DAIRY IN THE CLASSROOM

Dairy in the Classroom brings high quality, hands-on, and tasty dairy lessons to students directly in their classrooms! Lessons are formulated based on classroom grade level and needs. Students learn about why milk is healthy and identify the multitude of dairy products available. Students have the opportunity to taste (and make) these products to help expand their knowledge. Students also learn about the lifecycle of cows, what they eat and need at each stage, how to milk a cow and how milk moves from the cow to the carton.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- In 2025, Dairy in the Classroom expanded to reach grades 6-12 in Malone CSD, Brushton-Moria CSD, Saranac Lake CSD, Salmon River CSD, St. Regis Falls CSD and added two new schools: Chateaugay CSD and Tupper Lake CSD.
- Students participated in cheese taste tests. During the student's lunch period they could try different types of cheese and vote on their favorite - with 533 students participating.
- Butter making workshops were held at all Malone K-5th grades and Salmon River 2nd grades from April-June reaching a total of 847 students.
- Students from Brushton-Moira visited PAPAS Dairy Farm, toured the farm, and made mozzarella cheese on site.

Students from across Franklin County learned about milk and milk substitutes, tried different samples, and compared taste and nutrient content.

FARM TO SCHOOL

In 2025, the Franklin County Farm to School program continued to strengthen connections across the cafeteria, classroom, and community, expanding access to fresh, local foods for students across participating districts. In addition to ongoing programming in Brushton-Moira (BM), St. Regis Falls (SRF), and Salmon River (SR), CCE Franklin brought on Tupper Lake CSD and Saranac Lake CSD in varying capacities.

ANOTHER SUCCESSFUL YEAR

Cafeteria initiatives saw significant growth this year. Brigaid-led cafeteria trainings were held with Salmon River and Brushton-Moira, focusing on scratch cooking, knife skills, and strategies to increase local procurement. A new collaboration with the Paul Smith's College Culinary Program provided an additional training for BM and SR cafeteria teams centered on squash preparation and recipes from the new New York State Farm to School Cookbook. Monthly taste tests took place across all districts, featuring seasonal New York-grown products. All schools continued to make progress toward the NYS 30% Initiative, with Brushton-Moira officially qualifying in August 2025.

The classroom component expanded significantly due to additional funding, allowing CCE educators to deliver more Harvest of the Month-aligned, hands-on lessons in grades K-12. Funding also supported agriculture-focused field trips, including two visits for Salmon River middle and high school agriculture students to Prairie's Orchard, and a third-grade trip from Brushton-Moira to the same location. These experiences strengthened students' connections to local farms and helped integrate food systems learning into curriculum.

Taste tests across the districts continue to be a hit with a Harvest of the Month calendar that introduced students to seasonal, locally sourced foods.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Community engagement remained a core pillar of the program. Partnerships with local producers continued, and CCE educators supported a variety of district events designed to engage families with the initiative. Highlights included the Saranac Lake Saturday Academy and Family Farmers Market, Brushton–Moira Back to School Night, St. Regis Falls Book Fair Night, and the Salmon River Fall Fest. Together, these efforts fostered a stronger, more connected local food system and set the stage for continued growth in 2026.

THE FUTURE

Goals for the next phase include:

- Further increasing NYS product procurement and from scratch cooking
- Deepening agricultural literacy through standards-based lessons, hands-on activities, and school garden projects.
- Enhancing cafeteria operations with additional training and equipment

The overarching goals remain clear: to foster enduring relationships between schools and local producers, ensuring a sustainable and meaningful impact on education, agriculture, and community health in Franklin County.

HORTICULTURE

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Franklin County is the resource for information on soils, site improvement, plant selection, proper plant care, eco-friendly practices, integrated pest management, composting and so much more!

