


Spring Break April 23rd-24th 10-2pm



# Oneida County 4-H Teen Council and the New York Farm Show By Addison Snider and Claire Favata

Since 2001, the Oneida County 4-H Teen Council has been the Public Relations team of the New York State Farm Show in Syracuse, New York. This three-day show has six buildings of agricultural exhibitors from all over the country. Farmers from across the northeast and Canada come to the show to see what is new and exciting in agricultural technology, meet with equipment dealers, seed and nutrition reps, ag media, and more. It is also an opportunity for farmers to socialize with friends from far and wide.

The Farm Show spreads throughout six buildings on the NYS Fairgrounds. In four of the buildings, farmers are greeted by the smiling faces of the Oneida County 4-H Teen Council members, dressed to impress in suits and bright green 4-H ties. The members are responsible for greeting the public, selling and collecting entrance tickets, getting an accurate count of showgoers in each building, handing out programs, and selling hitch pins. In addition, the 4-H members give directions and answer questions throughout the day.

Working at the Farm Show is a great opportunity to learn about customer service and dealing with the public. It is also a great opportunity for 4-H members to explore different career paths in agriculture and allows members to network with established businesses on a grand scale.

The Farm Show puts the club up in a hotel for three nights. This is our favorite part, not only because you get to sit down after a long day of helping farmers but it gives us and chance to hang out and get to know our fellow club members better. Many times, this is the first opportunity for new club members to get to know the others, prior to our interstate exchange. Hanging out at the hotel usually involves eating dinner together, playing board/card games, or it could simply be sitting around and talking in a circle about our days or what we have been up to since we have last time we saw each other. 

At least 5 youth must submit the project to be considered for the Fan Favorite opportunity.


We won't know which projects qualify until we are setting up the displays at the fair.

# Your Boonville Fair Projects will be on display at the Boonville Fair during Fair week 7/23/24-7/28/24

**Boonville Fair Exhibit Hall 4-H Registrations** 

Registration deadline: July 1, 20

All 4-H Members are encouraged to submit projects for public view at the Boonville Fair. In an effort to reduce paperwork for everyone. ALL projects that are to be displayed in the Youth Building must be preregistered. Projects not pre-registered by July 1st will not be accepted for display or awards.

The information supplied will enable us to determine how many judges and in what categories they are needed.

Pre-registration will also allow us to print out the Exhibitor's Cards (Eliminating the need for you to hand write them)

We are limiting the number of exhibits a youth can submit Cloverbuds no more than 7 and Traditional 4-H Members no more than 12.

Please review the Boonville Fair book to determine what Section and Class your project should go under. If you have questions, please be sure to contact the office. 315-736-3394 x105 or email me lsk23@cornell.edu at least a week before the deadline

# What to expect the day of judging?

- 1. ALL Projects must be registered by July 1st
- 2. The day of judging you will bring ALL your registered projects to CCE Oneida
- 3. Youth will take their Projects and Paperwork to their assigned Volunteer Evaluator. (Pick up paperwork at the door)
- 4. The Evaluator will go through each of the projects Asking the 4-H Member typical Who, What, When, Where, and Why questions.
- 5. Ribbons will be awarded. Blue, Red and White. Cloverbuds are not judged but still meet with an evaluator.
- 6. Youth will work with the evaluator to select one of their Blue Ribbon Projects to go onto the State Fair.
- 7. All Projects will be left at the office the night of Judging.
- 8. The 4-H Staff will take all the projects to the Boonville Fair and set up the 4-H Display. We encourage youth to visit the fair to see all the 4-H Projects on Display.
- 9. The last night of the Fair projects can be picked up in Boonville after 5pm otherwise projects can be picked up from the CCE office starting the following Friday.
- 10. Any projects going to the State Fair need to be registered on line. When your Boonville project is picked up there will be instructions on how to register projects going to the State Fair.
- 11. State Fair projects require a written description
- 12. 4-H Staff will transport Projects to and from the State Fair.



# Jr. Superintendents

NYS 4-H Needs YOUth!

