PiNY Produced in NY Showcasing NY State Products

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NYS Fair 'Produced in New York" (PiNY) program is designed to showcase the wide variety and use of agricultural products grown or produced in New York. PiNY is an opportunity for youth, ages 8-18, to demonstrate their food preparation skills while promoting a tasty recipe featuring New York State food products. During the PiNY program individual 4-H members do a "Silent Demonstration" concurrently with at least one other presenter. Youth 8-12 Years of age are entered in the junior division, youth 13-18 years of age are considered senior presenters.

Seniors

Must be at least 10 by the date of the event and not have reached the age of 14 as of January 1.

Juniors

Must have reached the age of 14 by the date of the event and be less than 19 as of January 1..

NYS 4-H Needs YOUth!

The New York State 4-H Office is seeking motivated 4-H Teens (age 16+) to join us in helping make the NY State Fair an exciting and memorable experience for fair visitors and 4-H families. Successful applicants will be invited to spend a part of the fair (August 23 - September 4) working as a Junior Superintendent (aka Jr. Super) in the 4-H Youth Building. Your responsibilities could include anything from leading icebreaker activities to helping with evaluations to holding baby chicks.

Teen Evaluator Role (13+)

Teens usually serve three to four days of their rotation in a specific program area, but it could be less depending on need.

- The number of Teen Evaluators and the days needed varies, depending on the project area and the total number of exhibits to be judged. For example, foods and clothing evaluations usually take place on different days; the same teen(s) may serve as a Teen Evaluator for both, but on different days. Some Teen Evaluators may not be scheduled to participate as a TE all four days of Fair.
- Depending on the needs for general Teen Leader/Evaluator positions, not all teens applying may be assigned a position. When this happens, we encourage County Educators to schedule teens to serve in the County Booth or other program areas.

Event Assistant (13+)

State Fair offers youth a variety of opportunities to explore opportunities for growth and learning. Teens may choose to assist with a specific youth building event working directly with the adult key leader.

Teens will be responsible for assisting with the set up, taking direction during the event, awards and clean up at the conclusion of the event. Teens leaders may be asked to act as the MC for the event or run errands as appropriate and needed.

Yummy Spread-tacular Science

Did you know that if you make butter at home you're actually conducting a science experiment?

With just one ingredient you can watch a dairy product go from its liquid state and turn in to a solid!



Butter is made by churning the fat content of milk, also referenced to as cream. Churning is an action that involves vigorously moving the cream so that the fat molecules begin clumping together forming a solid, that solid is butter! We're using heavy whipping cream because it has a high percentage of fat compared to everyday drinking milk.


All you need for the experiment is:

- A glass jar with an air tight lid
- Heavy whipping cream





This is the heavy whipping cream in it's liquid state.



You want to leave enough room for the cream to move around.

Once your lid is secured begin shaking the jar up and down quickly.

Be sure to have a tight grip!

Here we start to see it

forming into a solid!





As the fat molecules come together you will actually make whipped cream! This marks the halfway point in butter making!

In our final step we finally have butter! Do you see that white liquid left behind? That is buttermilk! Yet another delicious dairy product!

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It's MAPLE SYRUP Time!


Follow the recipe below to make pancakes!

- 1 egg
- 1 1/4 cups buttermilk
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Pancakes and Syrup



Mix all the ingredients together and cook on a greased pan or griddle over medium heat until golden-brown

The maple sap is then boiled to drive water off and raise the concentration of the sugar. When the sugar content has reached 67% the sap is done boiling and can be filtered and bottled as maple syrup.



Conservation Education Day Poster Winners Announced

The Oneida County Conservation Education Day Committee is happy to announce the Grand Prize Winner of the 2023 Poster Contest: **Ivy Bronson**, a sixth-grade student from Mrs. Todora's class at JD George Elementary School, Verona. The committee presented her awards at the school on Thursday, December 14, 2023.

Posters were selected for superior artistic presentation of one or more of the conservation ideas at this past year's Oneida County 4-H Conservation Education Days held at Delta Lakes State Park. Plus, consideration was also given to the content of the caption explaining the idea of the poster.

The judges for the contest were representatives from the Oneida County Conservation Education Day Committee. They include Cornell Cooperative Extension of Oneida County, The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, New York State Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation, and The Federated Sportsmen's Clubs of Oneida County. We would also like to thank the Oneida County Youth Bureau, a major event sponsor.

The 2023 Contest Grand Prize winner received a camping package valued at over \$100 from the Federated Sportsmen's Clubs of Oneida County. And a framed print of a native trout fish by wildlife artist Tom Yacovella, *an Outdoorsman and Wildlife Artist who passed away in January 2018.* The print is awarded in his memory by the Central New York Youth Fishing Educators.

Other prizes of a 1-year subscription to the NYS Conservationist magazine were given to two winners chosen from each of the classrooms who entered the poster contest. Subscriptions were donated by the Federated Sportsman's Clubs of Oneida County, Inc. County Executive Anthony J. Picente Jr. announced today that as part of Oneida County's 225th anniversary, sixth graders across multiple districts have selected an official county bird, flower and tree.


"Symbols play an important part in the identity of a community," Picente said. "That's why for our 225th anniversary, I wanted to give our residents a way to recognize the natural beauty of Oneida County and give them an even greater sense of pride in the place they call home. What better way to accomplish this than enlisting the young people who will carry on our traditions and lead this county into the future?"

Sixth graders from every school district in Oneida County were invited to vote on each county symbol, and over 1,100 participated through an online survey distributed and tallied by Cornell Cooperative Extension of Oneida County (CCE) in conjunction with the Oneida County Youth Bureau.

The **Tufted Titmouse** is common in eastern deciduous forests and a frequent visitor to bird feeders, where they prefer eating sunflower seeds. They are cavity nesting birds found year-round in Oneida County & across New York State. Since they cannot excavate their own nests, birdwatchers can attract them to their yards by putting up nest boxes.

Trillium are white flowers that bloom in May and like areas of partial shade. This flower grows best in USDA Plant Hardiness Zones 4-8. They do not produce nectar, just pollen, and their seeds are spread by ants. They can be found across Oneida County in various natural settings, but are especially prevalent in the Rome Sand Plains area.

Red Maples thrive in sun to partial shade areas and are used commercially for both lumber and small-scale maple syrup production. The tree is best known for its brilliant yellow, orange and red foliage in autumn. Its ability to thrive in a large number of habitats is largely due to its ability to produce roots to suit its growing site from a young age. It grows in Hardiness Zones 3-9.

What types of 4-H Horse Communications are there?

Cloverbuds Show and Tell— This is for Cloverbud members ages 5-8 years old. No pressure, just show the evaluators something like how to groom a horse or types of markings!

Individual Presentation—This is typically what most 4-H members choose to do. Presentations should be between 9-12 minutes and you can use visual aids such as posters, Power-Points and other items.

Public Speech—This presentation does not allow for any visual aids such a poster, etc. The shorter time frame (7-10 Minutes) makes it perfect for a story-telling type presentation.

Team Presentations—A Team Presentation is designed for two (2) members to present for 10-15 minutes. Visual aids are allowed such a posters, PowerPoints, etc. are allowed. This presentation should be a team effort where both people are constantly interacting or demonstrating something.

Impromptu— This is a new offering this year. No prior preparation is needed. Member arrives 20 minutes prior to their time slot and is given a topic and some resources to use. They have 15-20 minutes to develop their presentation which should be 5-10 minutes in length. No visual aids are allowed.






Tracking migrations and seasons
