Oneida County 4-H is Going Paperless



For the 2025-26 4-H Year

- No enrollments accepted after May 1st
- Clubs more than 3 months behind in submitting financial reports will be suspended until reporting is up to date and 4-H Staff has agreed to lift the suspension (this could take several weeks). While on suspension a club may not fundraise, meet or hold any 4-H activities/events. Youth enrolled in a suspended club may only participate in activities approved by 4-H Staff.
- No new or existing clubs can start the new 4-H year unless a representative attends the mandatory leader meeting outlined below.
- Volunteers wishing to start a 4-H club must have been enrolled at least 4 months prior to starting a Club.
 During this interim time, youth parents and Volunteers should enroll as independents. They can meet as a group to do projects and coordinate the roles and responsibilities each will play in their future 4-H Club.

Attention All Leaders and Parent Volunteers!! Sexual Harassment Training

MAKE A DIFFERENCE VOLUNTEER TO BE A 4-H CLUB LEADER

TIME COMMITMENT:

Average of 3-6 hours monthly from October through September (depending on club size and activities)

OUALIFICATIONS/SKILLS NEEDED:

- Must be at least 21 years of age or older
- Must be an Oneida County enrolled volunteer for a minimum of 6 months
- Sincere interest in the safety and well-being of youth
- Ability to teach and motivate youth while nurturing self-esteem, decision-making skills, responsibility, and leadership in youth
- Ability to organize information and materials and delegate responsibility
- Ability to work and communicate effectively both verbally and written
- Ability to motivate parents and other volunteers to assume leadership positions
- Ability to work with minimal supervision from professional staff
- Interest in working with other volunteers and professional staff in an educational setting
- Willingness to follow the philosophy, policies and procedures of Cornell Cooperative Extension program

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Organize regular meetings and plan the yearly program and activities
- Recruit new members, recognize graduating members and complete all forms provided by the Extension Office
- Provide help for officers in preparing meeting agendas, learning skills and carrying out other duties
- Secure and distribute project materials and other resources for members and leaders;
 conduct group activities and events
- Participate in county, regional, and statewide events and programs and encourage other leaders and 4-H members to participate as well
- Provide adequate leadership for projects and activities of the club
- Share responsibilities among club families
- Involve volunteers in learning experiences to help them reach their potential
- Help volunteers plan and implement learning experiences with members and families
- Set up processes to share information in the club
- Maintain regular contact with Extension staff
- Attend yearly volunteer training and keep up-to-date on club, regional, state, and national programs

County Project Medals and Outstanding Awards County Project Medal Criteria

4-H youth who submit specific project(s) that are judged and on display at the Oneida County Boonville Fair within the current 4-H year may be eligible for a County Project Medal No need to apply! 4-H staff determine if a youth has qualified for a project medal.

Medals are grouped into specific categories by similar topics. Specific medal requirements are outlined below.

4-H Cloverbuds will receive a certificate of accomplishment.

Creative Sciences

Fine Arts & Crafts- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the arts and craft section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Clothing & Textiles- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the clothing and textiles section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Food & Nutrition- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the food and trition section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Hobby Crafts- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the home environment section the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Performance Arts- Must have completed at least 6 hours of instruction and or performance and earned a blue ribbon for a performance arts themed project entered in the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Photography- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the photography section the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Robotics-Must have competed at least 6 hours of robotics instruction or participated in a competition and earned a blue ribbon for a robotics themed project entered in the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

STEM, Electrical, Woodworking- Must receive at least 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted in the STEM section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Environmental Science

Archery- Must have completed at least 6 hours of archery instruction and earned a blue ribbon for an archery themed project entered in the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Entomology- Must receive at least three blue ribbons for projects submitted in the entomology section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair

Horticulture-Must receive at least three blue ribbons for projects submitted in the horticulture section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Environmental Education - Must receive at least three blue ribbons for projects submitted in the environmental education section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

YOU NEED TO PARTICIPATE IN THE FAIR TO EARN PROJECT MEDALS

Personal Development

Community Service- Must have completed and logged at least 6 hours of community service into the online Faces of 4-H registration. To count towards a Medal, the hours must directly support Oneida County 4-H Program. Hours must be from the current 4-H year.

