Outline of Acts

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Acts 1

12 Then the apostles returned to Jerusalem from the Mount of Olives, a distance of half a mile.

13 When they arrived, they went to the upstairs room of the nouse where they were staying.

Here are the names of those who were present: Peter, John, James, Andrew, Philip, Thomas, Bartholomew, Matthew, James (son of Alphaeus), Simon (the Zealot), and Judas (son of James). 14 They all met together and were constantly united in prayer, along with Mary the mother of Jesus, several other women, and the brothers of Jesus.

15 During this time, when about 120 believers were together in one place, Peter stood up and addressed them. 16 "Brothers," he said, "the Scriptures had to be fulfilled concerning Judas, who guided those who arrested Jesus. This was predicted long ago by the Holy Spirit, speaking through King David. 17 Judas was one of us and shared in the ministry with us."

18 (Judas had bought a field with the money he received for his treachery. Falling headfirst there, his body split open, spilling out all his intestines. 19 The news of his death spread to all the people of Jerusalem, and they gave the place the Aramaic name Akeldama, which means "Field of Blood.")

20 Peter continued, "This was written in the book of Psalms, where it says, 'Let his home become desolate, with no one living in it.' It also says, 'Let someone else take his position.'

21 "So now we must choose a replacement for Judas from among the men who were with us the entire time we were traveling with the Lord Jesus—22 from the time he was baptized by John until the day he was taken from us. Whoever is chosen will join us as a witness of Jesus' resurrection."

23 So they nominated two men: Joseph called Barsabbas (also known as Justus) and Matthias.

24 Then they all prayed, "O Lord, you know every heart. Show us which of these men you have chosen 25 as an apostle to replace

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Judas in this ministry, for he has deserted us and gone where he belongs." 26 Then they cast lots, and Matthias was selected to become an apostle with the other eleven.

Acts 2

1 On the day of Pentecost[all the believers were meeting together in one place. 2 Suddenly, there was a sound from heaven like the roaring of a mighty windstorm, and it filled the house where they were sitting. 3 Then, what looked like flames or tongues of fire appeared and settled on each of them. 4 And everyone present was filled with the Holy Spirit and began speaking in other languages, as the Holy Spirit gave them this

5 At that time there were devout Jews from every nation living in Jerusalem. 6 When they heard the loud noise, everyone came running, and they were bewildered to hear their own languages being spoken by the believers.

7 They were completely amazed. "How can this be?" they exclaimed. "These people are all from Galilee, 8 and yet we hear them speaking in our own native languages! 9 Here we are—Parthians, Medes, Elamites, people from Mesopotamia, Judea, Cappadocia, Pontus, the province of Asia,

10 Phrygia, Pamphylia, Egypt, and the areas of Libya around Cyrene, visitors from Rome 11 (both Jews and converts to Judaism), Cretans, and Arabs. And we all hear these people speaking in our own languages about the wonderful things God has done!" 12 They stood there amazed and perplexed. "What can this mean?" they asked each other. 13 But others in the crowd ridiculed them, saying, "They're just drunk, that's all!" 14 Then Peter stepped forward with the eleven other apostles and shouted to the crowd, "Listen carefully, all of you, fellow Jews and residents of Jerusalem! Make no mistake about this. 15 These people are not drunk, as some of you are assuming. Nine o'clock in the morning is much too early for that. 16 No, what you see was predicted long ago by the prophet Joel:

17 In the last days,' God says,
I will pour out my Spirit upon all people.
Your sons and daughters will prophesy.

- even on my servants—men and women alike— 18 In those days I will pour out my Spirit and they will prophesy.

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Subject: Re: Brians' Brief - Act 2:36-38

Brothers:

Arguably the theme of Romans is "**the gospel**", that is, the "**good news**" of Christianity. But before starting the Romans study that I promised, I thought it my be helpful to go back and look at the first time the "gospel" was preached – by the apostle Peter on the day of Pentecost.

