HOW TO BE A MAN OF HONOR

There are two people, alright, 3 people that come to mind when I think of honor.

You need to have your values in line to live an honorable life and to be an honorable man because what's right isn't always clear even though it is real.

Without your values and your priorities written down somewhere firm, there's no way you're going to be able to determine what's honorable.

Those 3 men are 3 men that you should study.

1. BELISARIUS

The book: The Last Roman General

The man: He, like Robert E. Lee, saw his duty first to his God, then to his country, then to his family. He, himself, was nowhere on that list. His actions were not done to his own benefit, even though they were great actions, and even while he won back territory after territory for the Romans, he was always seen as a threat by his emperor, and thus, he was punished.

He did what was right, not what was good for him. He wasn't rewarded for it. Honor led him, life didn't praise him. You have to separate glory and fame from being a good man, they rarely align.

2. ROBERT E. LEE

The book: Clouds of Glory

Robert E. Lee was offered the Generalship of the Union Army by President Lincoln when the North started the war with the South. He turned it down not because he was for slavery – that war is far more layered than the victors describe it – as he freed the slaves he was given by his wife's father within 5 years of being given them. He turned it down because he couldn't fight his countrymen.

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You have to read about this man's life, known as the west's greatest general. He didn't drink because he loved to do so. He did what must be done. Not what would benefit him.

3. CHRIST

I can't talk about honor and not talk about Christ. Honor is understanding what's right and carrying that life out no matter the consequences. His was torture and death. He acted with honor even when a crown of thorns dug into his scalp and nails were jammed into his wrists, forgiving those who nailed him to the cross and ripped the skin from his back with whips.

These are 3 examples, archetypes.

John Wayne movies give us great archetypes for how to live an honorable life. It's simply doing what's right, what's just, what must be done, even if we go down because of it.

Honor Your Word, Your Parents, Your God, Your Gift

Honor is more than just something you are, it's something you give.

You honor others by being a better man and being a better man has a lot to do with honor.

Honor, however, is also something deeply rooted in being better at being a man, and can have nothing to do with 'goodness', and everything to do with being a warrior, which is why we were originally born. Men served a couple purposes, one being warriors. We're the fighters in the two sexes, and you can't have someone you're fighting alongside whom you don't trust.

The guy by your side and at your back allow you to fight with everything you have without worrying about anything other than the man in front of you trying to kill you or the beast at your 12 who'll either be your dinner or your destruction.

The man of honor won't leave his fellow warriors, his family, his friends, his peers, or even a stranger, when they need them most.

You're a man, the burden-bearer, the rock that others lean on. It ain't easy, but it's how it is and it's how it's always been.

Honor is holding yourself to a different standard than the pukes who give up, cry, whine, and wish their life was different.

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DO WHAT'S RIGHT, NOT WHAT'S EASY
