to other award trips. These reports are not difficult to complete! All reports are due to the CCE Office by September 30, 2022.

<u>Please read your fairbook</u> before you come to the fair because there are <u>MANY</u> changes including important dates, departments, sections and classes. It is <u>your</u> responsibility to ensure that <u>your</u> exhibits are entered correctly. The 4-H Judging Schedule is printed on page 2. Unless otherwise announced, judging will be according to the schedule. The schedule also notes the order for classes/divisions for many of the shows.

Please keep your fair book handy during the week and feel free to ask the 4-H staff or your leaders if you have questions or need additional information.

Overnight Chaperones NEEDED!!

We are hopeful to be able to offer an overnight opportunity for members. We can only offer this IF there are enough qualified chaperones by July 29th. IF we have enough volunteers a limited number of 4-H members will be allowed to stay overnight in the barns. If you are interested in volunteering to chaperone you must:

- contact the CCE Office
- be 21 years of age
- complete the 4-H volunteer application & background check which can be found on the web

Fair passes will be given to those serving as chaperones.

Please plan your week accordingly!!

COUNTY FAIR 4-H EXHIBITOR OVERNIGHT POLICY

The 4-H Program Committee overnight policy:

Only <u>exhibitors</u> of animals at the Steuben County Fair can stay overnight and they must have parental approval to stay overnight on the grounds and must sign the permission slip and medical release form/code of conduct form.

<u>- Youth can sign up to stay in the cement dairy/beef barn IF we have the adequate number of approved chaperones at least 21 years of age (1 male and 1 female) before July 29. If we do not have the necessary chaperones 4-H members will not be allowed to stay in the barn. If you are willing to chaperone contact the CCE Office by July 29. Overnight accommodations will be on a first come-first serve basis, with priority given to youth needing to stay the night previous to a show.</u>

4-H members staying overnight, even if you are exhibiting in open class are subject to 4-H Rules.

All 4-H members must be in the overnight housing by 10:00 p.m. 4-H members must be settled and quiet by 10:30 p.m. when lights will be out. If 4-H members will be attending special events in the grandstand in the evening or midnight madness (teens only) the curfew permission slip for special events needs to be completed by the parent/guardian. The form must be signed at the 4-H Fair Office by the parent/guardian and the 4-H member. A wristband will be issued to the 4-H member that is to be worn until the 4-H member returns to the designated overnight housing. The 4-H member agrees to be in the designated housing 15 minutes after the event is over if the event runs past 10 p.m. Your bedding (cots, air mattresses, etc.) in the barns must be picked up at 9:00 a.m. each morning.
4-H members must be courteous to chaperones, adults, and members. The barns will not be open until 6 a.m. Youth cannot leave their designated overnight housing before 6:00 a.m.

<u>4-H members are not allowed to stay overnight if the required chaperons are not available.</u> Chaperones are needed please complete the County Fair Volunteer Return Form by July 29, found in this issue or on the web or contact the CCE Office. Chaperones, including those staying in campers, must have an approved volunteer application/background check on file with the CCE office.

4-H members will not be allowed to stay overnight in the open air dairy barn, rabbit barn, the goat barn or the sheep & swine barn. However, adult volunteers will be asked to serve as night watch people for the barn to monitor animals and property.

Members who decide not to stay overnight after filing an overnight permission form must submit a written note from their parents to the 4-H Fair Office indicating that they are taking them home for the night or if the 4-H member is moving from the barn to a camper space or vice versa.

IT HAS BEEN APPROVED BY THE 4-H PROGRAM COMMITTEE THAT ANYONE DISOBEYING THESE RULES WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO STAY OVERNIGHT AND WILL BE SENT HOME AT THE 4-H FAMILIES EXPENSE! ALSO, THEY WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW AND WILL FORFEIT ALL THEIR 4-H COUNTY FAIR PREMIUM MONEY, AWARD TRIPS AND POSSIBLY THE RIGHT TO SHOW AT THE COUNTY FAIR THE FOLLOWING YEAR.

Youth Building Contests: If youth, including Cloverbuds, would like to exhibit a "contest project" it should be 1) entered in FairEntry by the deadline 2) dropped of Sunday with other youth building exhibits. Refer to Department 2700, page 64 of the fair book and enter in FairEntry by July 18th.

