



Agriculture and Horticulture

Our programs prioritize environmental stewardship, best management practices, and economic viability for Dutchess County residents, farmers, and producers. They span Commercial Agriculture, Commercial Horticulture, Community Horticulture, and Ag Navigator.



Projects offered to the community:

- Ag Districts and Ag Value Assessment
- Ag Breakfast (Farmers and Municipal Officials)
- Ag Forum (public) at the DCF
- Ag Navigator- resource for municipalities and farmers on all things related to agriculture.

- Master Gardener Volunteer program
- Speakers Bureau (libraries/Garden Clubs/community groups) on specific horticultural topics.
- Farmers Market Outreach: Ask A Master Gardener
- New/Beginning Farmers
- Conventional Farming/Green Industry/Christmas Tree industry

New York State law requires County Legislatures to conduct a review of all parcels located in Agricultural Districts every 8 years. In 2023, partnering with Dutchess County Planning and Development and Dutchess County Soil and Water Conservation District, we reviewed over 4000 parcels in Agricultural Districts. Our efforts have yielded remarkable achievements in the certification process. We successfully crafted an approved on-line enrollment worksheet (first in NYS), meticulously reviewing and processing 2,700 returned worksheets, ensuring precision in data compilation. Serving as the dynamic Point-of-contact, fielding 370 calls, and responding to 249 emails. Our outreach efforts extended to 100 specified target property owners, fostering collaboration with agency partners and providing a tour of Agricultural Districts to a representative from NYS Agriculture and Markets. Furthermore, we produced insightful maps and conducted quantitative analyses, aiding in determinations for parcel inclusion.

The **Ag Navigator** will be the first line contact for all agricultural needs, have a good understanding of and familiarity with agriculture, including existing **agricultural resources** which may include those found within the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Plan. The Navigator assesses agricultural needs and works to match those needs with existing programs.

We facilitated Ag Breakfast sessions for farmers and municipal officials, as well as a public Ag Forum at the DCF. The Ag Navigator serves as a comprehensive **resource for municipalities and farmers**, covering all aspects of agriculture.

Our programs encompass a Speakers Bureau that engages with libraries, Garden Clubs, and more to discuss specific horticultural topics of interest. Our Farmers Market Outreach offers the opportunity to "Ask A Master Gardener." We have a "Hotline" for homeowners and Commercial Horticulture business to tap into when they need an answer. Additionally, we host our Annual Plant Sale that funds all that we do! Our Master Gardener Volunteers have amazing educational service projects that can make a difference in their community, like Matt's Hoophouse project (below). Master Gardeners, making a difference!





Under Matt Shayly's guidance, Dutchess County Master Gardeners collaborated with local food pantries, constructing gardens and greenhouses. Shayly oversees cultivation, managing a 4,000 square foot traditional garden at Dutchess Community College and an 800 square foot hoop house in Millbrook. The greenhouse, with 159 plants including tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, cantaloupes, and eggplants, not only provides organic produce but also serves as an educational hub for hydroponic gardening. Shayly explores interdisciplinary connections with mental health, food insecurity, STEM, and resource conservation.

228 Dutchess County Commercial vegetable, fruit, grape and berry farmers, processors and related industries increased their knowledge and awareness of best management practices and pest management through the **Eastern NY Commercial Horticulture Program (ENYCHP.)**



Family and Consumer Education

The Family and Consumer Education (FCE) Department addresses the dynamic and complex needs of Dutchess County families with programming designed to engage, empower and educate our participants. The diverse and vibrant communities of Dutchess County continue to face challenges with wellness, finances, education and parenting. Our Family and Consumer Education programs has the goal of adapting to the ever-changing needs of Dutchess County households with applicable education and information.





FCE's **Relatives As Parents Program (RAPP)** Support Group provides accessible support groups and other supportive services to relative caregivers and the children in their care and focuses on the needs of a growing number of families with youth being parented by kinship caregivers, many of whom are grandparents.

The support group meets twice per month with families throughout Dutchess. We serve the 27% of foster families in Dutchess County that fall within the kinship category-grandparents or other relatives raising a child.



