The CDC recommends:

- Seek shade, especially during midday.
- Cover exposed skin and wear a wide-brimmed hat to shade the face, head, ears and neck.
- Wear sunglasses that block close to 100% of UVA and UVB rays.
- Use sunscreen with SPF 15 or higher and UVA and UVB protection.
- Reapply sunscreen after swimming, sweating or two hours of sun exposure.
- Avoid indoor tanning.