Projects: A Cloverbud member is eligible to enter projects at the County Fair and may exhibit one project made as a group. See Department 2800. Page 65 in the County Fair Book and enter in FairEntry by July 18th. Number of projects allowed: If 4-H age is 5: can enter 5 projects 4-H age is 6: can enter 6 projects 4-H age is 7: can enter 7 projects

Cloverbuds will meet individually to present their entries and club project to the judge on <u>Sunday</u>, <u>August 14th between 1:00-and</u> <u>3:00.</u> Bring only non-animal entries to the 4-H building. There will be a special display area in the youth building for the Cloverbud projects. Cloverbud projects will not receive premiums, but will receive special ribbons. If you have questions, please contact your leader or the CCE Office.

Cloverbuds ages 5 & 6 as of (1/1/22)may exhibit ANIMAL ONLY (dog, dairy goat, meat goat, poultry, rabbit, cavy, swine, sheep, dairy cattle, beef cattle, or horse). Cloverbuds age 7 as of (1/1/22) may exhibit 1 large animal (hooved) and 1 small animal (non-hooved). All Cloverbud animals must follow all health regulations that are in the 4-H Fairbook. Please read the health rules and regulations thoroughly. Cloverbud Animal Entries are due through FairEntry by July 18th

One cake/cookie will be awarded the "most creative cake" in each class: cloverbud(cookie), junior (cake), or senior (cake). So... be sure to register for the contest and get the creative juices flowing! A cash prize will be awarded the day of the contest.



Cake/Giant Cookie Silent Auction -

Do you participate in the cake decorating/giant cookie contest at the County Fair? Are you tired of trying to find a home for your cake after the contest. Well, here is a solution.

Donate your decorated cakes/giant cookie, from the contest to the silent auction. The silent auction will be held outside (weather permitting) the 4-H Exhibit Building at the conclusion of the cake decorating contest on Saturday, August 21st. Proceeds from the silent auction will benefit the Steuben County 4-H Activity Fund.

Tips on Baking for the County Fair

Mixing/Baking

- Always use fresh ingredients, such as baking powder, oil, whole grain or regular flour.
- Date your containers when you buy them.
- Overmixing causes a tough product with large holes or tunnels or a top that is peaked.
- Under-mixing causes streaks of flour and uneven rising.
- Make sure dry ingredients are sifted together and liquid ingredients are well mixed.
- No paper liners are allowed for muffins.
- Dust raisins lightly with flour so they don't stick together or sink to the bottom.
- No toppings are allowed.
- Additions of dry cereals, raisins and nuts help to disguise problems of overmixing, especially in muffins and quick breads.

Cookies

- Do not place cookies too close together on baking sheet.
- Measure dough for each cookie using a small scoop or measuring spoon, so that size is equal.
- Trim outer edge away from bar cookies before cutting into squares. Use a ruler to measure so that size is equal.

Storage/Freezing

- Avoid recipes that do not keep or travel well in hot, humid weather.
- Cool product completely on racks before storing.



- Use proper wrapping freezer containers, wrap and foil.
- Wrap each item separately.
- Bake extras and bring with you to judging in case of upsets and WHOOPS accidents!

Recipes

- Recipes must be on a 3 x 5 card typed or handwritten legibly. You may use a computer printout and securely tape to the card. Put your name on the card.
- Include the complete recipe including yield ingredients first, then instructions. Include each step ie: if you grease top of bread before baking, etc.
- If you reduce the amount of an ingredient(s), Indicate original amount of reduced ingredient(s) and then the reduced amount on the recipe card.
- Place recipe card in a small plastic bag to protect them and place in the bag with the food exhibit or staple to the outside..

General

• Judges expect the recipes to match age and ability - don't use same recipes from year to year.

• Use a large enough plate to display items. A paper plate is satisfactory if it is firm. Foil covered cardboard is also good. Do not use a plate that must be

returned. Place everything in a large plastic bag - recipe and product.

Youth Building Exhibit Removal

Please be aware that the exhibits in the 4-H Youth Building at County Fair are NOT able to be removed until 12:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 21st. This time release is set by the State Department of Agriculture and Markets and the Steuben County Agricultural Society. If exhibits are removed before 12:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 21, premium money will be forfeited by the exhibitor.

