





### **AGRICULTURE**

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Rensselaer County delivers educational outreach that connects consumers with local food systems, supports farm viability, and informs public and government stakeholders on best agricultural practices.

Along with our local agriculture educators, the Ag Extension team also encompasses two regional initiatives—the Capital Area Agriculture and Horticulture Program (CAAHP) and the Eastern New York Commercial Horticulture Program (ENYCHP).

Extension educators supported producers through technical assistance and professional development in emerging agricultural practices, which included:

- Greenhouse Management
- Small Ruminant Parasite Control
- Landowner/Tenant Relationships & Agricultural Value Assessment
- Pasture & Poultry Management
- Soil & Erosion Control
- Avian Influenza education

The Harvest Connection platform continued linking consumers directly with local farms, supported by educational communications that encouraged the purchase of local produce.

Farm Day Out event at Engel's Acres in Brunswick welcomed approximately 250 attendees. Participants toured the farm and experienced firsthand the process of food production; gaining a deeper appreciation for the role of local agriculture in their daily lives, which was seen with the increase of locally purchased food.

In partnership with the Hudson River Estuary Program and Capital District Regional Planning Commission (CDRPC), the "Building Resilient Communities" webinar series engaged 74 Capital District residents—representing local governments, nonprofits, and neighborhood groups—to strengthen climate action and conservation. The sessions fostered collaboration and helped communities access resources to boost environmental resilience.

By bridging the gap between farms and communities, CCE promotes sustainable agriculture, strengthens the local economy, and encourages environmentally responsible practices.

### AGRICULTURE PRIMARY PROGRAM AREAS **INCLUDE**

- Market Development, Business Management and Analysis
- Soil Health, Production & Variety
- Pasture & Pest Management
- Pesticide Certification and Recertification

Specialists have built a strong network of fruit and vegetable growers who allow insect traps and field scouting on their farms to monitor pest activity. While no grower wants to rely on fungicides or insecticides, these practices help them make informed decisions and use treatments only when necessary to produce a healthy, marketable crop.



### COMMERCIAL HORTICULTURE

In 2025, a powerful lineup of educational programs that empowered professionals, volunteers, and community members with practical skills and knowledge in horticulture and pest management were delivered.

30-Hour Pesticide Applicator Training- Held over ten days in February, prepared 14 participants to take the NYSDEC certification exams.

Pest Management Update Series- Offered NYSDEC pesticide recertification credits to professionals.

- Woody Plant Pest Update- drew 20 attendees.
- Pests Underground: Basics of Moles and Voles and Basics of Jumping Worms each attracted 24 participants.

### YOUTH OUTREACH

In partnership with the Rensselaer County Legislature and Environmental Management Council, an Arbor Day event was held at Gardner-Dickinson School in Wynantskill. 32 first-grade students planted redbud seedlings and learned about the importance of trees.

Rensselaer Boys & Girls Club youth were guided through hands-on gardening and nature-based projects in a series of classes.

### Consumer Horticulture

### Spring Garden Day

A full-day celebration with educational workshops based on gardening, keynote speakers and vendors attracted 190 attendees.

• Fundraising efforts during the event raised nearly \$1,800, providing vital support for Master Gardener activities throughout the year.

#### EARTH DAY & ARBOR DAY REDBUD GIVEAWAY

33 Redbud seedlings were distributed to the community. Participants also learned about CCE and signed up for the e-newsletter.

### SUMMER EVENINGS IN THE GARDEN SPARK LEARNING AND COMMUNITY

This summer, the Demonstration Garden at the Robert C. Parker School in North Greenbush came alive with an average of 30 attendees over 6 sessions with a slate of engaging, evening programs designed to educate and inspire the public.

### LUNCH IN THE GARDEN SERIES

Lunch In the Garden Series- Zoom-based series brought gardening education to lunchtime screens, engaging a total of 190 viewers. Topics included: Jumping Worms, Earth Friendlier Lawns, Backyard Medicine: Eat Your Lawn, Contain Your Garden and The Benefits of Trees.

### Capital Region Flower and Garden Expo

Master Gardeners staffed an ecological gardening booth and created a stunning garden display featured on the front page of the Troy Record. Presentations included: "Earth Friendlier Lawns" yielding 30 attendees with additional talks by Master Gardeners.





### Master Gardeners Respond to Seasonal Pests and New Invasives with Expertise and Care

From peach leaf curl to apple scab, magnolia scale, and brown patch disease in lawns; the team addressed a wide range of concerns. Other notable issues included:

- Rudbeckia triozid
- Apple-cedar rust
- Verticillium wilt
- Septoria and early blight on tomatoes
- Powdery mildew
- Japanese and Oriental beetles
- Bee and wasp identification
- Invasive Oriental bittersweet and Japanese knotweed



### Answering questions and celebrating pollinators!

Master Gardeners staffed the "Garden Q&A" booth all six days of the Schaghticoke Fair. Surrounded by a vibrant container plant display, they welcomed visitors and offered a native bee quiz that drew 228 entries from curious fairgoers.

