# Agriculture and Horticulture



## Ag Navigator

The Year in Review

Cornell Cooperative Extension - Dutchess County

This summary highlights the significant contributions of the Ag/Hort Sustainability and Ag Navigator programs in community engagement, farmland protection, invasive species management, and producer education.

### Ag/Hort Sustainability and Ag Navigator

- **Spotted Lantern Fly K9 Detection:** Facilitated training; demonstration for Hudson Valley Grape Industry with Cornell Communications.
- **Eastern NY Commercial Horticulture Program:** Ongoing collaboration and info-sharing with county partners.
- **Ag Value Assessment & Ag District Inclusion:** Main point of contact; review of applications completed.
- **Lower Hudson Valley PRISM Grant:** Approved for \$16,200

- **Legislative & Municipal Work:** Staff met with East Fishkill on agriculture planning, assessors on town code violations, and Legislator Drago on farmland protection.
- **Pasture Recommendations:** Guidance for seeding, fertilizing, and horse carbohydrate management.
- **Public Outreach:** Weekly radio spots, daily social media updates, and participation in DC Tourism's rebranding session.
- **Recognition:** Dutchess County Legislature recognized retiring Jen Fimbel with a commendation for her years of service to the county.

### Sustainability

- **Grant Implementation:** Planning Lower Hudson Valley PRISM project.
- **Training & Education:** Led ISA Training (76 total attendees), completing Food Systems course.
- **Community Programs:** Seed to Supper and Master Food Preserver planning.
- **Greenhouse & Lab Work:** Managing greenhouse, providing weed ID.

### Youth & Community Engagement

- **Youth in Ag:** Monthly John Jay FFA meetings; Pawling added an Ag program.
- **Municipal Engagement:** Advised three municipal officials on ag-related zoning and permits.
- **Farm & Ag Report:** Broadcast 5 days/week (18,000 weekly reach).
- **Farm to School:** Coordinated school lunch manager and farmer meet-up.
- **Public Tours & Talks:** Planned farm tour for Sen. Gillibrand's staff, presented at Pleasant Valley Library.



The **Master Gardener Annual Fundraiser** saw great success this year, thanks to the collective efforts of friends, family, volunteers, staff, and board members.

In the fall of 2024, **19 new volunteers** successfully completed Master Gardener training, contributing to the program's expansion.

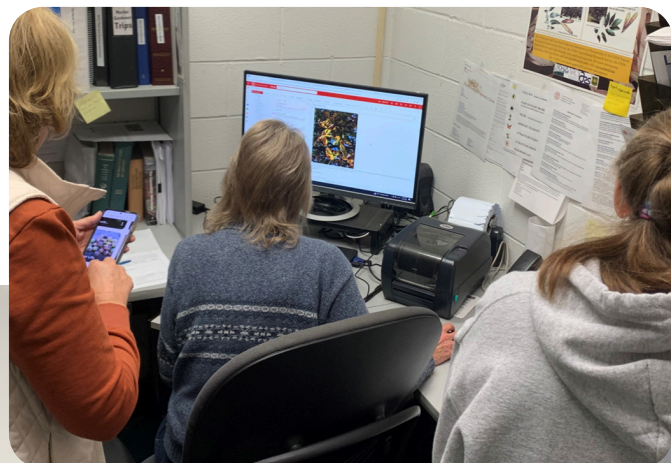
Meanwhile, the **Dutchess Dirt Newsletter** continues to reach over **2,200 subscribers each month!**

A major achievement this year was securing the **Lower Hudson PRISM grant**, which enabled training for Dutchess County Parks staff on *invasive species management*. The program includes **iMapInvasives** reporting training and the development of educational materials, such as a Spotted Lanternfly brochure and a QR-coded business card linking to online resources.

Our **Speakers Bureau** engaged over **275 community members** through educational presentations.

Additionally, our **Seed Library pilot program** launched in six Mid-Hudson Library System branches, *connecting over 130 individuals with resources on gardening and seed-saving.*

Our **Horticulture Hotline** addressed **more than 440 inquiries** in 2024, underscoring the program's dedication to providing expert horticultural support.

# Impact SPOTLIGHT

**Dedicated Master Gardener volunteers** have played a key role in revitalizing the program's **Diagnostic Lab**, home to the Horticulture Hotline. The long-awaited makeover has maximized the lab's limited space, improving efficiency for both volunteers and staff.

**Enhancements include:** new shelves, a lab table, and a wall-mounted computer monitor to better display microscope specimens. The removal of bulky file cabinets has further transformed the workspace, allowing volunteers to provide even more effective support to the community. This upgrade reflects the ongoing commitment of Master Gardener volunteers to delivering expert horticultural guidance and resources.

# Family and Consumer Education



The **Family and Consumer Education (FCE)** Program is dedicated to supporting Dutchess County families by providing engaging, empowering, and educational programs. As communities navigate challenges in wellness, finances, education, and parenting, FCE remains committed to delivering relevant resources and adaptable programming that meet the evolving needs of local households.