If you are picking up your exhibits on Sunday evening you will not be able to drive your vehicles down to the 4-H building until after the grandstand show. If you are unable to pick-up on Sunday from 12:00 – 2:00 p.m., the 4-H building will be open on Monday, August 22 from 3:00 p.m. – 7:00 p.m. All exhibitors with exhibits still remaining after 7:00 p.m. on Monday, August 22 will forfeit exhibit premiums!!

If you are not able to get these exhibits on Sunday night or Monday night, please contact your leader or another member of your club to pick them up for you! It is not the responsibility of the CCE staff to remove your exhibits. If you have <u>any</u> questions about exhibit removal, please contact the CCE Office.

Selecting & Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit

Harvest your Crop, with Care.

- 1) Loosen root crops with a spading fork before pulling. Avoid tearing the flesh or stems.
- 2) Pick off all tomato stems so they will not poke holes in other tomatoes.
- 3) A sharp knife is helpful in harvesting peppers, eggplant, the vine crops and many leafy vegetables.

Harvest Enough to Make Your Exhibit.

- 1) Gather several times as many good specimens as you think you will need.
- 2) Select the most uniform ones for your exhibit.
- 3) Harvest lettuce, endive, escarole and chard the morning of exhibition day because they wilt quickly.
- 4) Harvest onions 7-10 days before the fair and dry them in the sun. When properly cured, the tops can be easily cut off.

Trim Correctly.

- 1) Cut off the tops of all root crops about 1" above the roots.
- 2) Trim the tap root so they are all the same length.
- 3) Remove the small fine roots on carrots and beets.
- 4) Trim any excess stump from cabbage, lettuce and other leafy vegetables. Do not cut off all the outer leaves from cabbage. Husks can be trimmed off one side of sweet corn or taken all the way off but have all ears the same.

Exhibit the Right Number.

Plan to exhibit the exact number of vegetables called for. Check the Fair Book, as the number may differ with various fairs.

Wash or Brush the Vegetables.

- 1) Select and harvest only clean vegetables if you can. Cleaning will not harm any vegetable if it is done carefully.
- 2) Clean peas, beans, cucumbers and muskmelons with a very soft brush.
- 3) Use a soft damp cloth for fruit with a waxy surface such as eggplant, pepper, tomatoes, and watermelons.
- 4) Root crops may need washing. Use lots of water and your hands to wash root crops.
- 5) Do not wash head lettuce, endive, cauliflower, or cabbage. Trim off the soiled leaves, but don't scalp them.



Select for Size, Shape and Color.

- 1) Select those that are alike. The first ripe tomatoes or carrots you pull from your garden will seldom be alike in size, shape and color. A good way to select a plate of vegetables is to place them in a row on a table or on the floor with the big ones at one end and the small ones on the other. Then select on the basis of shape and color.
- 2) Avoid carrots and potatoes with greening caused by exposure to sunlight. Check the seed catalog for examples of "typical shape".

Storage Before Fair.

- 1) After you have harvested and prepared your vegetables, it may be necessary to store them for a day or overnight.
- 2) Keep root crop, leafy vegetables, sweet corn and peas at low temperature (40°-45°F). Mom's refrigerator usually gives these conditions. Before placing leaf vegetables in the refrigerator, place them in a plastic bag.
- 3) Potatoes, tomatoes, eggplant, peppers and the vine crops will keep well for a day at medium temperatures (60°-70°F).

Wrap, Pack and Display Correctly.

- 1) Wrap your exhibit before taking it to the fair. You may have an excellent plant but damage while transporting can easily make it unworthy.
- 2) Newspaper is a good wrapping material. Wrap each vegetable separately and then wrap the five or twelve, etc., that go together in one bundle.
- 3) Pack them firmly in a strong container. Always pack the firm vegetables on the bottom. Don't pack cabbage, pumpkins, watermelons, etc., on top of tomatoes, eggplant, peppers, etc.
- 4) Label every exhibit carefully until you can attach the double entry card. Make sure your name, department, section, class number, kind, variety and age as of January 1 and years in project area are on the card.

- Upon arrival & weigh in, Market Lambs must have no more than 1" of wool and MUST be dry.