### **4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT**

### Empowering Youth Across Rensselaer County

During the 2024–2025 4-H year, Rensselaer County 4-H engaged 6,248 youth across both our rural and urban communities. Rooted in the principles of Positive Youth Development, the program empowers young people to shape their own experiences through leadership roles and community-based projects. With the support of 95 trained volunteers, 4-H continues to foster confidence, leadership, and a strong sense of belonging among the next generation of changemakers.



AGRICULTURE & FOOD SYSTEMS EDUCATION

From 4-H Ag Days, which brought 120 youth to a working farm, to Agricultural Literacy Week, reaching 676 youth across eight schools, participants learned where their food and fiber came from while connecting classroom lessons to real-world agriculture.

 More than 3,000 youth participated in agriculture-related projects, ranging from animal science and embryology to plant science and food systems.



### HEALTHY LIVING & CULINARY ARTS

The Junior Chefs Contest at the 2025 Schaghticoke Fair engaged 31 youth in a creative, hands-on cook-off featuring local New York ingredients.

- Participants developed skills in nutrition, kitchen safety, and food science while exploring career paths in culinary arts.
- A total of 210 youth (outside of SNAP ED and EFNEP) participated in food and nutrition programs this past year.



### STEM & Environmental Education

Youth explored science, technology, engineering, and math through hands-on programs.

• 550 youth engaged in engineering and technology programs through afterschool and school enrichment efforts, reaching youth that would not otherwise be involved in 4-H.

Tractor Safety Program, equipped youth ages 14 and older with essential skills for safe agricultural work. All youth received a national recognized certificate that enables youth ages 14–15 to legally operate tractors and machinery off the family farm—an important step toward employment in agriculture.



LEADERSHIP & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT

Through teen ambassadors, teen exchange, public presentations, community service projects, and educational trips; youth gained experience in decision-making, teamwork, and civic responsibility.

4-H youth are "Beyond Ready"—prepared to thrive after graduation and contribute meaningfully to their communities and careers.



OUTDOOR & SHOOTING SPORTS EDUCATION

Over 1,600 youth participated in environmental education programs through our partnership with Dyken Pond Environmental Education Center.

The 4-H Shooting Sports Program continued to grow, offering safe, structured, instruction in archery and outdoor education. This year, 19 youth participated in shooting sports designed to build focus, leadership, and communication skills under the guidance of certified instructors.



EMPOWERING COMMUNITIES THROUGH NUTRITION AND HEALTHY LIVING

Cornell Cooperative Extension's Building Healthy Habits (BHH)—formerly EFNEP—has served New York State communities for over 55 years. The program focuses on empowering limited-resource families through hands-on, interactive workshops.

- Participants learned to make healthier food choices, stretch grocery dollars, practice food safety, increase physical activity, and reduce screen time
- Partnering with Head Start and local organizations, the program documented positive outcomes for 1,200 Rensselaer County residents

Capital Region SNAP-Ed Nutrition Education Program emphasizes balanced diets, reduced sugary beverages, and increased physical activity.

• 186 lessons were carried out to 862 elementary students in schools where over 90% qualified for free or reduced-price lunch

The Healthy Living Program promoted nutritious eating among our residents and strengthened community connections.

- Distributed over 800 newsletters monthly to senior centers and hosted more than 20 group food demonstrations averaging 15 participants per class through a partnership with the Department of Aging
- Quarterly Farm to Fork webinars continued to highlight local, sustainable foods
- Held food preservation workshops to expand opportunities for participants to develop advanced food preservation skills

### **DIGITAL LITERACY**

## 18 SENIOR PLANET GRADUATES

## 168 PARTICIPANTS SERVED

## 115 LEARNING SESSIONS HELD ACROSS 15 LOCATIONS



BYOD Tech Help Sessions offered support at libraries and community centers. Participants received help using their smartphones, laptops, and tablets, addressing common challenges such as smartphone navigation, email management, and password assistance.

### DEVICES SUPPORTED

- 50% Android smartphones
- 29% iPhones
- 17% laptops
- 8% tablets | 4% iPads | 8% other devices

### PARTICIPANT SKILL GROWTH

- Before program: 9% no experience, 26% basic skills
- After program: 92% learned something new, 54% felt more confident
- 50% found better ways to complete tasks
- 21% now know where to continue learning on their own

### SENIOR PLANET

- Offered free lectures, workshops, and multi-week classes
- Helped participants build tech skills and strengthen community connections
- 18 graduates completed courses such as Computer Essentials and Tech Resources for Everyday Life

Together, these programs help residents build digital skills, confidence, and independence in everyday life and close the digital gap in the community.
