

The Reformation (1500-1700)

Closed with...

- Expansion of the church outside Europe
- Exhaustion of the church in Europe

= Intellectual & philosophical movement in the <u>west</u> that relied on <u>human reason rather than revelation</u> as source of <u>truth & progress</u>

Fueled push for radical new FREEDOMS

...of thought, religion, governance, economic activity

American Revolution (1776)

Founded on concept of freedom of religion

Pioneered *denominationalism*

But only nominally Christian

French Revolution (1789)

The Church was an enemy

Goddess of Reason erected in Notre Dame



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Pioneered **secularism**

Some Christians EMBRACE the enlightenment

Rejection of historic doctrine; higher criticism of Bible

Liberal Christianity = FEELINGS and BEHAVIOR

Birthed by Friedrich Schleiermacher (b. 1768 in Germany)

Fueled by Darwin's Origin of Species (1859)

Won most of High-Church denominations & seminaries

Some Christians RESIST the enlightenment

Pietist Movement (Germany and France)

Methodist Movement (England)




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
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
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Roman Catholic Opposition



Postmodernism

Reject anything that claims absolute authority

Truth discovered through EXPERIENCE

All truths equally valid if they don't infringe on others

The Postmodern Church (1900...)

Theological Renewal & numerical decline in Europe Rise of evangelicalism in the United States

Seeds: Bible conferences, charismatic movement, fundamentalism

New seminaries (e.g. DTS) and denominations (e.g. Bible Church)

Numerical growth through Billy Graham Crusades

Political growth through Religious Right

Rise of the independent megachurch... like GBC!

1619 arrival of the first African slave to America

1624 first slave baptism

1730's-1858 Era of Revival and Proselytizing Slaves

1965-2019 Modern African American Church era