- Tuesday, August 16- (7:00am-9:00am)-4-H Market Steer & 4-H Market Dairy Steer weigh in
- Thursday, August 18- (7:00am-10:00am)-4-H & Open Market Lambs & Hogs
- Monday, August 15th BEFORE 5:00 pm-4-H Meat Goat weigh in.

Livestock Health Requirements 4-H & Cloverbud Animals

Please make sure you've read & understand the 2022 Health Requirements for each animal species. <u>https://agriculture.ny.gov/system/files/documents/2</u>021/02/fairhealthrequirements.pdf

It is <u>YOUR responsibility</u> to meet the health regulations. The regulations will be enforced for the protection of all exhibitors. If you have any questions, contact the CCE Office. <u>All</u> cattle, sheep, swine, and goats exhibited at County Fair must have a valid certificate of Veterinary inspection (CVI). For New York State Animals the CVI must be issued and <u>signed</u> by a <u>Category 2</u> <u>Accredited Veterinarian</u> on or after May 1 of the current year. Each animal must be individually and positively identified on the CVI.

<u>There are no exceptions.</u> Contact your veterinarian to arrange for a CVI.

All sheep or goats exhibited at the Steuben County Fair must be identified with USDA approved individual legible scrapie program identification.

All animals consigned to the <u>4-H Market Animal</u> <u>Sale</u> must comply with all drug withdrawal

Tags

For 2022, all Market Animals will have 4-H tags put in their ears upon weigh in at the fairgrounds. This is to help keep everything organized for the Market Animal Sale. (Except for 4- H members who entered market beef steers/heifers, small frame market beef steers and market dairy steers. You should already have received your tag from the CCE Office. Please be sure the tag is in your animals' ear BEFORE weigh in) If you have any questions please contact Michelle at mlc353@cornell.edu or 607-664-2571.

Fair Inspection Procedures:

State Veterinarians or assigned officials are responsible for reviewing all "certificates of veterinary inspection" (CVI) for compliance with state regulations and for verifying individual identification of exhibited animals presented on a valid CVI. A CVI is required for cattle (beef and dairy), goats (dairy and meat), sheep, and swine.

Your CVI <u>must accompany</u> the animal upon arrival to the Steuben County Fairgrounds. Do not drop your animal off at the fairgrounds without

the CVI with the animal. Send your CVI with your trucker if you are arriving after your animals.

Please have your CVI convenient for them to be checked. <u>Also it would be extremely appreciated</u> <u>if the 4-H member was available to present your</u> <u>animal to the person inspecting your CVI.</u> The person inspecting your animal must match your animal's identification (eartag or in some sheep and goats cases legible tattoo) to the CVI.

If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any sheep or goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

Animal Identification:

It is very important that each animal is properly identified. Individual identification is necessary under New York State Animal Requirements. All animals must carry positive individual identification such as an official USDA approved eartag. All goats or sheep exhibited must have legible scrapie identification.



PLEASE READ YOUR FAIR BOOK:

Your Fair Book includes very important information regarding County Fair. Please read it thoroughly, as some departments, & divisions have changed or been deleted and many classes have been moved, added or deleted.

It is your responsibility to ensure that your exhibits are entered correctly.

All Animal Exhibitors - Some Tips on Assuring Your Animal is Not Sent Home

If the State Veterinarians or assigned officials think that an animal looks "sick", they will take their temperature and perform a physical exam. It doesn't matter what might be wrong with an individual animal; if it looks sick or looks like it MIGHT have a contagious disease, then he/she has the right to not allow it in the barn or have it removed once the fair has started. It is the same with any contagious disease. The vet doesn't have to PROVE that an animal has one disease or another. The vet can make their decision on the SUSPICION of an infectious disease. This has been the case for many years. Nothing has changed.

- 1. Make sure you have the necessary paperwork and vaccinations found in the Steuben County Fairbook and on the CCE website at www.putknowledgetowork.org
- 2. Make sure that all the identification matches on ALL paperwork and is legible.
- 3. No Warts even one little wart will warrant your animal being sent home.
- 4. No Ringworm
- 5. **Mucus** Any mucus from the nose that is yellow, white or green

- 6. Hairy Hoof Warts or any sign of limping or sore feet
- Any resemblance to Pink Eye even a bruise from trucking that could be pink eye – the worst will be assumed.
- 8. For Sheep and Goats any lesions characteristic of soremouth and any sheep or goats originating from the same flock are considered exposed and must be removed from the grounds. Goats and sheep without proper scrapie identification will be sent home.