Public Presentations/Horse Communications- Must have received a blue ribbon for their current year County Level Public Presentation or a Horse Communication.

Leadership– Must have performed at least 6 hours of leadership. Hours must be logged online and directly support the Oneida County 4-H Program.

Creative Communications- Must have received 3 blue ribbons for projects submitted into the communications section of the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Safety- Must have received a certification in a specific safety course and earned a blue ribbon for a safety themed project at the Oneida County Boonville Fair.

Outstanding Awards

Youth ages 13+ must submit a on-line application requesting an interview to be considered for an Outstanding Award. Youth may apply for one or more of the Outstanding Awards.

Trips that <u>may</u> also accompany awards for Creative Science, Animal Science, and Environmental Science for appropriately aged 4-Hers include: 4-H Career Explorations at Cornell University, "University U", "Focus for Teens", Teen Winter Weekend, ABC Trip, STARR, NY State Forestry Program, and Outdoor Adventure Weekend.

Creative Science – \$100 Hobby Lobby Gift Card

Animal Science – \$100 Tractor Supply Gift Card

Environmental Science – \$100 Runnings Gift Card

Personal Development- \$100 Walmart Gift Card; Awarded trip to 4-H Capital

Applicants should demonstrate Outstanding participation within multiple topics that fall within the categories listed below. (For a list of what topics fall within the categories please see the County Project Medals criteria.) Applicants will participate in a face to face interview on Veteran's Day, November 11th where their year activities will be discussed.

<u>Animal Science Applicants</u> should be prepared to talk about the care and management of their project animals, including but not limited to health records, breeding production, nutrition, income expenses, etc.....

<u>Creative Science Applicants</u> should be able to discuss the projects they have completed within this area including what they learned, challenges they faced, how they overcame those obstacles and how these projects have led them to try and expand their interests in other ways.

<u>Environmental Science Applicants</u> should be able to share the knowledge they gained from their projects with the interviewer. They should demonstrate an understanding of topics like field ID, gardening, entomology, and/or archery.

<u>Personal Development</u> applicants should be able to communicate the importance of volunteerism and show how they have grown through their community service and or leadership experiences.

Each individual had the opportunity to try milking a goat, which for some is a once in a lifetime experience. To end the day we went straight down to Finndale Farms for their for their grand tour of a very large dairy operation, and took a classic picture at the signature Finndale Farms sign.

June 30th was surely a day to remember, between the long bus rides and ponchos! All of the members got up bright and early to head on the bus for Niagara Falls, an amazing sight with lots to see. Once we arrived after the long bus ride, the Cave of the Winds was the first stop on the list!

Every person was suited up in their ponchos and ready to face the water from the gigantic falls above us. This was definitely a crowd favorite from many as it felt like we were in the waterfall! Afterwards, the group got to split up and explore, finding lots to do for the rest of the time.

The long awaited Super Secret Surprise was coming for us on Tuesday, July 1. Thanks to our wonderful leaders, the 4Her's had to be strategic and good problem solvers in order to conquer challenges assigned to each group. They all had to learn how to work together and make the best out of the challenges to receive points, for another surprise later in the week!

Our group was given a run down of how they run their company and just how much product is being produced in a short period of time. It wouldn't be a dairy plant tour without a taste testing either - we all tried a variety of delicious products.

The day ended with reminiscing for the group. We all knew the trip was coming to an end and the people from Montana were leaving the next day. In order to celebrate such an amazing and unforgettable time, the leaders organized a well thought out and interesting dinner. After dinner we used points gathered through different challenges throughout the week at a prize auction. After the prize auction we did real country line dancing! - Food Coloring (or spices like cinnamon to color it and give it a nice smell!)



Mix together ingredients in a sauce pan.



Have an adult help you cook the mixture over low/medium heat while you continue stirring.



Stir the mixture until it gets thicker and gathers around the spoon.



Remove the dough onto a plate or wax paper to cool.