Our Parenting Skills Workshop Series (PSWS) is part of the Department and Community and Family Services (DCFS) efforts to reunite families in crisis. Our 8-class series educates families on how to bring enhanced communication and harmony to the household. Our Parenting Skills Workshop Series (PSWS) parenting education workshops work exclusively with the Dutchess County Department of Community and Family Services to help reunite parents with their children. PSWS graduated 78 parents in the 80 classes that they ran this year (10, 8 class sessions)

The **Parenting and Support Education (PASE)** programs run throughout the county as a voluntary program with the same Cornell University evidence-based curriculum, we use in PSWS. This workshop program collaborated with the Child Care Council of Dutchess and Putnam, St John's Episcopal Church, Dutchess County Behavioral Health's ITAP program and the Hyde Park School District and **graduated 99 adults in Dutchess County in the 87 classes** we ran in 2023.



In collaboration with nearby Cornell Cooperative Extensions, our Department of Health's **Hudson River Fish Advisory Program** promotes community health through education. We offer local maps with DOH fish advice, conduct outreach programs, create informational and preparation videos, and teach bioaccumulation in schools and community locations. In the past year, the program hosted **32 events**, directly engaging with 1713 individuals, showcasing our commitment to enhancing public health through informed choices.

DC Fair Fish Advisory Book

FCE provided **financial literacy education to all ages in the County** with our three programs, Financial Literacy for Youth (FLY), Your Money Your Goals (YMYG) for adults and Money Smart for Older Adults (MSOA) for seniors. We provide lessons that focused on the psychology of money, making a spending plan, checking and savings, credit cards and interest, credit reporting and scams. These programs cover all ages from middle school to senior citizens with age-appropriate curriculum that explores our saving and spending habits and needs and how to achieve long term financial independence **reached 147 youth, 10 adults and 13 senior citizens** in 2023.



A participant, new to the area and attending parenting classes for support, found immense value. Taking the class twice, he connected with another fathers facing a similar situation. They exchanged contacts, offering mutual support. Impressed by our mission, he joined the Program Advisory Council of the FCE Program, highlighting the impactful connections and contributions stemming from our programs!

All CCEDC 4-H Youth Development programs share a vision of Positive Youth Development where participants develop behaviors, competencies and values that lead them to make good choices, reduce risky behaviors and empower them to succeed.

Flourishing Farmers are very special young people who face major challenges. Staff and volunteers worked to provide **20 youth** with the support they needed to enjoy and learn agricultural skills. Flourishing Farmers is integrated in our 4-H Club program and offers youth who need special accommodations the same opportunities that 4-H members experience but with more support. This program is proudly supported by Dutchess County in partnership with the ThinkDifferently initiative.

After-school program supported by BTCF

Wingdale Elementary School After-School Program, in the Dover Free Union School District, serves a diverse population. Nearly 70% qualify for free or reduced lunch, and many come from immigrant families with English as a second language. The afterschool program aims to teach some of the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in our County, providing 30 sessions for 63 unduplicated 1st and 2nd graders.

Supported by Berkshire Taconic Community foundation (BTCF), the after-school program takes place twice weekly and provide predominantly low income and children from immigrant families with science-based education to help them learn about our county and state.

Our **Ag in the Classroom (AITC)** program takes place in March each year; Ag Literacy Week saw 4-H staff work with schools and community groups to provide over **2200 1-3rd grade children** with agricultural education.

Projects offered to the community:

- Over 3000 children aged between 5 and 18 received vocational and/or life skills education in 2023 through 4-H programs.
- The budget per child averaged out at less than \$50 per year!
- Volunteer hours 'donated' to the programs were worth approximately \$318,000 according to values set by the Independent Sector.



- The retention rate of youth in 4-H programs is over 92%.
- Youth served were from all corners of the county and from a range of backgrounds including widely different abilities, ethnicities and socio-economic statuses.

The <u>Green Teen</u> Workforce Development Program is based in Beacon. Eligible teens are employed by CCEDC and learn vocational skills by growing over 1200lbs of vegetables in a community garden which they then distribute to the community through a Free Farm Stand. Staff also provide support and education in areas including employment skills, healthy eating, cooking and social justice.

