REVELATION 12 WOMAN, DRAGON, CHILD, & MICHAEL

Interpretations compared

REVELATION 12 WHAT IT TELLS US **ABOUT GOD**

Supernatural Protector!

- Woman is protected in the wilderness (vv6, 14)
- Reminiscent of Ezekiel 16:8-10, Hosea 2
- Is your wilderness a bad thing?

He has a Powerful Army!

- However you interpret it, God uses archangel Michael to whup Satan
- There is no sign in the Bible that God is in danger of losing to your enemy.

REVELATION 12 — PRETERIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Woman = faithful Israel (12:1–2)
- Child = Christ, caught up to God (12:5)
- Dragon = Satan acting through Rome (vv3–4)
- War in heaven = Christ's victory at the cross (vv7–9)
- 1,260 days = Jewish persecution during Roman war (v6)

Sources:

- Mostly textual, supported by OT imagery (e.g., Gen 37)
- Historical speculation about the 1st-century Roman siege

- Text supports Israel imagery and birth/ascension pattern
- The 1,260-day application is extrinsic and debated

REVELATION 12 — HISTORICIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Woman = true Church
- Child = Christ or faithful remnant
- Dragon = pagan Rome
- War in heaven = Christianity overcoming paganism (e.g., Constantine)
- 1,260 days = 1,260 years of papal oppression

Sources:

- Partially textual
- Relies on day-year principle from Daniel 7/9

- Symbolism of woman and dragon has textual basis
- Day-year method is not found in Revelation, and is applied from outside

REVELATION 12 — FUTURIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Woman = Israel
- Child = Christ
- Dragon = Satan in end times
- War in heaven = future event during
 Tribulation
- 1,260 days = 3.5 years of Israel's protection

Sources:

- Mix of textual details and Dispensational framework
- Timing drawn from **Daniel 9**, not Revelation

- Symbols and numbers are mentioned in the text
- Future timing is inferred, not directly stated

REVELATION 12 — IDEALIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Woman = God's people across all time
- Child = Christ or Church's faithful witness
- Dragon = Satan throughout history
- War in heaven = spiritual conflict centered at the cross
- 1,260 days = symbolic of Church persecution

Sources:

- Primarily textual, emphasizing repeated patterns
- Theological lens resists fixed chronology

- Strong symbolic basis in the text
- Non-linear reading de-emphasizes the narrative's sequence

REVELATION 12 – CRITICAL THINKING PROMPTS

- Does the text ID the woman?
- Does the text tell us whether it's a literal dragon?
- Does the text ID the dragon? (see v9; 20:2)
- Does the text ID the child? (see 2:27, 19:15; Psalm 2:9)
- Is it bad to say the "1,260 days" (v6) might not be days? (see Numbers 14:34; Ezekiel 4:6)
- Does the text say when the war in heaven is? (vv7–9)
- Who might her offspring represent, per the text? (vv13–17, especially v17)

REVELATION 13 BEASTS, MARKS, NUMBERS

Interpretations compared

REVELATION 13 WHAT IT TELLS US **ABOUT GOD**

God is Fully Authoritative

- He allows evil to have some limited power (vv5, 7)
- Reminiscent of Job's story, and Paul in 1 Co. 5:5
- Is evil ever out of control?

God Calls for Our Endurance and Faith!

- Believers might not be safe from various fates, but will persevere in their faith
- Be ambitious: what will God ask you to persevere through in your

SATAN IS JUST A TOOL FOR YOUR GOOD

1 Corinthians 5:5

Romans 8:28

- "You are to deliver this man to Satan for the destruction of the flesh, so that his spirit may be saved in the day of the Lord."
- 1 Corinthians 5:5 (ESV)

- "And we know that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to *His* purpose."
- Romans 8:28 (NASB)

REVELATION 13 — PRETERIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Sea beast = Imperial Rome, esp. Nero (13:1–2)
- Worship = emperor cult (13:3–4)
- Earth beast = enforcers of imperial religion (13:11–14)
- Mark = economic allegiance to empire (13:16–17)
- 666 = Nero Caesar via Hebrew gematria (13:18)

Sources:

- Mostly textual; beast imagery tied to Daniel 7
- Historical speculation on Nero and Roman cult practices

- Text supports Rome-based reading and symbolic logic
- 666 as Nero is plausible but relies on external gematria

REVELATION 13 — HISTORICIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Sea beast = Papal Rome (13:1–2)
- Earth beast = later state-supported religion (13:11–14)
- Mark = enforced conformity (13:16– 17)
- 666 = symbolic of papal titles or imperfection (13:18)

