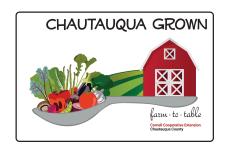

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WHY BUY LOCAL?

Purchasing and investing in locally grown, raised and produced products has an incredible value!

Fresh: Eating locally guarantees freshness.

Locally grown produce is usually harvested no more than twenty-four hours prior to purchasing —bringing to the table crisp, fresh vegetables at the height of their nutritional value.

Taste: Produce picked and eaten fresh tastes better. Even a week's delay in reaching the table will cause food to shrink and lose flavor. Many of our local farmers use heritage varieties, which tend to have more flavor and remind us of the garden vegetables and fruits of years ago.

Safe: Knowing and trusting the folks who grow your food provides for more purity without the use of undesirable chemical residual on harvested food. E-coli and salmonella bacteria are less likely to be found in local food sources.

Variety: Local farmers offer a wider variety of produce that we need to stay healthy. Just visit one of our many farm stands in Chautauqua County to find out!

Economy: The purchase of locally grown food puts money into local economies. Studies have shown that every dollar spent with a local food business generates up to \$2.50 in additional local economic activity.

Community. Buying local builds long-term mutually beneficial relationships between food producers and food buyers, and reconnects eaters with the source of their food. You can also protect farmland and open space from development by keeping family agriculture a vibrant and competitive use of land.

Environment. Most food in the United States travels an average of 1500 miles before it reaches our table. Buying local reduces carbon dioxide emissions. Small family farms typically take a less intensive approach to producing food and use fewer synthetic pesticides, herbicides and fertilizers, and if they do use chemicals, follow Integrated
Pest Management.

AN EQUITABLE FOOD SYSTEM

Ensuring our local food system is accessible to all helps our food system thrive. Here are ways our community aims to craft a more equitable food system!

Food is FRESH: All individuals who wish to purchase produce, and other food products, deserve the best quality products. Often food that is not local travels far distances, losing quality and nutritional value.

Food is AFFORDABLE: While some local products are priced at a value that ensures profit for the farmer or grower, there are many programs that assist in offering food, and local food, at a price available for all. This includes farmers' markets and farm stands that accept SNAP or Double Up Food Bucks, distribution of New York State Farmers Market Nutrition coupons via the Office of the Aging or WIC, as well as community food service programs, such as congregant meal sites, mobile markets, and food pantries. Other programs, such as the Office of the Aging's Local Roots Program, offer food to specific populations who may be more vulnerable to food insecurity.

Food is appropriate to all CULTURES: As most of us can attest, food is an important part of our family traditions, history and culture. Often, due to our WNY seasonality, culturally relevant foods may not be available for all. This can include products that are native to one's home country, vital for cultural recipes, or simply foods that individuals and families love to enjoy. More and more local farmers are recognizing the need to grow what they can to ensure that individuals of all backgrounds have access to the foods they want. In addition, food pantries are procuring more and more culturally relevant foods.

Food is NUTRITOUS: Food comes in all shapes, colors and ingredients. Fed is best. However, all community members deserve equal access to foods that nourish our bodies, be that physical, emotional or culturally. Increased nutrition benefit programs increase access to farmers markets and mobile markets. Farm to school programs expand local and nutritious food access for students. More food pantries are recognizing the need to offer foods for infants/young children, such as formula, as well as food for our furry friends!

Chautauqua County is home to over 1,500 farms that produce high quality, safe, and nutritious foods for us all to enjoy! Here you will find your guide to all things local foods, including farms that sell products direct to consumers, farmers markets, and restaurants that purchase locally produced foods. This map is updated often, and is administered by Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chautauqua County.

UPICK FARMS

Upick farms offer the Chautauqua and surrounding community the opportunity to visit local fruit orchards or vegetable patches up close! U-Pick farms offer visitors the chance to literally pick the produce off the vine or tree. It is also a great way to learn more about local farms, provides opportunity to support a small business, and often produce is cheaper when purchased in bulk from a u-pick operation.

NUTRITION BENEFIT PROGRAMS



Many low-income and senior residents are eligible for **SNAP** benefits. Contact Chautauqua's local NOEP (Nutrition Outreach Education Program) Coordinator to sign up today! In addition, many local farmers markets accept SNAP benefits, as well as most retail food stores. Visit https://www.feedmorewny.org/snap-resources/ for more information.



When you use your SNAP benefits, **Double Up** matches your fruit and vegetable purchases dollar for dollar (up to \$20 a day). That means you and your family get twice the fresh fruits and veggies. Several farmers markets in the county currently participate in the Double Up Food Bucks program. Find a Double Up market nearest you by visiting: https://doubleupnys.com/



The Farmers' Market Nutrition Program (FMNP) provides checks to women, infants and children through the <u>Women, Infants and Children Program (WIC)</u> and to seniors through the <u>Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)</u> for the purchase of locally grown, fresh fruits and vegetables.

Fresh fruits and vegetables can be purchased with checks at farmers' markets during the summer and fall. The program runs from June - November 30. FMNP checks are distributed to all WIC participants and via the Office of the Aging starting annually in July.



The FreshConnect Checks Program was designed to increase the purchasing power of Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) consumers by 40 percent while supporting local farmers, farmers' markets, farm stands, and mobile markets. The FreshConnect Checks Program has also been available to veterans, service members, and their immediate families since 2014, and can be used to purchase fresh foods at participating farmers' markets and farm stands.