TUPPER LAKE COMMUNITY GARDEN

For the second year in a row CCE Franklin supported the Tupper Lake Community Garden. The Tupper Teens met with the CCE Educator at the TL library multiple times in the spring to plan out the garden and start seeds. The garden was planted in June and the Tupper Teens, TL library staff, community members, and AmeriCorps volunteers helped maintain the garden throughout the year. Library staff distributed garden produce to the community at the library. Amount of vegetables harvested and community participation increased from last year. The project will continue in 2026.



SEED TO SUPPER PROGRAM

The Seed to Supper program teaches new gardeners how to grow their own food on a budget. Gardeners learn how to prepare their own garden space, start plants from seeds, and take care of their growing garden. Classes are free and gardeners are supplied with a gardening manual, seed starting supplies, and garden tools to use at home in their own garden.

This year the Seed to Supper program operated for the second year at JCEO in Malone and added a second location at the Tupper Lake Library. At both locations we did a collaboration with the SNAP-Ed program – a Quick Pickle lesson with radishes and green beans.

HORTICULTURE



JCEO GREENHOUSES

Building on the success of the last two seasons, additional outdoor growing space was utilized to increase the success of the JCEO spaces.

The JCEO greenhouses and outdoor growing space produced over 2,200lbs of vegetables from June – October

AGRICULTURE

Agriculture continues to be a major focus of CCE Franklin. We continue to expand our staff, programming, workshops, and impact. The following are just some highlights of activities during 2025.

CCE Franklin held a bee keeping workshop attended by many beekeepers across Franklin County. A speaker from Switzerland presented at the workshop.



A FAMACHA training was held in April. This workshop demonstrated a selective treatment method for controlling the level of parasitic barber's pole worm (*Haemonchus contortus*, also known as twisted wireworm).



CCE Franklin Ag Team collaborated to hold a grain bin rescue training for first responders and farmers.

Progressive Ag Safety Day was held at Brushton Moira Central School. Students learned about how to be safe while visiting a farm and interacting with livestock.

CCE Franklin Ag Team hosted numerous community events



4-H AFTER SCHOOL

4-H After School programs foster a unique combination of fun and learning that helps youth develop lifelong skills, such as leadership, critical thinking, and teamwork. The programs address a growing need for quality after-school programming in the U.S., where as many as 15 million children go home to empty houses after school. Research shows that youth that are at a high risk can greatly benefit from 4-H programming and after school enrichment.

SUCCESS AND UPDATES

Cornell Cooperative Extension's After-School Enrichment Experience for 2024-2025 had a lot of success for both the Chateaugay and Brushton-Moira Central School Districts. The newly adopted software system, Ezchildtrack in 2024 continues to be useful for parents and directors of the program to keep track of attendance, payments, and important child information relating to allergies, individuals allowed to pick up and emergency contact information. The program introduced for the first time in 2024-2025 being open during many school closures and breaks as well as offering a 6-week summer program for students enrolled in the district. The additional days of operation proved to be helpful for the families struggling to find childcare when school is not in session.



INCREASED ENROLLMENT

The 2024-2025 program year's daily attendance was 38 children per day compared to the previous year of 29 children in attendance per day. The after-school program had approximately 90 students in each school district that attended the program at least one time throughout the 2024-2025 year and out of those 90 students 68 students attended for 30 or more days.

In September 2025, CCE of Franklin began year 2 of the New York State Learning and Enrichment After-School Program Supports Grant (LEAPS) through the Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS). The success of the program in 2024-2025 allowed our program capacity to increase from 44 children to 55 children in attendance at one time. Our program continues to allow for lower registration fees, more program supplies for enrichment activities, guest speakers, and field trips.

SUPPLIES FOR ENRICHMENT

The NYS LEAPS grant allowed for an abundance of supplies to be purchased to fulfill the enrichment activities for the students enrolled. A variety of guest speakers visited the program and local field trips were offered that further built upon the 4-H Positive Youth Development Model.

REBRANDING

For the 2024-2025 school year, Bulldog/ Panther Hour was rebranded to “Cornell Cooperative Extension Enrichment Experience” and launched. Both programs have seen a significant increase in attendance since the beginning of the 2024-2025 year with total average daily attendance of 67 students.