Some other tips include make sure you clip your animal before going to the fair. This gives you a good chance to thoroughly check your animals for any abnormalities. <u>While at the fair, DO NOT share brushes, feed pails, water buckets</u> or any other equipment. Sharing is good in certain areas, but it is a very good way to contract unwanted diseases so don't use others equipment.

Only campers will be allowed, no tents! <u>4-H families wishing to camp on the grounds MUST complete the camping request form by Monday, July 18.</u> If the information on your request form changes, you need to notify the CCE Office or you risk losing your spot. Master Showman for that species. Exceptions may be granted by the 4-H staff or the staff's designated representative for extenuating circumstances and for the safety of exhibitors. If you do not show in a showmanship class and have not been excused from showing in showmanship you will forfeit your premiums for that species. **You must show your own animal in showmanship**.

Non-Owner Showmanship Classes

****4-H members participating in Non-Owner showmanship must enter by the fair deadline (July 18th) online at <u>http://steubencountyfair4h.fairentry.com</u> in order to participate in this class.****

-Non-Owner showmanship is open to 4-H members who do not have an owned animal of that species on the grounds and therefore does not enter any other showmanship class for that species. 4-H members entering non-owner showmanship must show an animal other than their own. **Previous winners of non-owner showmanship are ineligible to compete for that species again for 3 years.** Class size may be limited due to time and number of entries. Cloverbuds cannot show in Non-Owner showmanship classes

-The order of the sale this year will be as follows, market turkeys, market chickens, market rabbits, market hogs, market steers, market goats, and market lambs.



-Champions of each species will sell first, followed by the remaining class winners and top placing animals.

Attention Swine Exhibitors (Including Cloverbuds)

Exhibitors should not wear shorts or sandals/flip flops while showing their swine. Clothing must be 4-H appropriate.

If PEDv is SUSPECTED during the fair, the entire swine barn will be sent off of the grounds and the barn will be closed! It will be the decision of the State Veterinarians along with the appropriate officials as to the possibility of a disease "outbreak". If this occurs, it would be up to the 4-H family to make arrangements for where to take their pigs since they cannot stay on the fairgrounds. Please note: If the swine are removed from the fairgrounds before the Market Animal Sale on Saturday then NO Market Hogs WILL be sold. However, all other livestock species will continue to be sold.

It's extremely important for you to prevent your hog(s) from having

diarrhea at the fair. Due to the potential threat of spreading PEDv, if any hog shows severe diarrhea that could be suspected as PEDv any time after they arrive ALL the pigs in the barn must be removed from the fairgrounds.

We know that many hogs have diarrhea after they get to the fair when they are perfectly healthy due to stress, change in diet, or change in water. PLAN TO CARRY YOUR WATER FROM HOME. Remember, that PEDv usually affects piglets causing them to die when they are very young. Older animals may show diarrhea, but usually recover. **If any of the pigs** have diarrhea at the home farm, then no pigs should come to the fair from that farm. A veterinarian should be called to examine any sick animals on any farm and let the decision whether to have the pigs tested for PEDv be that of a veterinary professional

Attention Market Lamb, Market Goat, Market Swine, Market Heifer Exhibitors

Lambs that are shown in the market lamb classes CANNOT be shown in the breeding sheep classes. Goats that are shown in the Market Goat Class CANNOT be shown in the breeding classes. Gilts shown in market classes CAN NOT be shown in breeding classes. Market Heifers cannot be shown in the breeding classes.

Attention Dairy Cattle Exhibitors (Including Cloverbuds)

Whites are required for Dairy Showmanship. NO sandals/flip flops are to be worn while showing Dairy. Clothing must be 4-H appropriate. Also please make sure you have a neck strap or properly fitted halter to secure your animals in the barn for the safety of everyone.