A LITTLE BACKGROUND - THE DAY OF PENTECOST

It was an extraordinary day! It was only 50 days since the resurrection of Jesus and only 10 days since His ascension into heaven. It was a special Jewish festival day, called the Day of Pentecost. The Jewish pilgrims who had come to Jerusalem from all over the ancient world to celebrate Passover and Pentecost were still crowded in the city. The 120 faithful followers of Jesus were gathered in an upper room in the city.

And, then if happened! Accompanied by a violent wind and tongues of fire from heaven, the Holy Spirit was "poured out" on the 120 disciples waiting in that upper room, and they were all "filled with the Holy Spirit". This event -- the coming of the Holy Spirit -- was prophesied in the OT (Joel 2:28-30; Ezekiel 36:24-27), it was predicted by Jesus during His earthly ministry (John 14-16), and promised by Jesus 10 days earlier just before His ascension (Acts 1:5,8).

There was pandemonium in the city. These emboldened Spirit-filled disciples were supernaturally empowered to speak to the pilgrims in the own native languages about "the great deeds God had done", no doubt focusing on the death and resurrection of the Messiah Jesus. While they did not appreciate the full significance of that day, they knew that God was doing something huge and significant right before their eyes.

This was it! The day the OT prophets had longed for. This was the inauguration of the "New Covenant" prophesied by Jeremiah and Ezekiel, and promised by Jesus at the last supper. The new covenant "in His blood", the new covenant of the Spirit, which would supercede and do away with the Old Covenant given on Mt. Sinai about 1400 years earlier. The new age of the Spirit, and new age of grace was beginning. This day is also the birthday of the church, The church (to be made up of both Jews and Gentiles), promised by Jesus in Matthew 16:18, was "born" by the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost. What a remarkable day!

PETER'S SERMON - THE GOOD NEWS

In response to the crowd's inquiries and questions, the apostle Peter, the spokesman for the disciples, preaches that great sermon – the first message of the newly inaugurated church age. After explaining the prophetical significance of the death and resurrection of Jesus, and the coming of the Holy Spirit, he brings his sermon to a climax with these words:

"Therefore, let all the house of Israel know beyond a doubt that God has made this Jesus whom you crucified both Lord and Christ" (Acts 2:36)

He was fearless, clear and direct. Jesus is Lord – He is God in the flesh. Jesus is the Messiah promised in the OT. And, you crucified Him! The majority of the crowd listening to Peter had witnessed the events of the previous 8 weeks and many, believing that He was a blasphemer and imposter, had called for His crucifixion.

But, in hearing Peter's words, "they were acutely distressed" (vs.37a). The Greek literally reads "their hearts were pierced". This is clearly the convicting work of the Holy Spirit (prophesied by Jesus in John 14-16), which always precedes genuine conversion. Their next words show the depth of their conviction: "What should we do?", they cried out to Peter and the disciples (vs.37b).

Peter's answer declares clearly and unambiguously the good news (the gospel) of the age of the Spirit, the age of the New Covenant, the church age. Here it is, brothers the gospel in one sentence:

"Repent, and each of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Spirit" (Acts 2:38)

Here are the two principal blessings of the gospel -- 1) forgiveness of sins and 2) the gift of the Holy Spirit.

FORGIVENESS OF SINS

Forgiveness has to do with our **legal standing** before God. God the holy, but gracious, Judge forgives our sins and declares us to be "not guilty" of all the sins we really have committed. As forgiven people we have the legal standing to enter God's holy heaven when we die. No fear of death and the certainty of resurrection bodies and eternal life. Pretty awesome! God is able to forgive our sins because of what Christ did for us on the cross