4-H is a leader in the research and practice of positive youth development and the largest youth organization in the world. 4-H empowers youth to reach their full potential by working with and learning skills from trained, caring adult mentors and educators. The phrase “Learn by Doing” is the educational philosophy of the 4-H program. Franklin County 4-H currently has 14 established clubs.

SNAP-ED

The Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, new in 2025, provides nutrition, food safety and preparation skills, and obesity prevention education to low-income populations of individuals and families that are SNAP eligible. Seek out and develop new networks and partners for nutrition, education delivery, and community initiatives. This program fills the need of educating our community about health, cooking on a budget, food safety, and overall nutrition to combat the obesity epidemic, food insecurity, and food access barriers.

4-H CAMP OVERLOOK

4-H Camp Overlook is a traditional, six-day, five-night residential camp located on Indian and Mountain View Lakes in the beautiful Adirondack Mountains. The camp, owned and operated by Cornell Cooperative Extension of Franklin and St. Lawrence Counties since 1945, is open to youth ages 6-17. 4-H Camp Overlook also offers Cloverbud and Cloverleaf programs for new campers between the ages of 6 and 11. Year-round, Camp Overlook also offers team building, leadership training and ropes course facilitation for group field trips and overnight stays.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHT

MAAP BACKPACKING PROGRAM (MOUNTAINEERS, ALPINE ADVENTURERS AND PATHFINDERS)

The MAAP program at 4-H Camp Overlook is a progressive experience geared towards introducing campers to safe and enjoyable backpacking in the Adirondacks. Divided into 3 age-appropriate levels, campers begin their learning on-site as **Pathfinders** with interactive lessons about planning, packing, leave no trace principles, maps & navigation and outdoor cooking with practice hikes and an overnight campout at camp.

The next step on the journey is for **Alpine Adventurers** to stretch their legs during a three-day, two-night Adirondack trip where they plan their journey during their first days at camp and then head out on the trail for three to six miles per day. Campers focus on managing their pack, pace, and supporting each other.

The final step in the MAAP program experience is left to the **Mountaineers** who brave the Adirondacks high peaks for a full five days and four nights before they head back to camp to celebrate their success with a hot shower and a journey down the zipline.

In 2025, 88 campers participated in a MAAP program including 69 Pathfinders, 10 Alpine Adventurers and 9 Mountaineers. Program equipment, including backpacking packs, tents, lightweight cook kits, and water purification filters, is a key future need for this program to enable its continuance and growth.

NYS BOOST Grant

The NYS Building Opportunities in Out-of-School Time (BOOST) grant is a collaborative with Chateaugay Central School District and will provide students in grades 7-12 with high quality afterschool, school vacation, and summer programs to achieve improved academic outcomes, career and vocational opportunities and aspirations, internships, SEL skills for improved communication and restorative practices and strong youth and family activities to build connections between home, school and the community. The program will utilize PYD activities that allow students and families to have input in program decision making, preventing social isolation, and creating authentic youth leadership opportunities.

2025 ECONOMIC IMPACT

WHY IS CORNELL COOPERATIVE EXTENSION A COST EFFICIENT ORGANIZATION?

- Our program educators and team leaders work directly with over 12,000 residents each year (adults and youth).
- All of our programs are free or low cost.
- Through workshops, fairs, news outlets, media and publications (print and electronic), CCE educates over 350,000 people that live, work, and spend their money in Franklin County.
- Our employee benefits are paid by Cornell University totaling over \$388,000.
- Cornell provides many services including payroll and personnel administration, web-based staff development, and other program support.
- Cornell's educational programs are NY State certified and are not duplicated by other agencies.
- We partner with local agencies to provide programs, examples include NYS Office of the Aging, United Way of the Adirondacks, Paul Smith's VIC, and Malone YMCA.
- Extension's curriculum is Cornell University and other Land Grant University research based.