Sources:

- Some textual support (beast = empire)
- Day-year principle and 666 interpretation drawn from tradition

- Symbolic interpretation fits historical arc
- Year-day timeline and 666 meaning are extrinsic to Revelation

REVELATION 13 — FUTURIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Sea beast = future Antichrist leader (13:1–
 2)
- Earth beast = False Prophet (13:11–14)
- Mark = literal system during Tribulation (13:16–17)
- 666 = identity of future Antichrist (13:18)

Sources:

- Textual imagery + dispensational framework
- Timing and figures drawn from Daniel 9 and 2 Thess 2

- Symbols are named in text; timeline is inferred
- Literal reading depends on external prophetic system

REVELATION 13 — IDEALIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Sea beast = recurring political tyranny
 (13:1–2)
- Earth beast = deceptive ideology or false religion (13:11–14)
- Mark = allegiance to worldly power (13:16–17)
- 666 = false messiah or ultimate imperfection (13:18)

Sources:

- Highly symbolic reading from within Revelation's patterns
- Rejects fixed chronology; sees repetition across history

- Fits recurring themes in Revelation
- Nonlinear view resists a single historical application

REVELATION 13 – THINGS TO THINK ABOUT

- Does the text interpret the sea beast? (13:1–2)
- Does the text say why the world worships the beast? (13:3–4)
- Is the earth beast a second person or a symbol? (13:11–14)
- Does the text define the mark or its function? (13:16–17)
- Is the number 666 interpreted within Revelation? (13:18)

REVELATION 14 144,000, MESSAGES, BABYLON, GRAPES

Interpretations compared

REVELATION 14 WHAT IT TELLS US **ABOUT GOD**

God Sees Your Faithfulness. He's Keeping Track.

- It's like God's people to be visibly identifiable (v1), "blameless" (v5)
- Forehead = public image? 3:12, 7:3, 22:4; priest Aaron (Ex. 28), OT law (Deut. 6)
- You can't have both names on you. In Christ, you are claimed by God.

God's Gospel is Justice, not merely Salvation

• "eternal gospel" (vv 6-7); reminiscent of imprecatory Psalms

REVELATION 14 — PRETERIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- 144,000 = Jewish Christians (14:1–5)
- Angel messages = gospel and judgment before Jerusalem's fall (14:6–11)
- Babylon = Jerusalem or Rome (14:8)
- Harvest/winepress = judgment of Jerusalem (14:14–20)

Sources:

- Some textual grounding, esp. gospel/ harvest symbols
- Historical interpretation of 70 AD

- Interpretation fits first-century context
- Symbolism could extend beyond local events

REVELATION 14 — HISTORICIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- 144,000 = faithful throughout church history (14:1–5)
- Angel messages = Reformation and later revivals (14:6–11)
- Babylon = corrupt Church/papacy (14:8)
- Harvest = judgment over centuries (14:14–20)

Sources:

- Mixed textual/symbolic interpretation
- Timeline and papal associations drawn from tradition

- Consistent with long-view history model
- Babylon = Church reading not textually explicit

REVELATION 14 — FUTURIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- 144,000 = end-time Jewish believers (14:1–5)
- Angel messages = literal proclamations in Tribulation (14:6–11)
- Babylon = future global system (14:8)
- Harvest/winepress = second coming judgment (14:14–20)

Sources:

- Dispensational framework overlaid on text
- Ties to Daniel and end-time prophecy

- Literal view fits futurist system
- Timing drawn from outside Revelation

REVELATION 14 — IDEALIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- 144,000 = all faithful believers (14:1–
 5)
- Angel messages = eternal gospel and warnings across ages (14:6–11)
- Babylon = worldly opposition to God (14:8)
- Harvest = final judgment of good and evil (14:14–20)

Sources:

- Highly symbolic, within Revelation's narrative style
- Avoids tying to one event

- Interprets symbols as timeless patterns
- Sacrifices historical specificity

REVELATION 14 – COMPARED

REVELATION 14 – FOOD FOR THOUGHT

- Does the text identify who the 144,000 are? (14:1–5)
- Do the angelic proclamations describe events or timeless truths? (14:6–11)
- Is Babylon clearly identified or interpreted in this chapter? (14:8)
- What is the function of the harvest imagery? (14:14–20)
- Do these visions appear sequential or thematic?

REVELATION 15-16 BOWLS, GLASSY SEA, PLAGUES, ETC.

