



You Will Need:

- 1 White Sock
- 1 or More Colorful Fluffy Sock(s)
- Scissors
- 2 4 Cups of Rice
- 3 Rubber Bands
- Cup or Other Scoop
- Hot Glue Gun & Glue
- Small Piece of Orange Pipe Cleaner

Hat

- Small Black Buttons or Beads
- Other Festive Buttons
- Funnel

Instructions:


- 1) Cut the sock a little above the ankle, leaving a small amount above the heel. You may discard the portion above the ankle or use it for another craft (such as a cat toy!).
- 2) Turn the sock inside out so you can see the textured, kind of fluffy side.
- 3) Put a few scoops of rice inside the sock, using the funnel to guide it down into the toe. Fill the sock until you have just a little bit of sock left at the top.
- 4) Use the rubber band to close off the top of the sock, holding the rice inside.
- 5) Put another rubber band or two about a third of the way down from the top, separating the rice into two round portions. Set the white sock aside. Plug in the hot glue gun.
- 6) Cut your colorful sock(s) as shown to the right, so that you have a rectangular/ cylindrical portion for the sweater and a little cap (toe) for the hat.
- 7) Place the sweater and hat on your white sock, so the toe cap covers the extra little bit (where the opening was) at the top, and the sweater goes around the snowman's middle, up to and slightly covering the rubberband at the snowman's neck. Use a hot glue gun to secure the hat and sweater in place.
- 8) Carefully glue buttons/beads and pipe cleaner to make the snowman's eves, nose, and buttons.



MAKE YOUR OWN: REINDEER ORNAMENT

Supplies:

- 3 Popsicle Sticks
- 2 Googly Eyes
- 1 Pompom
- Piece of Ribbon
- Shell, Bow, or Bead
- Tacky Glue, or Hot Glue



Directions:

- 1) Arrange the popsicle sticks so two are in a "V" formation, with the third crossing horizontally, leaving the top of the V exposed to be antlers.
- 2) Place a small dot of glue under each place where the sticks overlap.
- 3) Place a small dot of glue at the bottom of the V for the nose, and glue the pompom on. Then, place a dot of glue on either side, below the crosswise piece, and place the eyes.
- 4) Glue on a small decoration if desired.
- 5) Tie a ribbon at the top.

PAPER BEADS

You can use scraps of wrapping paper to make your own beads! Cut them into thin triangular strips, and roll them around a straw or pencil. Use a little glue so they stay together. (You can use Mod-Podge to coat the outside of the bead to make it last longer.) If you use a pencil, carefully pull the bead off so that it has a hole in the middle. If you use a straw, you can simply cut the straw at the desired length. Once your beads are dry, place them on an elastic or string to make an upcycled bracelet or necklace!

"Hi, my name is Kate Smith and I have three children involved in 4-H. They are currently 11, 13, and 15 years old. They enrolled as Cloverbuds between the ages of 5 and 7. As I take the time to reflect on all they have done through their participation in 4-H, it becomes clear how much 4-H has enriched their lives.



As Cloverbuds they learned about some of the foundational concepts 4-H is associated with....gardening, environmental resources, cooking, nutrition, etc. They were focused on "Learning by doing".....which is 4-H's slogan. They often spent time in small groups making crafts, baking, exploring new concepts, preforming simple experiments, learning about nature, and developing independence skills.



As they got older their participation was influenced by their individual interests. They began to better understand the four Hs of 4-H....Head, Heart, Hands, and Health and how those concepts applied to various topics. By working on all four Hs, they developed into well-rounded individuals. Their activities shifted to more advanced projects, working as part of a team, and opportunities to learn communication and leadership skills.



Their participation in 4-H continues to evolve now as teenagers. "To make the best better" is the 4-H motto and this seems to fit their current involvement. They now have the opportunity to utilize previously learned skills in different environments and on a larger scale. They are building their capacity for leading by developing organizational, time management, and long-term planning skills. They have taken trips through 4-H that have introduced them to other 4-Hers from different regions/backgrounds/experiences, they have learned about agencies and professions associated with government, they have developed job-skills through leadership roles at camp and fair, they have employed the structural framework needed to oversee a project from idea to reality through grant writing, and they have begun to explores areas that interest them individually more deeply.