In Isaiah 1:18 the Lord says, "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow". As many of you know, I was born and raised in sub-tropical Durban, South Africa where we don't even have frost in the winter, let alone snow! At age 20 I came to North America to Prairie Bible Institute in Alberta, Canada – where they have snow for about 6 months of the year! I still remember that first snow. It was in the early fall, probably October. I was on my way to the first class of the morning when the snow started to fall. I spent the whole class looking out the back window at the incredible scene outside. Within an hour everything was covered with this pure white layer of snow. I had never seen anything like it. So white. So clean. So pure. The campus looked so different. The dust, dirt and grime, and the customary wear and tear of the campus were blotted out and coved by this clean white snow. The same campus, but now so different. I immediately thought of Isaiah 1:18. My sins are forever blotted out and covered by the pure righteousness of Christ. When God looks down on me from heaven, He does not see my scarlet sins, which are many and ongoing, but He sees instead the pure white snow of Christ's righteousness, and therefore forgives and accepts me. That's the gospel. It was indeed good news to Peter's audience who had to deal with their sin in crucifying the Messiah. And its good news to us who have plenty of sins of our own.

THE GIFT OF THE SPIRIT

The gift of the Holy Spirit has to do with **relationship and life**. Simultaneously with God's forgiveness of our sins, God the Holy Spirit comes to live within us. The Bible refers to this supernatural phenomenon as being "born again", or receiving "new life", or becoming "new people" with "new natures". The Holy Spirit is our Encourager and Friend -- He is to us what Jesus was to the disciples when He was down here on earth. He is permanently with us -- in the good times and in the bad! He also provides the power and strength to live the kind of life that God wants us to live. And His supernatural presence and blessing is like a "down payment" guaranteeing our future resurrection and eternal life with God.

REPENTANCE

The condition for the enjoyment of these blessing is "repent and each of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ". "Repent" means to change your mind -- here the call was for the hearers (Jews in Jerusalem) to change their mind about who Jesus was. They had believed that he was a blasphemer and imposter. Peter had just explained that the resurrection of Jesus and the coming of the Spirit were proof that Jesus, whom they had just crucified, was really the Messiah, the God-Man who had died on the cross for their sins. Repent is the flip-side to "faith", and is often used

interchangeably with faith. Repent seems to have been used more with Jewish audiences, who needed to change their minds about what they had formerly been taught and believed about the Messiah. Faith was used more often with Gentile audiences, who are urged to trust, depend and rely on Jesus, the God-Man, who died for our sins and rose again from the dead.

BAPTISM

Baptism in this context is not an additional act or ritual necessary for forgiveness and the gift of the Spirit. To this first century Jewish audience (as well as to Peter) the idea of baptism incorporated both the spiritual reality and the physical symbol. In the same vein Billy Graham often says, "trust Christ and come forward". We know that "coming forward" (or walking the aisle) does not impart salvation. The rest of the book of Acts (e.g. Acts 3: 19-20) and the rest of the New Testament (e.g. Eph. 2:8-9) make it clear that God's salvation is a free gift that we receive by faith. Rather, the physical act of coming forward is the way (or one way) of outwardly expressing or evidencing one's inward faith. In the New Testament baptism was the outward expression of an inward faith. But, it was faith that counted not the outward act. Then, as now, it was possible to be a believer without being baptized (or coming forward); and it was, and is, possible to be baptized (or come forward) without being a believer! Forgiveness and the gift of the Spirit cannot be earned by good works or any kind of ritual; these blessings come through the heart attitude of faith in Christ, and Christ alone.

FORGIVENESS - THE HEART OF THE GOOD NEWS

Forgiveness, freedom from judgment, freedom from the treadmill of legalism, and the certainty of eternal life with God in the final resurrection was certainly "good news" back then, and it is "good news" today! Through faith in Jesus Christ, you, my brother, are totally forgiven of all your sins -- past, present and future! Every sin you have committed in the past (and some of us have some biggies), and every sin you will commit in the future (I'm afraid that some of us still have some biggies ahead of us), is included. God the Father accepted Christ's death on the cross as payment in full for all of your sins -- and mine. We are, as the Message translation of Romans 3: 23 puts it, "in the clear with God"! And that is "good news". Believe it, appropriate it, and enjoy the freedom and joy of God's forgiveness.

MORE GOOD NEWS

And that is only half the story! We also receive the gift of the Spirit who gives us new life, and begins the life long process of slowly transforming us to be more like Jesus. But, my time (and probably your attention span) has expired. So, more of the "good news" of God's grace will have to wait for the next brief.