The New York State 4-H Office is seeking motivated 4-H Teens (age 16+) to join us in helping make the NY State Fair an exciting and memorable experience for fair visitors and 4-H families. Successful applicants will be invited to spend a part of the fair (August 23 - September 4) working as a Junior Superintendent (aka Jr. Super) in the 4-H Youth Building. Your responsibilities could include anything from leading icebreaker activities to helping with evaluations to holding baby chicks.

### Teen Evaluator Role (13+)

Teens usually serve three to four days of their rotation in a specific program area, but it could be less depending on need.


- The number of Teen Evaluators and the days needed varies, depending
  on the project area and the total number of exhibits to be judged. For
  example, foods and clothing evaluations usually take place on different
  days; the same teen(s) may serve as a Teen Evaluator for both, but on
  different days. Some Teen Evaluators may not be scheduled to
  participate as a TE all four days of Fair.
- Depending on the needs for general Teen Leader/Evaluator positions, not all teens applying may be assigned a position. When this happens, we encourage County Educators to schedule teens to serve in the County Booth or other program areas.

# **Event Assistant (13+)**

State Fair offers youth a variety of opportunities to explore opportunities for growth and learning. Teens may choose to assist with a specific youth building event working directly with the adult key leader.

Teens will be responsible for assisting with the set up, taking direction during the event, awards and clean up at the conclusion of the event. Teens leaders may be asked to act as the MC for the event or run errands as appropriate and needed.

The actual origin of cheese is said to be unknown, while remnants of this exact dairy product have been found inside pottery fragments that were discovered in Egyptian tombs that are estimated to be around 4,000 years old.



Through Dairy in the Classroom students have been using acids, bacteria and enzymes to make mozzarella cheese right in their classrooms!

Soft cheeses, like mozzarella, are made by adding an acid to milk to make it coagulate. In this example we used citric acid. Coagulation is the chemical process of a liquid changing into a solid state.

In this instance causing milk to become a solid curd, the base of our cheese.



Our starting point, whole milk

The addition of the acid triggers the beneficial bacteria found in milk to start breaking down lactose, the natural sugar found in milk, into lactic acid.

The additional lactic acid lowers the pH, hinders the growth of harmful organisms and helps give cheese its unique taste.



Curds formed by adding citric acid and rennet

To control this process we can add in an enzyme called rennet, a protein catalyst which speeds up a specific chemical reaction.

Imagine it as speed boost for your cheese.

### NEW YORK YOUTH LIVESTOCK "NON-OWNERSHIP" POLICY

The exhibitor, upon request to the event sponsor, shall provide proof of ownership of any exhibit.

This **certificate** verifies that a 4-H member in New York has enrolled this animal as a 4-H Project Animal by June 1 of the current year.

For all "non-owned" animals, the 4-H member and the owner of the animal have entered an agreement. A lease agreement allows a 4-H member to use the specified animal as a 4-H project.

Cornell Cooperative Extension (CCE) encourages the use of written lease agreements, however, it is the responsibility of the exhibitor and the animal owner to agree upon the lease terms. Neither CCE nor Cornell University is legally involved in writing, implementing or terminating any lease agreements.

The following bill was legally adopted by the NYS Department of Agriculture & Markets July 1987.

Exhibits shall have been owned by the exhibitor for a period of at least (30) days prior to the entry of the exhibit provided, however, that any animal exhibit entered in a youth fair, youth exhibition or 4-H show or exhibition shall have been in the care of the exhibitor for a period of at least (60) days prior to entry of the exhibit.

CCE staff and state program administrators have maintained the following philosophy since 1987.

Non-owner/lease opportunities are intended for youth who do not already own an animal of this type. For exhibition purposes, youth are limited to one non-owned breeding class animal of this type.

### Specific for Equine:

The only approved NYS Horse Program exceptions are donkey, mule, miniature equine, and driving equine (used only for driving). In which cases a youth may own or lease an equine and also lease a donkey, mule, miniature equine, and driving equine (used only for driving).

## **REMEMBER TO:**

- Include a copy of your CURRENT COGGIN'S TEST (Test dated this year or last year)
- Include proof of <u>RABIES VACCINATION</u> (Must be current; dated this year, given more than 14 days prior to the arrival to the Fairgrounds and remain current for the duration of the Fair)