I suspect that as they continue to grow, 4-H will allow them to take areas of interest and strength and naturally begin to explore how they could become potential career fields in the future.



4-H has remained a consistent presence in my children's lives because it has evolved with them by recognizing and accommodating their growth and changing interests. While 4-H is a constant in their lives, the remarkable reality is that 4-H is almost impossible to concisely define because it is designed to be inclusive of a wide array of areas and developmental stages. My children have had the luxury of relying on a singular organization for much of their childhood. 4-H has provided a consistent resource for them to explore new interests, meet influential people and develop friendships, hone skills in preferred areas, gain skills necessary for success now and in the future, and maybe even find a career path for adulthood. The stability of 4-H has been a comforting during what can sometimes be a tumultuous time in a child's life. I am grateful for all the opportunities my children have had as a result in their participation in 4-H."







December Baking Challenge

INSPIRED BY THE SHOW "NAILED IT"!

FESTIVE COOKIE TREES

Divide into teams in your family or 4-H Club and see who makes the most delicious and most festive trees!

Yields: 16 Tree cookies

INGREDIENTS:

Cookie Dough

- 2 1/4 c. all-purpose flour
- 3/4 c. unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1 c. sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. almond extract
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/4 tsp. kosher salt

Frosting

- 1 c. butter
- 4 c. powdered sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla extract
- 3 tbsp. water or milk
- Green gel icing/food
- 3 tbsp. of sprinkles

RECOMMENDED TIME FOR CHALLENGE: 50 MINUTES

STEPS

- 1. Pre heat oven to 350 degrees & prepare 2 cookie sheets
- 2. For cookie dough, use a mixer to cream butter and sugar together until light and fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes. Mix in egg and vanilla and almond extracts. In a separate bowl, whisk together dry ingredients. Add dry ingredients to wet ingredients and mix until smooth. Your dough will be thick!
- 3. Make three sizes of cookie dough balls: 1 teaspoon, 2 teaspoons, and 3 teaspoons. (You should have an even number of each.) Place medium and large cookies on a cookie sheet and press down slightly on each. Place small cookies on 2nd cookie sheet and do the same.
- 4. Bake until center looks mostly cooked, 7 to 8 minutes for the medium/large and 5 to 6 minutes for the small. When cookies are done, remove from oven and let cool 2 to 3 minutes, then transfer to a cookie rack to finish cooling.
- 5. For your frosting, use a mixer to beat butter until smooth. Add half the powdered sugar and mix until smooth. Add vanilla and 2 tablespoons water and mix until smooth. Add remaining powdered sugar and mix until smooth. Add green gel icing color to frosting and mix until your desired shade of green.
- 6. To assemble cookies, add frosting to ziplock bag, squeeze out air and seal, then cut one corner. Pipe a swirl of frosting onto the largest cookie, then top with medium cookie. Repeat steps with smallest cookie & then decorate with sprinkles. Refrigerate until you are ready to eat!

December Baking Challenge

SUGGESTIONS

Here are some ideas on how to make the most of this cookie challenge for your family or 4-H Club!

SUPPLIES:

Pull all of your supplies out before you start!

- · 2 baking sheets for each team/competitor
- Parchment paper to line the baking sheet (recommended)
- A mixer
- Bowls for mixing cookie dough and frosting
- A ziplock bag or piping bag for each competitor
- Measuring spoons
- Measuring cups
- Spatula
- Cookie rack for cooling if you have one!





COME UP WITH A PLAN

Discuss if you will break up into teams or all work together on this cookie challenge. Grown-ups vs. Kids is always a fun dynamic!

HOW WILL THE COMPETITION BE JUDGED?

Is there an impartial party who can see and taste the cookies made and issue a ruling? Could you use a 4-H style of judging, ranking the trees off of a set of agreed-upon criteria?

DISCUSS THE WHAT IF'S

Go over any challenges you might face in this competition, and go over possible solutions. If one team is not done when the timer goes off, what happens? Is a tie possible? Agree on the adjustments and the rules ahead of time.

SHARE THE FUN!

Encourage your friends and family to join in the friendly competition, and share photos or videos with your 4-H Club and the CCE Office! We'd love to see what you come up with and share with the community!
