Immediate Cause

Immediate Cause

- What would it be like if we at Hillview lost our elders for some reason and in a relatively sudden way?
- What would they write to us if they had some time left and weren't coming back for a time?

Hebrews 12:1-2 – "Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of faith."

We are all in the race. It's not a sprint but a marathon. In that race, we need to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus, not on ourselves, our circumstances, our brothers and sisters, or even our ministries but on Him who is the author and perfecter of our faith. In the race, if we don't keep our eyes on Him, it is easy to stray off course!

1 Corinthians 15:58 – "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your toil is not in vain in the Lord." There are times when we may feel disappointed, discouraged, even depressed. But Paul reminds us it is worth it to not only be steadfast but to abound in His work. Anything we do for His Kingdom, out of thanksgiving and gratitude to Him, will not be in vain. As Jim Elliot rightly said, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose."

- Grumbling and disputing is basically an act of pride.
- James 4:6 God is opposed to the proud but gives grace to the humble.

- It is a passive stance against God that creates division.
- Proverbs 6:16, 19 There are . . . things which the LORD hates . . . one who spreads strife among brothers.

Result

• When someone gives something or does something you appreciate, does it matter how you show them gratitude? John 12:43 – They loved the approval of men rather than the approval of God.

Drink Offering

- Paul's drink offering accompanied their main offering of sacrifice and service to God in Jesus.
- This was an act of humility: to put their service as more important than his own.

- Do not grumble or dispute.