<u>Fair Orientation Meeting</u> <u>for Market Animal</u> Exhibitors

There will be a Fair orientation meeting for 4-H animal exhibitors (except horse and dog) in the livestock Show ring on Monday, August 16 at 5:30 p.m. This is an important meeting for ALL Animal Exhibitors. Therefore, please plan to attend!

Attention Sheep Exhibitors (Including Cloverbuds)

Exhibitors should not wear shorts or sandals/flip flops while showing their sheep. Exhibitors of sheep should wear a white shirt and black pants or jeans. Clothing must be 4-H appropriate.

Attention Meat Goat & Beef Exhibitors (Including Cloverbuds)

Blue/Black Jeans and an acceptable shirt are to be worn in showing Meat Goats and Beef. NO shorts or sandals/flip-flops are to be worn. Clothing must be 4-H appropriate.

Also make sure you have a neck strap or properly fitted halter to secure your beef animals in the barn for the safety of everyone.

Attention Dairy Goat Exhibitors (Including Cloverbuds)

Whites are required for Dairy Goat Showmanship. NO sandals/flip flops are to be worn while showing goats. Clothing must be

4-H appropriate. Dairy goats with horns will not be permitted.

2022 Regional 2 Hippology Contest

On May 22nd Steuben County's 4-H Program hosted the 2022 Region 2 Hippology Contest.

Hippology is an activity that can enhance learning for 4-H members by letting them showcase their knowledge and understanding of equine science and husbandry in a competitive setting. Participants are able to demonstrate their experience and knowledge gained in horse judging, quiz bowl, speeches, and practical horse management. Phases of the contest include a written exam, identification of items shown on slides, nutrition, parasites &

diseases, tack & equipment ID, judging, ID stations, team problems, etc.

This year, Steuben had 5 Senior members competing. We were very well represented with each placing in the top 20 and qualifying for the State Event at the NYS Fair in August! Individual results were: Isabel Sprague, Independent 6th; Morgan Cheney, Kickin Kountry 7th; Leahbella Quigley, Bath Trailblazers, 10th; Kyra Farley, Independent, 12th, and Sienna Smalt, Bath Trailblazers, 13th. As a team Morgan, Isabel, Leahbella and Sienna finished in 2nd place, while the combination team of Wayne and Steuben (Kyra) place 3rd! Despite being from different clubs, all of the kids worked well together and had a great time getting know each other better! Steuben was also had Junior members Emily Cheney, Kick Kountry Kids; and Coryn Edwards, Independent; whom placed 3rd and 4th, respectively, and were part of the combination team that finished the day in 1st! At the Novice level we had just one youth compete with a Wayne County youth. Madeline Slayton, Independent, placed 2nd individually and was on the 1st place Junior team!

District Public Presentations

The Public Presentations Program is one of 4-H's most beneficial and rewarding experiences. It is the one most often credited by 4-H alumni as having given them an edge above peers in both college and professional careers. It provides a unique opportunity to develop a positive selfconcept and poise, gain self-confidence before a group, learn to express ideas clearly, respond spontaneously to questions, and gain subject matter knowledge. Through a progressive series of communication activities, youth learn to express themselves and their ideas.

On Saturday, June 11th Steuben County 4-H youth participate in the 2022 Finger Lakes District Public Presentations Contest held at 4-H Camp Bristol Hills. This



year's participants, Isabella Bixby, Naava Gibson, and Julianna Patrick, represented our county well and returned with valuable feedback to help improve their public speaking, but also received two "Judge's Choice" awards and a "Top 10" award.

2022 Career Explorations

For over 90 years, the New York State 4-H Office has hosted the annual Career Explorations Conference on the Cornell Campus. Nearly 500 4-H youth and chaperones attend the action-packed, three-day event to immerse themselves in exploring their future education, career opportunities, and to experience Cornell University and campus life! Cornell faculty and graduate students conduct engagedlearning workshops in two age-specific tracks:



1) Focus for Teens programs for youth entering grades 10-12

2) University U programs for youth entering grades 8-9

Over 20 programs are offered to help youth understand what a particular career field entails, what type of education they would need to pursue, and to learn from the experiences of the Program Facilitators. This year, Steuben County had a delegation of 4 Steuben youth and 2 chaperones and were also able to support a youth from Wyoming county to attend as well. The group had a great time exploring the Cornell Campus and making new friends both within the county and from across the state.