If you are a veteran, visit your local VA office. All SNAP participants are also eligible for Fresh Connect checks at participating farmer's markets



The Veggie RX program is a collaboration between the Jamestown Mobile Market and The Chautauqua Center. Medical providers and other staff at partnering health care organizations give "prescription" vouchers that act as money to their patients. Those patients spend the vouchers on fresh produce at area public markets. Veggie Rx patients receive five free servings each week through the duration of the season

CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY COMMUNITY SUPPORTED AGRICULTURE (CSA) SHARES

Community Supported Agriculture (CSA), one type of direct marketing, consists of a community of individuals who pledge support to a farm operation so that the farmland becomes, either legally or spiritually, the community's farm, with the growers and consumers providing mutual support and sharing the risks and benefits of food production.

It is important to research available CSAs to find one that is right for you! Each CSA is unique in it's offerings, add-ons, location and pickup points. Most will also offer weekly recipe ideas or produce preservation tips.

CSAs are a perfect investment for an individual or family who wishes to experience the WNY growing season, and is comfortable with trying new items week to week!

TIPS FOR SHOPPING AT YOUR LOCAL **FARMERS MARKET**

Know WNY Seasonality: Prior to visiting, research WNY seasonal produce items so you know what kinds of fruits and vegetables to expect when you arrive at the market! Seasonality will differ depending on the type of market you visit, as well as the time of year

Bring a reusable bag: Many farmers and vendors do not offer plastic bags in support of the local environment. Visiting a market is the perfect time to bring that reusable tote! Many markets also sell bags as a fundraiser for their events

Go early: Farmers markets tend to be less crowded in the earlier hours, and it gives you the chance to get the best selection of products

Talk with the farmers: If you find a product that is new to you, or if you are curious about a farmers' business, don't be afraid to ask questions! Most farmers and vendors are more than happy to discuss their products, origins, growing practices and even may share recipes and cooking tips

Buy in Bulk: Many of the best pricing deals at farmers markets are when you buy in bulk. You can also purchase product in bulk to preserve, via canning or freezing



SHOPPING AT A LOCAL FARMSTAND

Plan for Seasonality: The WNY growing season varies, sometimes even week to week during spring/summer/fall! While you can plan to purchase some items ahead of your visit, go into the shopping experience with flexibility.

Hours May Vary: Often farm stands are located at a family farms' home. Hours, even if set on social media or online, may vary because of this. Visit with patience, as many farm stands are staffed by members or even children of the farm. This presents a unique opportunity to learn more about each farms' values and growing process!

Preserve Your Bounty: Many farm stand operations will sell you product in bulk; think tomatoes for canning, or strawberries for jam. Do not be afraid to call ahead to see when you may be able to purchase in bulk, and always be sure to place your order ahead of pickup to give the farm time to pick and package your produce.

Bring cash: Most farm stands are cash only; while some do accept credit/debit and several take FMNP coupons or even SNAP, most are cash. Some are even 'pay with honesty' and do not have staff on site to provide exact change. Come prepared with smaller bills.

What Can I Expect at a Food Pantry?

Each food pantry in the county, or other emergency food program, have their own intake process. It is best to call ahead to learn the time and days your nearest pantry is open, as well as to ask questions on what you may need to bring your first visit.

Some pantries even take appointments.

Most pantries in Chautauqua County require an ID upon visiting; this could include a driver's license, a student ID or even a formal membership card.

If you do not have ID, do not worry! Pantries will work with you to ensure you get the nourishing foods you are looking for.

CHAUTAUQUA COUNTY OFFICE FOR THE AGING: LOCAL ROOTS



Local Roots is a partnership between SNAP-Ed and Office for Aging Services that helps older adults in Chautauqua County with Low or Very Low Food Security access fresh and affordable produce.

Local Roots is a CSA-style (Community Supported Agriculture) produce program focused on increasing access to the first thing often cut from diets of those struggling with Low or Very Low Food Security – FRESH fruits and vegetables!

Local Roots is a produce distribution for **12 weeks between mid-June and mid-September**. The local grower, Abers Acres, picks the produce fresh on distribution days based on what is ready to be harvested.

The 30-minute produce distribution occurs at 12 locations each week to preregistered older adults through a partnership between OFAS and St. Luke's Jamestown Mobile Market (JMM). Locations include Forestville, Dunkirk, Fredonia, Brocton, Cherry Creek, Sinclairville, Mayville, Findley Lake, Clymer, Jamestown, Falconer, and Lakewood.

LITTLE FREE PANTRIES

Started within our county during the Covid-19 pandemic, Little Free Pantries have been popping up around Chautauqua, aimed to serve those in need of food through mutual aid and no restrictions.

According to Nebraska Extension, "Little Free Pantries (LFP) are weather and animal-proof structures that store food and other items for those in need. They are accessible 24/7 and located in neighborhoods, typically in front yards or by sidewalks. LFP's are built by and stocked by private citizens who want to help those in need in their community. How often each pantry is refilled is based on the person(s) stocking it."

The 4-H year is October 1-September 30 and serves youth ages 5-8 in the Cloverbud program and youth ages 9-18 as "traditional" 4-H members.

4H offers 10 animal projects plus 25 non-animal projects like sewing, leathercrafting, and photography.