Interpretations compared

REVELATION 15 WHAT IT TELLS US **ABOUT GOD**

God's Wrath Will Inspire Our Praise

- "Just and true are your ways...Who will not fear, O Lord?" (15:3–4).
- God's good is not only in his kindness. (see Lewis, Problem of Pain, Ch. 3)
- Think of angry heroes in movies finally putting the bad guy down.
- God will inspire us with his angrily doing away with evil.

God's Hearing of Intercession Will End

- No one will enter the sanctuary anymore (v8) during His wrath
- Is God your High Priest? There will not be any other for anyone then!

REVELATION 16 WHAT IT TELLS US **ABOUT GOD**

God Will Not Let Our Blood Be Spilled Unanswered

- Because of bloodshed against us (6a); God will turn their drinking water
 (6b)
- Reminiscent of Abel's blood crying out from the ground; Egypt plague
- Is the "New Testament God" different from the "Old Testament God"?

God Is Orchestrating the Sequence of Events

- e.g. He dries the Euphrates to pave the way for evil armies gathering (12-14)
- Reminiscent of Proverbs evil setting its own trap
 - Nobody has any strategic edge on God. His is the best way.

REVELATION 15-16 — PRETERIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- 7 bowls = judgments on Jeru. (15:1; 16:1–21)
- Sea of glass = martyrs victorious over Roman persecution (15:2–4)
- Plagues = echo Exodus; Jeru. as new Egypt
- Euphrates = Roman border; its drying enables invasion (16:12)
- Armageddon = Roman-Jewish war climax (16:16)
- Babylon = Jerusalem under judgment (16:19)

Sources:

- Textual-symbolic pattern drawn from Exodus
- Historical grounding in 1st-century war events

- OT imagery matches Roman siege setting
- Babylon = Jerusalem reading is plausible but debated

REVELATION 15-16 — HISTORICIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Seven bowls = stages of divine judgment across Church history (15:1; 16:1–21)
- Sea of glass = faithful through the ages (15:2)
- Plagues = events like French Revolution, Reformation, etc.
- Euphrates = weakening of Ottoman Empire (16:12)
- Armageddon = final world conflict involving apostate powers (16:16)
- Babylon = papal Rome or corrupt world system (16:19)

Sources:

- Symbolic reading tied to long-range timelines
- Applies day-year principle and historical overlays

- Fits historicist structure but overlays nontextual chronology
- Interpretation of events is retrofitted

REVELATION 15-16 — FUTURIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Seven bowls = literal future plagues in the Great Tribulation (15:1; 16:1–21)
- Sea of glass = martyred believers in heaven (15:2–4)
- Plagues = global, catastrophic judgments
- Euphrates = literal river drying to allow kings of the East (16:12)
- Armageddon = future world war in Israel (16:16)
- Babylon = revived global system or literal city (16:19)

Sources:

- Draws on Revelation text + Daniel + endtimes prophecies
- Structured by dispensational timeline

- Literal sequence consistent with system
- Some events symbolic in text but taken literally in view

REVELATION 15-16 — IDEALIST VIEW

Interpretation:

- Seven bowls = recurring divine judgment on evil (15:1; 16:1–21)
- Sea of glass = victory of saints through all ages (15:2–4)
- Plagues = timeless warnings and consequences of rebellion
- Euphrates = symbolic removal of barriers to evil (16:12)
- Armageddon = final spiritual confrontation (16:16)
- Babylon = symbolic of worldly power against God (16:19)

Sources:

- Highly symbolic approach grounded in Revelation's themes
- No fixed chronology; views cycles instead

- Captures theological structure and repetition
- Less specific about historic or future fulfillment

REVELATION 15–16 – CRITICAL THINKING PROMPTS

- Does the text say when these plagues occur or whether they are future? (15:1;
 16:1)
- Does the sea of glass scene suggest a specific time or group? (15:2–4)
- Is Armageddon described as a literal place or symbolic moment? (16:16)
- Does the drying of the Euphrates imply military movement or spiritual readiness?
 (16:12)
- Is Babylon clearly identified in these chapters? (16:19)

CONCLUSION - INTERPRET WISELY

- Rich, complex symbols not explicit interpretation
- No eschatology out there is airtight
- Be slow to dogmatize where the text doesn't
- Focus on clear messages:
 - God's justice
 - Christ's victory
 - · a call to faithful endurance
- Remembering it belongs to God, and was given to us,
 ...learn the Revelation.