## Community Engagement Strengthens Family and Parenting Programs in Dutchess County:

The power of community involvement was on full display in 2024 as local programs helped parents and families build stronger connections. The **Parent And Support Education (PASE)** program, which focuses on improving family communication, celebrated the graduation of **64** parents who completed its classes this year. Similarly, Our **Parenting Skills Workshop Series (PSWS)**, part of the Department and Community and Family Services (DCFS) efforts to reunite families in crisis, graduated **80** parents through **102** sessions, equipping them with valuable parenting skills.

Community outreach was also a priority. The **Hudson River Fish Advisory** program hosted **21 education events**, reaching **1,300 individuals** with vital information about safe fish consumption.

## Impact SPOTLIGHT

This year we held the **Relatives as Parents Program Roundtable Event**. Key figures from our local and statewide agencies, involved with kinship families, discussed what CCEDC does for kinship families, what resources we can provide by partnering with these agencies and how we can work together to support **Dutchess County Kinship families**. In attendance were representatives from **Kinship Navigator, The Dutchess County Department of Community and Family Services, The NYS Unified Court System ~ Office for Justice Initiatives Division of Child Welfare and Family Justice, The Dutchess County Office for the Aging, ASTOR services and the New York State Caregiver and Respite Coalition**. This successful event provided very robust conversations that allowed us all to know more about how we can work together to help kinship families.



Meanwhile, **RAPP, (Relatives As Parents Program)** which provides essential support for kinship families, fostered connections through monthly peer support groups and special events, including an apple-picking outing at Dubois Farm, a holiday party, and a summer picnic.

This year, RAPP served 25 adults and youth.

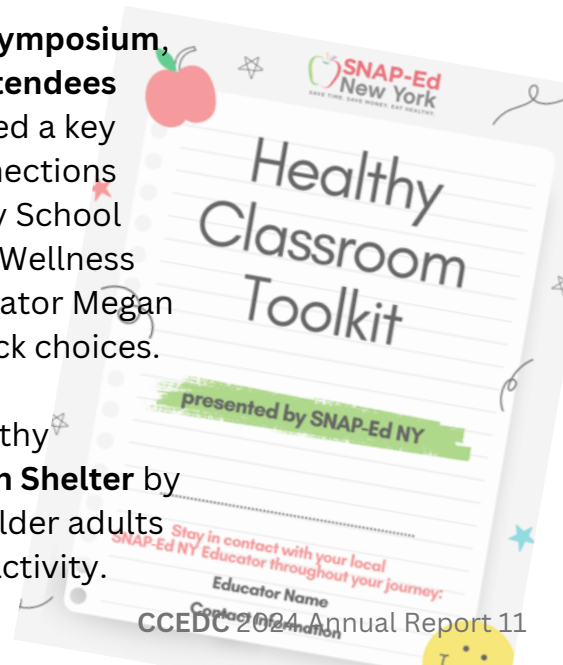

To further strengthen these initiatives, two internal staff members joined the FCE department as parenting educators. Their expertise will enhance the department’s reach, which already connects with over **1,040 community members monthly** through the FCE newsletter.

These programs demonstrate the ongoing commitment of Dutchess County residents, volunteers, and staff to fostering stronger, more resilient families through education and support.

The **SNAP-Ed NY 4th Annual School Wellness Virtual Summer Symposium**, held August 6-8 via Zoom, was a great success, with over **110 attendees** and strong engagement. The SNAP-Ed Hudson Valley team played a key role in organizing and promoting the event, which fostered connections among educators and wellness champions. In Poughkeepsie City School District, SNAP-Ed continued its collaboration by facilitating the Wellness Committee and supporting policy updates, while Nutrition Educator Megan taught in over **30 classrooms**, influencing students' healthy snack choices.

Additionally, **nine Poughkeepsie classrooms** pledged to be Healthy Classrooms in 2024. SNAP-Ed also supported **River Haven Youth Shelter** by guiding teens toward healthier snack choices and worked with older adults at Lakeview Arms Senior Apartments on nutrition and physical activity.



# 4-H Positive Youth Development



CCEDC Youth and Workforce Development programs focus on Positive Youth Development, equipping participants with the skills, values, and confidence to make good choices, reduce risks, and achieve success.

## Dutchess County 4-H Cultivates Youth Leadership and Skills:

Our **4-H Club** Program engaged **380 youth across 24 clubs**, fostering skills in agriculture, animal science, cooking, and more. Members completed **280 public presentations**, gained financial literacy, and **dedicated thousands of hours to community service**.

A new **Youth Livestock Sale Representative Initiative** connected farming with meat processing and culinary arts, partnering with Kron's Custom Cuts and four local restaurants.

Fundraising efforts, including the **A-Fair to Remember Gala**, raised \$23,000 to support 4-H'ers at the Dutchess County Fair, where 259 exhibitors showcased their work.

At the Big E, Dutchess 4-H earned top honors in livestock competitions, and **Ag Literacy Week** educated **2,800 youth** about strawberries. Through hands-on learning, 4-H continues to empower future leaders.

