

April 25: Looking at Poultry Health Concerns

Poultry Health Workshop - A Closer Look at Poultry Health Concerns and Disease Control
Thursday, April 25, 2013
6:30-8:30 PM
Benton Town Hall, 1000 Rt. 14A, Penn Yan, NY

There is a growing interest in small-scale poultry operations, both for eggs and meat. Many producers are beginners while others have learned from trial and error. Health issues of chickens is a



growing concern yet rarely addressed. To give producers a better understanding of these health issues Cornell Cooperative Extension is hosting a Poultry Workshop featuring Dr. Jarra Jagne from the Cornell Animal Health Diagnostic Center. She has seen an

upswing of old diseases and has been providing groups an overview on disease control and prevention.

The date of the workshop is **Thursday, April 25, 2013** from 6:30-8:30 PM at the Benton Town Hall, Penn Yan. Following the presentation, there will be ample time for questions and answers with a round-table discussion on production practices. The cost of the workshop is \$15 per family/farm. Introduction to Mushroom Growing - April 27...

Mushrooms are a unique crop you can easily grow in your backyard for home consumption or for local markets. The edible and nutritional quality of mushrooms growing under natural shade on logs is remarkable and more sustainable than store-bought



mushrooms often grown indoors in climate-controlled environments. This class will cover the basics of outdoor mushroom growing, including their relationship to healthy forest management. Participants will learn how easy it is to grow shiitake, oyster, lions mane, and stropharia mushrooms at home or on the farm.

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Steuben County will host two Mushroom Growing classes on **Saturday, April 27th. The**

morning session will begin at **9:00 a.m.** and the afternoon session at **1:00 p.m.** The cost of the class is \$30 per participant. Each participant will take home a shiitake inoculated log. Classes will be held in the 4-H Building at the Steuben County Fairgrounds, 15 E Washington St., Bath NY 14810.

2013 Camp Mushroom

The 2013 Camp Mushroom is a unique beginner/intermediate level workshop for those interested in small-scale forest mushroom cultivation. Participants will be trained in two methods of mushroom cultivation (bolt and totem), laying yard considerations, and assist in a research project by inoculating bolts and/or totems. Each participant will also inoculate two shiitake blots to take home.

May 11: Mushroom Field Day at Cornell's Arnot Forest

Sponsored by the NY Forest Owners Association - Southern Finger Lakes Chapter.

Morning session: Shiitake Mushroom Cultivation. 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Learn how to successfully grow Shiitake mushrooms with Dr. Ken Mudge of Cornell University, and take home your own inoculated logs afterwards! There is a \$30 fee for the course to cover materials, and space is limited to 30 people. Please pre-register on-line here by Wednesday May 8. May 18: Peter Levatich's "Hobnob" Forest

A woods walk through Hobnob Forest by Tim Levatich. Started in 1975 by Tim's father the 130 acre forest began in 1975 with road building, timber stand improvement, and firewood production. The property was growing a mixed hardwood forest of pole-sized trees - there were very few saw timber-sized trees at that time. Recreation was an early and constant focus, along with growing prime saw timber and firewood. Management planning, NYDEC service foresters, the American Tree Farm System, boundary line maintenance, regeneration work, repeated pre-commercial thinnings, and extensive road building were all part of its development. The TSI worked. The Forest has seen six sawlog sales and one timber sale, plus many cords of firewood produced. The hilltop site has provided challenges through drought, insect infestation, disease vectors and weather damage. In spite of these events, Peter Levatich got to see his work of over 30 years come to fruition. There are many things to see and topics to discuss! Dress for the weather! How to Clean and Organize Your Refrigerator...

This is part 3 in getting your kitchen more organized. If your refrigerator is organized you will not be wasting your time hunting for items. For example, you are looking for a bottle

of salad dressing. After wasting many minutes looking on every shelf, your search reveals none or you have found three bottles that have been opened and you have no idea for how



long. How many times are you juggling containers to find a place to make something fit in the refrigerator. Or a leftover gets shoved to the back and when opening the container it looks like a "science project". This is a waste of time and money. Throwing food away, is like throwing money in the trash. Save money and time with a more organized refrigerator. [Check out the step by step guide at this website.](#)

But here are a few quick tips to get you started right now:

- *Make sure your refrigerator temperature is 40 degrees F or slightly below and your freezer is 0 degrees F or below. Higher temperatures mean faster food spoilage.
- *Air circulates constantly in a refrigerator and foods dry out quickly. Everything needs to be wrapped in foil, plastic, or put in airtight containers. Moisture and vapor proof materials are best.
- *Perishables like dairy, eggs, and meat should be kept in the coldest part of the refrigerator (not the door). Fresh meat should be in a drawer or in a container on a bottom shelf so juices do not drip on other foods.
- *Identify a spot just for leftovers and label them. Make a plan to use them. If you know you will not use them within four days, freeze them.
- * Wipes up spills when they happen, with hot soapy water to prevent bacteria and odors from developing.

Stephanie's Picks...

Spring Gardening Tips:

1. Clean up flower beds once the snow is gone. Cut old flower stalks. These make great compost.
2. Prune trees and shrubs. Remove any dead or broken limbs from the plant. Prune fruit trees and berries before their buds break. Spring - blooming shrubs should be pruned after they are done flowering.
3. Test your soil for pH as well as nutrients. Make ammendments to your soil according to what is actually needed. This reduces pollution and ensures proper growth of the plants.



Scorekeepers- assist at various ranges to score silhouette targets, archery targets, and clay targets. Would ideally like 5-10

Target scorers- score paper targets from various events. Would ideally like 4-6.

2013 Steuben County Pinwheels and Promises Campaign

It shouldn't hurt to be a child.

April is "Child Abuse Prevention Month".

The Steuben County Task Force for the Prevention of Child Abuse and its members and partners are developing multiple strategies to prevent abuse and promote the positive development of happy and healthy children:

Pinwheels: Bright, beautiful pinwheels will be used as the symbol for the month, as it will be across the nation. We are enlisting local youth organizations that would be willing to make pinwheels to display in their community and to share across the county.

Promises: With each pinwheel, each of us will be encouraged to make a promise - to make a positive difference in the life of a child. By offering to babysit for a neighbor who is stressed, for example, we can each help to prevent abuse.