In Poughkeepsie we partnered with Nubian Directions, providing employment and vocational training for 10 youth and restoring the plot at Winnicke Ave from wasteland to a flourishing garden. Funds from NYS courtesy of

Environment and Energy

Through education, technical support, research and partnerships, the **Environment & Energy Program** works to empower individuals and communities to expand their knowledge and take actions to protect, restore and enhance the environment of Dutchess County, the Mid-Hudson region and beyond.

The Mid-Hudson NYSERDA Regional Clean Energy Hub is a team of trusted, knowledgeable, community-based organizations, led by CCEDC, working to equitably support residents, non-profits, and small businesses to learn more about and access the NYS energy efficiency and clean energy programs and projects available to them. Energy Advisors provide free support for residents and businesses in the Mid-Hudson Valley looking to make their home or workplace cleaner, greener, and more cost-efficient.

The <u>CCE Climate Resilience Partnership</u> (CRP) works to support and empower Hudson Valley communities to **build long term** resilience to extreme weather and adapt to the impacts of climate change. The CRP is a collaboration of Cornell Cooperative Extensions (CCE) of Columbia-Greene, Dutchess, Rensselaer, Rockland and Ulster Counties in partnership with the NYS Water Resources Institute at Cornell University and the NYS Department of Environmental Conservation's Hudson River Estuary Program.

Climate Resilience assessment workshop

Our Dutchess County Environmental Planning & Sustainability efforts in partnership with the Dutchess County Planning Department work to provide Dutchess County municipal officials, volunteers and residents with the education, resources, and support needed to make informed landuse planning decisions within their municipalities that lead to protection of natural resources while supporting economic vitality.

Smart Energy Choices – Mid-Hudson

All residents, businesses and communities of Dutchess County have access to new opportunities to benefit from this transition including clean energy careers, home improvements, even rebates for businesses and personal transportation. But there's a lot of information out there, and people may not know where to start.

Programs and projects offered to the community:

- Energy Advisors participated in 236
 events across the Mid-Hudson region engaging 6439 individuals about energy
 efficiency and clean energy programs and
 projects.
- CCE Dutchess Climate & Environment educators provided support to 6
 Dutchess County communities to complete 9 actions of the NYS Climate Smart Communities Certification program. In partnership with CCE Columbia-Green & CCE Ulster, staff supported the completion of 17 Climate Adaptation & Resilience Plans for Columbia County communities.
- Supported 16 Dutchess County Conservation Advisory Committees (CAC) and the Dutchess County Environmental Management Council to share their successes, challenges and goals for 2023 with over 50 attendees.
- Supported 5 watershed organizations along with local partners and non-profits to discuss solutions to challenges.
- Partnered with the DC Planning
 Department to update the DC Natural
 Resources Inventory. The updated NRI
 now includes an interactive
 environmental mapper.

- Worked with 3 DC communities, in partnership with the NYS DEC Hudson River Estuary Program, to complete community Natural Resource Inventories (NRI's), and worked with another community to kick-off their NRI project which will continue into 2024.
- Employed 6 Youth Environmental Educators who engaged 148 youth in outdoor education and STEM topics at multiple events.
- NCLI Youth Environmental Educators completed their "Learn the Fall Kill with Teens" community project participating in a trash assessment and collected bioacoustics data along the creek. They also began researching the development of a community composting project for the City of Poughkeepsie in 2023.
- In October 2023 the Env. & Energy Program, including the NCLI Youth Environmental Educators, hosted 98 5th graders from Krieger Elementary School at Quiet Cove Park to participate in A Day in the Life of the Hudson River and Harbor a hands on day where students learn about the chemical, biological and physical aspects of the River.

The <u>Dutchess No Child Left Inside (NCLI) program</u> works to get youth outdoors to connect with nature while also exploring various STEM topics and providing important job-training and life skills. The Dutchess NCLO program Hires teenagers (14-19) from the City of Poughkeepsie and provides them with the training and skills necessary to become Youth Environmental Educators in the program.
