The New 4-H Year Begins October 1, 2023!

HOW TO ENROLL: Only paper forms accepted

****NO online enrollment option this year****

- Option 1: Stop by CCE Niagara and fill out paperwork in person (copies available at front desk beginning Monday, October 2) & copies available in front foyer after hours
- Option 2: Fill out paperwork at your October/November club or animal species meetings; forms available in the training center; seal enrollment form in envelope with your cash or check payment; drop into the NEW locked drop box in training center after meeting (black box mounted to wall in hallway by the shop doors)
- Option 3: Print a paper copy out online at home, fill out, mail in with check or drop off to office. If you come after hours, you can leave it in the front foyer locked drop box. Available on our website <https://cceniagaracounty.org/4-h-youth/forms/enrollment-forms>

ENROLLMENT FEES:

- First time enrolling/New Members between Oct. 1-March 1 = \$25 per child
- Returning members, re-enrolling between Oct. 1-Nov. 30 = \$25 per child
- Returning members, re-enrolling between Dec. 1-March 1 = \$35 per child (includes \$10 late fee)
- Maximum of \$65 per family for 3 or more children living in same household (between Oct. 1-March 1)
- Not accepting any 4-H Enrollments or Re-Enrollments after March 1
- Your enrollment fee is due at time of submitted enrollment form (check, cash, or credit card). DO NOT submit enrollment forms without payment, forms will not be accepted without payment.

My Child is in 4-H: Now What?

What are the 4-H Standards of Recognition?

4-H Standards of Recognition is a tool to help individual members set and achieve goals and are part of our recognition model. Recognition is an important part of the 4-H experience; it helps master skills and knowledge by providing feedback on progress towards goals. Here's how it works:

At the beginning of the 4-H year, youth decide which level of recognition they would like to receive. The levels are "Learn By Doing", "Making the Best Better", "Heart of 4-H" and "Grow a True Leader". There are also 4 levels for Cloverbuds: "Head", "Heart", "Hands" and "Health". To help youth decide, they should review the Standard of Recognition performance measure chart with their parent or club leader. The chart outlines what a member needs to do in order to achieve each level of recognition. For example, if a 4-H member wants to achieve the "Learn By Doing" standard, he/she would need to plan to do the following throughout the course of the 4-H year:

1. Complete 4 projects from at least 1 project area or more
2. Exhibit at least 2 entries at the 4-H Fair
3. Participate in 4 activities or competitions
4. Completing 2 hours of Community Service
5. Write 3 things I learned through the projects that I participated in
6. Participate in club or county 4-H Public Presentations

Hosting A Foreign Exchange Students by Averie Owen

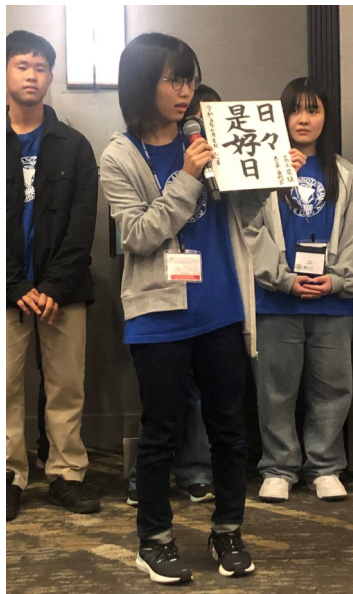

****NEW** Re-Enrollment deadline for returning members is January 5, 2024**

- Returning/Re-enrolling members must re-enroll by January 5, 2024, to be eligible to show/exhibit animals at the 2024 Niagara County Fair. Re-enrollments received between January 6, 2024-March 1, 2024, can still participate in 4-H and attend all animal meetings & 4-H programs, but are not permitted to show animals at fair in 2024. This is a hard deadline and exceptions will not be made.
- First time enrolling/new members - must enroll by March 1, 2024, and meet the minimum meeting requirements (explained below) to be eligible to show any animal species at 2024 fair.
- Each Clover Bud & 4-H Member must attend at least 5 species meetings per year (between September 2023-July 2024) to meet minimum meeting requirements, to be eligible to show/exhibit animals of any species, at the 2024 Niagara County Fair.
- County level 4-H public presentations can count towards ONE of those 5 meetings, for those showing multiple species, counts for only 1 animal species of 4-H'er's choice *Decide at time of public presentation sign up
- Farm Safety Course (newly offered in 2024) can count towards ONE of those 5 meetings, for only 1 animal species of 4-H'er's choice (if showing multiple species) *Decide at time of course sign-in
- Each animal species program/leader has the right to require additional requirements in order to be eligible to show that species within their program, at leader's discretion.