## Flourishing Farmers Expands Opportunities for Youth in Agriculture

The **Flourishing Farmers** program served **23** youth this year, with two new farm partners, **Harlem Valley Homestead** and **Hope Rising Farm**, bringing the total to five.

**Fifteen participants (65%) showcased their work at the Dutchess County Fair, and two Stony Kill group exhibits were selected for the NYS State Fair, competing against 4-H exhibits statewide.**

Youth gained hands-on experience working with livestock, growing vegetables, and developing essential animal care skills.

As **program leader Greta Bleimeister** noted, *“There is very little opportunity for these youth to build connections with animals, and it really makes a difference.”*



**After School & Summer Programs: Empowering Youth Through Hands-On Learning** *This project has been supported by a grant from Literacy in Action 1, a fund of Berkshire Taconic Community Foundation.*

The after-school program served **65 unduplicated youth (25% of Wingdale Elementary’s population)**, with a focus on immigrant students. Lessons were offered in English and Spanish, covering literacy, financial literacy, math, science, and agriculture. Popular activities included vermicomposting, making butter, and interacting with chickens and rabbits.

Summer programming **engaged 23 youth**, emphasizing civics, financial literacy, and American culture. Participants explored saving and spending, met New York’s Lt. Governor, and recreated works of great American artists.

This year, the program expanded to Dover Elementary, where students are midway through an intensive dairy-focused curriculum, continuing the tradition of hands-on, impactful learning.



Our **Ag in the Classroom (AITC)** program takes place in March each year; Ag Literacy Week saw 4-H staff work with schools and community groups to provide over **2200 1-3rd grade children** with agricultural education.



## Green Teen Beacon: 20 Years of Empowering Youth and Strengthening Community

In 2024, **Green Teen Beacon celebrated 20 years of empowering youth and strengthening the community.** The program served 29 youth through employment, with nine promoted to Crew Leaders, and nine more through its Club program. **Over \$50,000 was paid in youth wages.** Green Teen **harvested and distributed 1,400 pounds of vegetables,** serving 33 families weekly via their Free Farm stand and delivering to 11 senior homes. **The “Feeding Seniors” initiative expanded to include weekly vegetable deliveries to 10 seniors.**

Club Green Teen’s winter season featured field trips to local institutions, while fundraisers—like garlic and hoodie sales—raised \$1,000. **The program was honored at Renegades HOPE Week, with a participant throwing the opening pitch.**

Youth described Green Teen as a **“family” and a “place of guidance,”** highlighting its role in building skills and community.

**Plans for a 20th-anniversary celebration are underway.**

# Impact SPOTLIGHT

**Climate Smart Community Assessments** were completed in three Dutchess municipalities:

- Town of Clinton
- Town of Red Hook
- Town of Washington

**6 NCLI Educators** were employed by the program through the end of June.

**52 youth** were educated by our NCLI educators across the 3 spring outreach events they participated in.

- **Dutchess County Earth Day at Vassar Barns:** youth shared a display highlighting the research they had done on the potential for composting programs in the City of Poughkeepsie and led youth in a water cycle game.
- **Eel Program at Walkway Over the Hudson:** Youth educators assisted DEC staff in educating the public on migrating glass eels and eel habitat in Hudson River tributaries.
- **NYSDEC Get Outdoors Day:** Youth assisted DEC educators with fishing instruction, seine netting and educational games. *(New York State Department of Environmental Conservation)*
- Youth participated in the Ulster BOCES **Sustainability Summit** where they presented to peers on the composting research.
- Participated in eel monitoring on the Fall Kill throughout the spring, culminating in the annual **"Eleboration"** held in June.

# Taste NY at Todd Hill



A function of the Ag-Hort program area; to support agriculture, horticulture, and agritourism in Dutchess County and throughout the state.

In 2024, Todd Hill saw significant growth in marketing, outreach, and sales. A **strategic marketing plan**, including **pop-up events** at high-traffic locations like John Jay High School's FFA Fundraiser and the Arlington Street Fair, contributed to increased visibility and revenue. **Partnerships with the Hudson Valley Renegades helped distribute nearly 1,000 promotional prizes, resulting in new customer visits.** The introduction of a weekend outdoor market (THOM) replaced the previous farmers' market model, generating vendor satisfaction and approximately \$26,000 in sales. **Sales increased by 12% over 2023, supported by the addition of 12 new vendors and 50+ new products.**

Staffing and education initiatives also played a key role in Todd Hill's success. The dedicated team, including **members with up to 10 years of service**, provided continuity and expertise. Digital-based staff training and monthly blog content enhanced knowledge of new products and vendor stories. **Community engagement remained strong** through partnerships with Dutchess County Tourism and Ulster BOCES, connecting students with food and farm employers. **Statewide Taste NY promotions further reinforced support for local farms and businesses, contributing to a successful year of growth and outreach.**

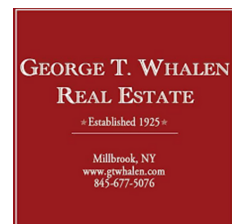
# Event Donor & Supporters
